CRL COOPERATIVE RESEARCH GRANTS

The Council on Library Resources will make a limited number of grants in 1983/84 to provide support for cooperative research projects proposed jointly by librarians and members of library science faculties. Proposals will be reviewed and awards will be made in October of 1983 and April of 1984.

The grants (not to exceed \$3,000 each) are to fund certain costs of the selected projects. They are to be used for incremental costs, including, for example, organization of data, cost of hiring interviewers, and charges for computer time.

Applications must be submitted jointly by a senior staff member of an academic or research library and a faculty member. Proposals should be submitted in the form of a letter to the Council on Library Resources. The letter should contain the following information: a description of the project to be undertaken; anticipated duration of the project and evidence that time to undertake the work will be available; assessment of the potential utility of research results to libraries generally; and, detailed budget for the project.

Proposals to be considered in the fall cycle must be received by October 15, 1983; those submitted in the spring, by April 1, 1984. The letters should be sent to: Faculty/Librarian Cooperative Research, Council on Library Resources, 1785 Massachusetts Avenue, N.W., Washington, D.C. 20036.

SUPPORT FOR RESEARCH TRAVEL

The National Endowment for the Humanities has established a new Travel to Collections Program to enable American scholars to travel to research collections of libraries, archives, museums, and other repositories in North America and Western Europe. The program provides grants of exactly \$500 for consultation of materials essential to a scholar's research but not readily available near the scholar's home or regular place of work.

Complete proposals must be received on or before September 15, 1983, for travel to begin after January 1, 1984. Proposals must be received on or before January 15, 1984, for travel to begin after June 15, 1984. Late and incomplete applications cannot be accepted. For further information

The Center welcomes from individuals throughout the world outstanding project proposals representing a wide diversity of scholarly interests and approaches.

The Wilson Center offers fellowships in one broadly defined program (History, Culture, and Society) and five more focused programs (American Society and Politics, Kennan Institute for Advanced Russian Studies, Latin American Program, International Security Studies Program, and East Asia Program).

The Center holds one round of Competitive selection per year. The deadline for receipt of application and all supporting materials is October 1.
