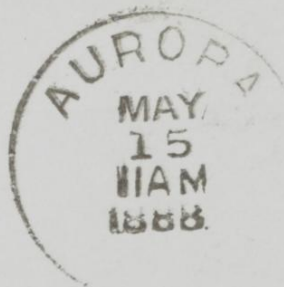
Dear Mr. Bouslough:-

My dear Wonalongh; -

Many are the memories which gather about college life, but none more pleasant to me than the memory of your sterling friendship. You gained in your life here much which few gain in their entire course, viz., you learned the value of life; its opportunities & responsibilities. I was handed your letter on my arrival from New York & said it should be among the first to receive my attention. Since I arrived the matters have taken a strange & providential turn & I must relate to you the facts, which are of transcendent importance over everything heretofore.

The man has been found who would do much for Beloit &

he puts it in this way in writing.
"If Beloit will raise [#]10,000, for
a new Academy, I will give
[#]25,000, if Beloit does not - I
will not. Yesterday, there came
a second proposition, from
another man. "If Beloit College
will raise before July 1st '89
[#]100,000, I will give another
[#]100,000." Imagine, my dear
fellow, what God means for
Beloit. But if we do not raise
[#]100,000, before July 1st (7 weeks
ahead) the man has promised
his money to another institution.
I never have experienced the
responsibility to do my best
more than now. This money
need not be paid in by July
1st but be so it draws inter-
est from July 1st. Now, my dear
fellow, do your best to pray
for us that the Lord will
not permit this to go to the wall.
Dr. Eaton tells me, that I should

receive all money, So if you
will make out your ^{\$}10. pay-
able to me, I will send you
a receipt signed by the Pres.,
as I wish him to sign all
receipts that the money may
have been shown to pass through
his hands into the fund. I know
what a sacrifice this is for
you, & every dollar is a heart-
beat for Beloit. If it be possible
sure the sum ^{\$}25. owing
to this great strain now, &
let the ^{\$}15. be made payable on
demand or sooner if you
can pay it before. We will
get the ^{\$}100000. before July 1st.
I am confident, we will all
sell our clothes before we let
this last offer slip. Write me
a cheerful letter

Oct. 31 - 1889

Dear Mr. Bouslough:—

I remember with some feeling of self reproach that I did not thank you for the kind proposition to escort me to Miss Hatch's on Saturday evening. Please understand that the reason which I gave for not accepting was the only one which was in my mind. It is better I think, that I give you my suggestions and let you do what you see fit with them.

I cannot take time (either yours or mine) just now to tell you of all the little things which I have of late seen and heard and thought about our young people.

If I could, you would better understand just why I have placed some names where you see them in my list. Some of our prominent workers, you may notice, are omitted, and there is a reason for that too.

Did you not feel thankful to God for the good time we had in our meeting last Sunday? I think our young people are growing. Yet I do earnestly desire that we may all live nearer to the Lord — so near that for

love of Him we shall be willing to do or bear anything. Please let me repeat a few words written by my friend George McDonald.

"We are not right until we can pray heartily, not say submissively, 'Thy will be done!' We have not one interest ^{and} God another. When we wish what He does not wish, we are not more against Him than against our real selves."
