When Keith lived in Lexington he served as president of Dignity and worked with GLSO, including six years on the pride week committees. He taught school for nine years, mostly at Squires and Glendover Elementary Schools.

are affected by it and pretty soon the word spreads that there is a café—the Van Gogh Café—that is wonderful, like a dream, like a mystery, like a painting, and you ought to go there, they will say, for you will never forget it."



The sermon continues to explore how to work to end the many forms of oppression in our

lives, and how to create the magic that will do it.

Rev. Kron is a graduate of Starr King School for the Ministry and was ordained into Unitarian Universalist ministry in February of 1999. He has written a premarital counseling guide for same gender couples and is currently working on a book for the UUA on civil unions.

Keith revised the UU Welcoming Congregation manual as well as writing a curriculum that goes beyond the basics of welcoming GLBT people into our congregations. Starting later in October, our Lexington UU Church will be providing workshops for our congregation and friends using some of these materials. 

Gay, Lesbian Couples Sought for Study

Dr. Sherry Rostosky, a professor in the Department of Educational and Counseling Psychology at the University of Kentucky, is looking for gay male and lesbian couples to participate in a study of same-sex relationships. Approximately forty couples are needed to confidentially complete a series of questionnaires that ask about individual perceptions, feelings, attitudes, and experiences within intimate relationships. Participating couples are given an appointment time that is convenient for them and each couple member is taken to a private office to complete the surveys. Each couple who completes the surveys (which take about an hour to complete) will receive \$50 (\$25 each) to compensate them for their time. 

What are your plans for October 11? Its national Coming Out Day and we encourage everyone to take another step out of the closet. The size of the step is up to you, we appreciate the diversity within our community which includes different levels of "outness." If each of us can come out to just one other person, the will change the world.

It has been changing. We see that in the number of youth realizing and celebrating who they are at an age when those of us over 40 were not even aware we were in a closet. We see it in the numbers of us speaking publically to reporters and legislators (not to mention parents) and in the growing number of GLBT people in positions of authority. We

see it in the advertising dollars spent in promotion of our celebrities with, or course, the hope of selling us all kinds of products. We see it in the growing acceptance and appreciation of our contributions to our country.

Not everyone has the choice of going public. There is still the danger of loosing jobs or becoming estranged from family. But at times we overprotect ourselves, a survival instinct that we need to check periodically so that we do not become our own jailers. It is worth the effort to challenge our fears, we do not know who we might become if we step beyond our comfort zone.

This is not to say that the most public among us don't have "coming out issues" to consider. All of us can find ourselves in situations that leave us tongue tied or silent. We need each other's support no matter what our next step might be.

For some people, coming out may mean a redefinition of self in recognition of their bisexual or transgender nature. Our community hasn't always been supportive of individuals who change there perceptions in these ways. We need to give everyone the space to reexamine their identity.

Queer youth are publishing their stories and poems, and expressing opinions that claim identities that older generations are even less familiar with. We need to listen and celeberate their self definitions also. (see page 15)

The goal is not for everyone to be at the same place. The goal for this day is for each of us to look at the areas where fear or ignorance, internal or external, may be limiting our lives, and to consider what we want to do about that. Then step on out, proud and joyful, and we will change the world.



WHALE WATER

"Hi Aunt Martha! It's me, Karen! I am here to interview you for the Oral Herstory Archives! How are you feeling today?"

"I am feeling all right, and I will be even better when you quit shouting at me. I can see you, I can hear you, and I smelled your toilet water before you came through the doorway. What's the name of that stuff?"

"It's called Whale Water and it is my favorite cologne. Aunt Martha, is this still a good time for us to talk? We seem to be starting off on the wrong foot. I can come back another day. I know that you have been under the weather lately."

"Child, this is an old folks home and somebody is always under the weather, because if we weren't, then these people would be out of business. No need for you to be in a hurry. Have a seat and telt me when they started making Whale Water Cologne for women. In the 1940s that was men's cologne. The bottle was glass-blue and it had that covert picture on the label; Mobey Dick with a rush of water spraying out of his head."

"You have a pretty good memory Aunt Martha. It's the same cologne in the same blue bottle, only now there is an image of a black whale in the ocean with the tail flipped up in the air, and a splash of water is tossed over the partially submerged head. It's not sold in stores anymore, but you can order it from a specialty catalog. A lot of lesbians buy it. Mine was a gift from a friend."

"Honey, you don't have to explain all your business to me.

Your grandmother has already told me about you and your friend. I know that times have changed, but you need to think about the message that comes with that cologne. Everything that smells good is not good for you. You hear what I am saying?"

"Yes, Aunt Martha, I hear you."

"Good. Now let's get down to business, because that is the whole point of your being here today. I am sure that your grandmother has told you about TaTa, the woman I met at the Greyhound Bus Station in Detroit, November 1945. She was barely five feet tall, and she had deep dimples and a space between her front teeth. And she smelled GOOD!

TaTa had finished her time with the army and I had been discharged from my factory job. At the end of the War [W.W.II] the servicemen were coming back home to their jobs, so the women employees were let go. i was going back home to Paris, Kentucky and TaTa was destined for Christiansted, St Croix.

When the bus stopped in front of the Paris Public Library, I got off and TaTa followed me home. Moma and Daddy thought that she was one of my Detroit friends who would be visiting for a couple of days before moving on. But your grandmother knew what were about; she was pretty smart for a 13-year-old, though she could never keep a secret. My sister has always had a serious case of lose lips, but I love her just the same.

Two days later TaTa and I left for Florida. My parents assumed that TaTa had led me astray because she was an older and more experienced woman; I was 19 and she was 23. They didn't know that TaTa was not my first woman but I was her first. That's another story, let me tell you one story at a time.

I had not intended to go away and stay. I was only going as far as Miami, Florida, then I was suppose to come back home and TaTa would take a boat to the Virgin Islands. But one thing led to another and I ended up in Christiansted, St Croix. And Baby, I was hooked! You hear what I am saying? It was like that woman's presence made everything bright in my life.

On the island there were beautiful people, beautiful beaches, beautiful weather, and hospitality from one end of the island to the other. The tourism industry was just starting, the hurricane scare had passed, and the war was over, all of which prompted an upswing in the economy. I completely forgot about Paris, Kentucky, because my nose was wide open and home was the furthest thing from my mind. Everyday, TaTa and I would swim in the clear blue waters of the Caribbean Sea, and we would spread a blanket and have dinner on a white sand beach.

Life was carefree and we were doing our own thing, we even had our own house. Well, it was really TaTa's uncle's boarding house, but he let us have the back room in exchange for our taking care of the place. So, in a sense, it was our house. We cooked together, we went out together, we were always together. And to me, that meant mutual love.

I was in heaven! Those six months on the island made me feel like a full-bloom woman. It wasn't anything like the year and a half I had spent in Detroit. When I was up North, I had lived with Daddy's sister and her family on Daly Avenue. It was freezing in the winter, steaming in the summer, and I worked all the time. If I met a woman that I liked, I would have to sneak out of the house to meet her somewhere for an hour or two. But in Christiansted, I was in love and I was free. I told TaTa that I was going to stay on that island with her forever.

I felt like I was walking on a cloud, until the day I stepped out the door and bumped into my daddy. He said three words, "Vacations over, Baby." I could have argued and refused to go, but there wasn't anything that I could say after TaTa went into our room and brought out my suitcase and overnight bag. She handed them to Daddy. She must have packed my things while I was out shopping that morning. I loved that woman. You hear what I am saying.

I followed Daddy like I was a lost pup. TaTa and I hadn't exchanged no tears, no goodbye, no handshake, no 'kiss my butt', no nothing. As Daddy and I were walking away, she just stood in the yard chewing on her top lip with her chin quivering. I guess I was supposed to understand what she had done, but I didn't understand anything.

One early morning I had been walking on a white sand beach, then I blinked my eyes, and the surroundings changed to the bedroom I shared with my sister in Paris, Kentucky. I wanted to tell somebody that I was in love, I had been free. And I wanted it all back, but how? She didn't want me.

Everyday my parents kept telling me to get a

job, go to school, get married, do something. My something was to get out of the bed each morning. My days were spent on the front porch swing, rain or shine; I was waiting on TaTa to come get me. I hadn't unpacked the overnight bag; it was under my bed.

The Dear Jane letter arrived after about a month. Your grandmother read it to me. They say that I reacted like a mad woman and threw the overnight bag out the backdoor and cried and cussed and kicked it around the yard, and hacked it a few times with the ax before Daddy came out and held me until I caimed down.

The new underclothes that TaTa had bought me were scattered all over the yard and there was a small blue bottle of Whale Water Cologne. I kept that Whale piss Water for a long time. When I got over her, I dropped that cute little trinket in the Kentucky River.

I am going to have to stop now; that music you hear over the intercom means that it's time for visitors to leave."

"Aunt Martha, before I go I have to know, did you ever see TaTa again?"


"I wil! have to tell you about that the next time you visit. You had better leave now or they will throw you out. Bye Baby."

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

This book, edited by Amy Sonnie, is filled with the experiences and opinions of queer youth. For Coming Out month it is particularly important that we listen to these voices that are beginning to emerge. Some of what they have to say may be as disturbing to us as it is to the straight culture. And it is also exciting.

T. Rowan, age 16, Labels, Names & Identity:

My sexuality is as fluid, infinite, undefinable, and ever-changing as the north-flowing river that runs through the valley where I have spent nearly all my life. The continuum of sexuality is long, and I am always slip-sliding from one side to the other and most often stopping to rest somewhere in the middle. Sexuality is not black or white...it is gray, and gray comes in infinite shades, more than could ever be contained in the biggest box of drawing pencils.

Ryn Gluckman, age 20: Relearning the Mothertongue: Notes from a Second-Generation Queer

I have found the queer community to be amazingly dynamic but terribly uncomfortable with its diversity. Here, of all places, I did not expect to be confronted with binary systems of identification, but it is here that I have struggled the most with this polar language: homosexual or heterosexual, gay, or lesbian, male or female, butch or femme, top or bottom. I either find myself in none of these categories or all of them. Once again I ache to define myself not only in terms my community can understand but also that accurately describe who I am. I find myself roaming in the country of sexuality, wandering half out of choice and half in search of a language I can claim. Let me be a queer straight, the dyke who sleeps with men, the woman mistaken for a man. Let me have the best of these dichotomies. Let me speak with a language of my own.

S. Asher Hanlet, age 21 Different: My Experiences as an Intersexed Gay Boy

I am a 21 year old queer boi of mixed heritage...
We are expected to fit neatly packaged and narrowly defined categories. Even our mannerisms are marketed to us. This is part of the reason people like me are subjected to life-altering surgery before we're old enough to talk. ..! was born intersexed, I didn't fit neatly into one of the expected options. ...How open should I be in such a dichotomous world? Among gay boys, I am capable of passing until someone finds out what I am under my clothes, and then, once again, I become an outsider. The quickest path to change...visibility!

A MATTER OF CHOICE?

This ABC Nightline series was scheduled to start in late September and continue in October but has been postponed due to the tragedy. A Matter of Choice begins with conversations with residents of the nation's first gay and lesbian retirement community located in Florida. Gay and Lesbian retiree's speak honestly and openly with Nightline about coming to terms with their sexuality.

Quite a bit of this series focus on Roanoke, Virginia where Danny Overstreet was murdered in a gay bar. Mr. Koppel reviews the local news coverage stimulated by the murder and interviews Roanoke-area religious leaders: Methodist, Muslim, Roman Catholic and Southern Baptist.

One show in the series profiles a former Roanoke Commonwealth Attorney who had to prosecute gays under Virginia state laws while he was living a secret gay life. Today he is a defense attorney for people charged under Virginia's sodomy and solicitation laws.

Gay teenagers are the focus for one night. The program profiles a young lesbian whose own difficult experience coming out as a teenager has inspired her to work with gay teens. Mr. Koppel speaks with gay and lesbian teenagers from the Roanoke area. The series concludes with a live, 90-minute town meeting in Roanoke, anchored by Mr. Koppel.

Ellen Degeneres is back on Fridays at 8 pm. "The Ellen Show" casts her as Ellen Richman, a wealthy and successful 38-year-old lesbian who returns home to a small town after her internet company fails. She moves in with her eccentric mom (Cloris Leachman) and gets a job as a counselor at her former high school. The cast includes Emily Rutherfurd as her sister, Martin Mull as the principal, and Diane Delano as a gym teacher who develops a crush on Ellen.

No one in Clark seems to have a problem with Ellen's sexual orientation. Well, sit-coms aren't about reality. Degeneres says "Nobody is shocked by it. It just is what it is, and they accept her for who she is," This is small town America? Maybe reality will try to catch up with this vision. Ellen is a funny woman, lets hope she is provided with good material.

Transsexual Character

CBS seems to have high hopes for The Education of Max Bickford from 8 to 9 on Sunday evenings. Academy Award-winner Richard Dreyfuss stars as Max Bickford, a widowed college professor. Navajo, Asian, Black, White, gay, straight-these kids shine. We see them writing in subways, performing in the streets, and loving each other across differences. Tim Arevalo, a queer Pilipino American, ends the evening with "a poem for us" for which he has won several competitions. If you haven't seen performance poetry, tune in and see the how the world is changing. Immediately before this show is "Coal Black Voices", featuring some Ky. Afrilation Poets.

Old friends. New Adventures

Will and Grace returns at 9 pm on NBC. Apparently Will (Eric McCormack) will finally have a relationship, but with a "married" man.

Dr. Weaver (Laura Innis) outed herself at the conclusion of last season's ER. Her fear discomfort about coming out is a realistic portrayal of some of our lives. Sadly, her relationship with Dr. Legaspi (Elizabeth Mitchelll) does not seem to be part of this season's story line.
