Holding. (Penalty—by offense, 15 yards; by defense, 5 yards.)

Interference with forward pass, pass touching ineligible player, or "screening" pass receiver. (If penalty on offense, when interference occurs beyond line of scrimmage, 15 yards and loss of down; on or behind line of scrimmage, loss of down only. Interference by defense, ball to offense on spot of foul as first down.)



Time out.

Offside or violation of kick-off formation. (Penalty, 5 yards.)



Penalty refused, incomplete pass, missed field goal or conversion, both sides offside, etc.



Delay of game or extra time-outs. (Penalty, 5 yards.)

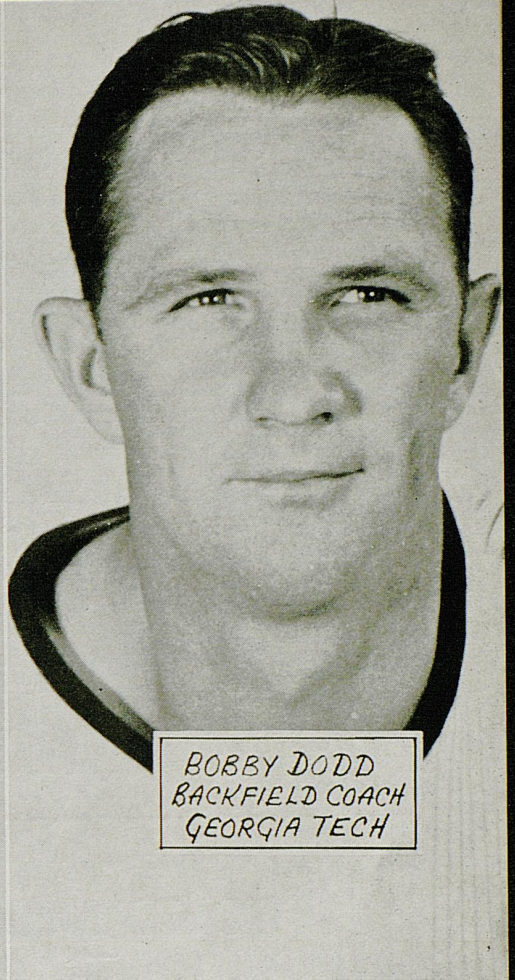

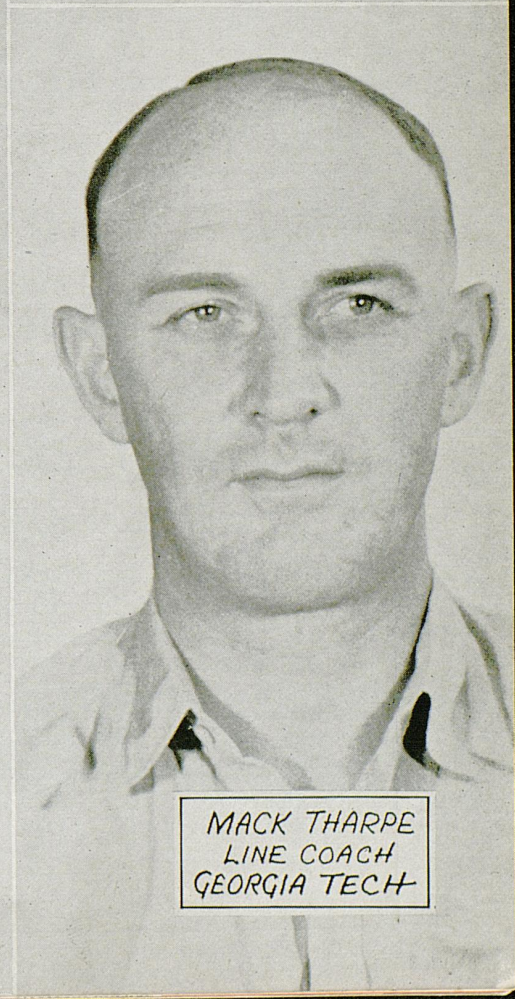

This Cat-Engineer series is not a new one. The first game came in 1923 and ended a 3 to 3 tie. Since then Kentucky has won three and Tech four. There have been few lop-sided games, Tech scoring her biggest victory in 1936, 34 to 0, and Kentucky climbing highest with a 25 to 6 win in 1935.



The Kentuckians are quite familiar with grim Coach Alex's well-known "hot magic." It beat them the last four times at bat, although in 1938—the first year likeable Coach Ab Kirwan took over the Wildcat coaching reins—they almost upset a great Tech squad's apple-cart before finally falling 19 to 18.



Almost as familiar to Kentucky as the Tech teams are two of the Tech coaches. Bill Alexander, who has held the reins at the same school longer than any other major grid coach in the country, was born at Mud River, Kentucky.


Bobby Dodd, his young, capable assistant, was a member of Major Neyland's Tennessee team in 1927, 28, and 29. Playing quarterback, he was prominently mentioned on the all-American lists his senior year.



One of the greatest disappointments in Dodd's career was at Kentuck's hands. Set for a bid to the Rose Bowl, the great Tennessee team rolled up to Thanksgiving undefeated and untied. They had with Dodd in their back field McEvers and Hackman, two of the best backs in Southeastern Conference history, and Quinn Decker, now coach at Centre College. They looked like a dead cinch. But something happened and oft-trampled Kentucky tied them 6 to 6.



While the tie was disappointing, Tennessee was thankful—for Dodd's presence. Had it not been his brilliant kicking and quarterbacking, the aroused Cats might have won from the Vols. Fans today may still see that kicking—by Dodd's proteges. They say he trains them as well as he could kick them.

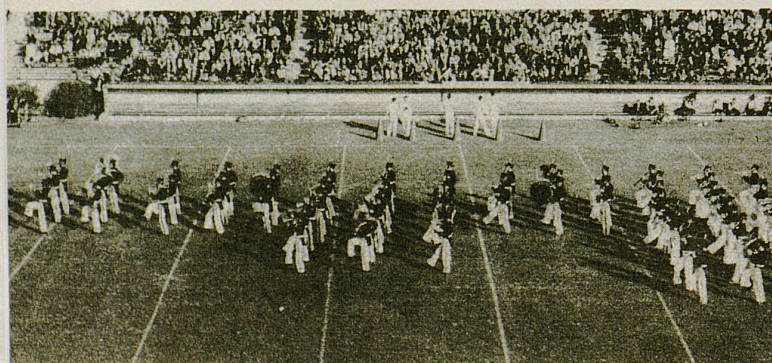

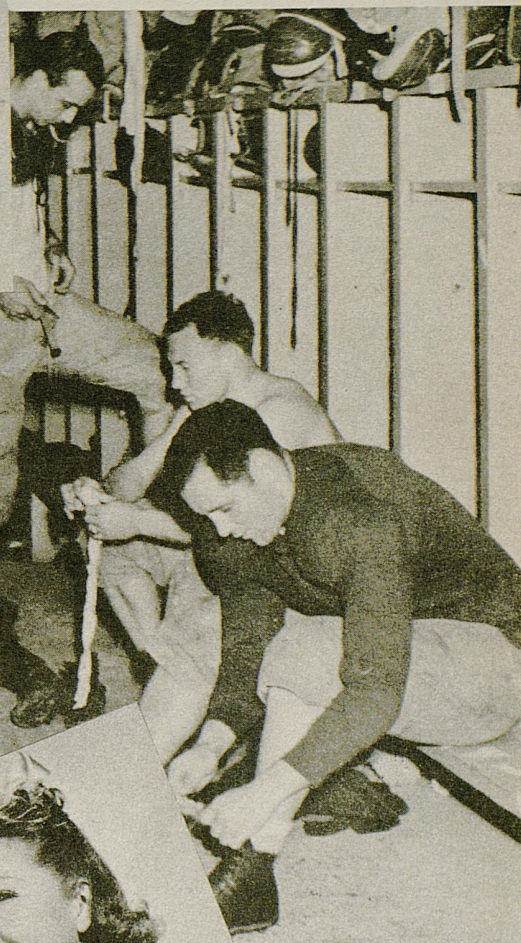

Myers, Rupert, Shively, Kirwan, Moseley, McCubbin, Shepherd

Kentucky's Coaches

Head man of the Kentucky varsity coaching staff is studious, bespectacled Albert Dennis (Ab) Kirwan, man of letters, attorney at law, student of football.

He is assisted by Bernie Shively, Frank Moseley, Gene Myers, Joe Rupert, Joe Shepherd and Bill McCubbin.

Kirwan is in his third year as head coach of the Wildcats, his first coaching assignment in college football excepting the season of 1926, the year after his graduation, when he assisted Fred J. Murphy with the Kentucky varsity.

Ab is Kentucky's first alumnus coach since early in the century. As a Wildcat he played halfback and end, captaining the 1925 varsity. He also was captain of the freshman team in 1921 and, before coming to Kentucky as a student, was captain of the Louisville Male High School team.

After graduation, Kirwan studied law and coached at Louisville Male, then transferred to Louisville Manual Training High School. As a result of his fine showing at Manual, one of the State's largest high schools, he was selected to succeed Chet Wynne as head of the Wildcats' coaching staff in 1938.

Kirwan's first year at Kentucky was not a howling success from the standpoint of games won, as his team lost all but two games that year. But in 1939 things were different, the Wildcats of last season winning six games, including two over Southeastern Conference foes; a tie with Alabama and narrow losses to great Tennessee and Georgia Tech elevens.

Coach Shively, who has been connected with athletics at Kentucky since 1927, when he came from Illinois as line coach under Harry Gamage, holds two jobs now. He is athletic director and also coach of the Wildcat linemen. At Illinois he was named on the All-America team of 1926 as guard, playing on the same team with Red Grange.

Moseley played football at the University of Alabama and was a great quarterback for Coach Frank Thomas. He completed his university work at Kentucky, where he received his degree. Moseley coaches the Wildcat ends.

Myers and Rupert assist with the varsity when they are not busy coaching the freshmen. Myers, head freshman coach, also is on duty as a member of the university's military staff. Both are former Kentucky football stars.

Shepherd and McCubbin were regulars on the 1939 Wildcat team. Shepherd, quarterback, was captain of the team and McCubbin played end. Both are working toward their M.A. degree this year.

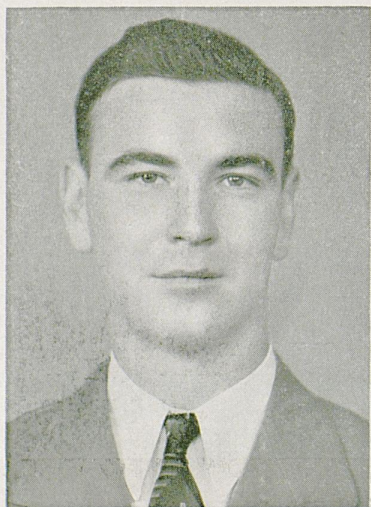
The Trainer

The Manager

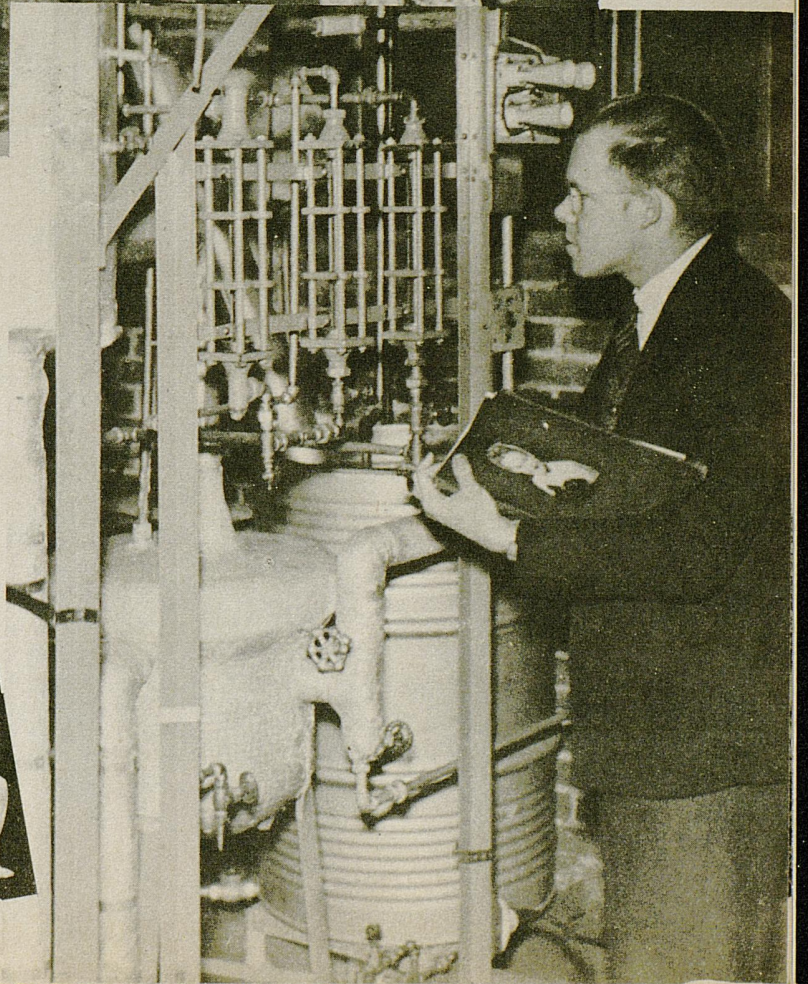

All of Kentucky's coaches are home products, for while Line Coach Shively and End Coach Mosely used their playing talents elsewhere—at Illinois and Alabama—both received degrees from the University of Kentucky.

Three of the Wildcat mentors come from one town, Louisville. They are Kirwan, Shepherd and McCubbin. Kirwan was captain at Kentucky in 1925, a great end. Shepherd was quarterback and captain last year, McCubbin was an end—and a fine one—on the same team.

Although 40 of the 59 men who reported for the opening of football practice at the University of Kentucky on Sept. 1 are natives of the Bluegrass State, their captain, tackle John Eibner, is a "furriner." He hails from Jeanette, Pa.

University of Kentucky football fans are having a hard time distinguishing between Coach Kirwan's two number one teams, which alternate by quarters, in their conversation. It seems improper to call either the "first team."

Some have suggested "A" and "B."

Others would like for them to wear blue headgears and white headgears and make it the "Blues" and the "Whites."

Kirwan himself says he doesn't care what they are called, "just so they play football."

Diminutive Ermal Allen, the 155-pound half-back, is as well known in his home state, Tennessee, for his golfing ability as he is for his football ability. In 1939 he was runner up in the Tennessee open at Chattanooga . . . this year he won the Johnson City tourney. And he played number one on the Wildcat golf team last spring, contributing heavily to two Wildcat victories over the U. T. team.
