Johnston, who is white, applied for an internship in the graphics department of USA Today. The 1992 UK graduate said he received a letter from the raper saying he was not selected, that the position he was applying for was only open to minorities. Months later when he applied to the paper for a job, he said the rejection letter he received assumed he was black.

"What ticked me off was that they said if I was a minority to apply for a minority internship," he said.

Johnston said he's not bitter about the incident and concedes that he was probably not qualified enough to work at the nation's leading daily newspaper.

and concease that he was present and concease that he was present and the ranks of college-age white men, sometimes kindling a fear, substantiated or not, that it is European-American males who will be operating at a disadvantage in trying to find jobs or enter graduate school. In a strange reversal of history, many whites, particularly white men, believe they will be slighted, devalued, because businesses and universities are more interested in something called diversity. The relationship between this perception and reality is somewhat murky. For every rumored story of "reverse discrimination" there is a white male occupying a governor's mansion (46 out of 50), a Senate seat (90 out of 100) or a corporate executive's office 96 percent, according to one study).



Some researchers feel left out of farm debate

As the struggle between UK and Frankfort over the fate of Coldstream Farm heats up, animal studies re-searchers think their department has been left out in the

UK has used Coldstream, which is a few miles north of campus, for animal and agricultural research since the 1950s. The UK Board of Trustees voted in 1987 to develop a research park at Coldstream and made plans in 1991 to move the animal studies department to UK's Pin Oak Farm in Woodford County

Pin Oak Farm in Woodtord County.

But to date, no animal research facilities have been built at Pin Oak.

"Pin Oak is an excellent farm, but it really doesn't have any buildings that we can use as research facilities for any of the animals we have," said Guy Kiracofe, who is director of UK's animal studies department.

the latest budget request, UK asked the state for In the latest budget request, UN assect the state on 512.5 million to implement "phase one" of Pin Oak's improvement. Gov. Brereton Jones has said Kentucky's General Fund will not be large enough this year to pay for new facilities at Pin Oak.

year to pay for new facilities at Pin Oak.

Instead, Jones suggested UK sell Coldstream or work with private developers to build the research park. The revenue generated from Coldstream's development could then be used to pay for Pin Oak improvements and offset other educational expenses, Jones said.

Jones saud.

UK President Charles Wethington said Jones' idea
runs counter to the Board of Trustees' wishes for UK
to develop and maintain control of the Coldstream
Farm research park.

"Phase one" would prepare Pin Oak for beef and dairy cattle research only. Research also currently is conducted with poultry, swine and sheep at Cold-

Suspect sought in 3 area assaults

UK police report separate attacks against three women on or near the campus since last week. None of the women were seriously injured.

Police say one person, who re-mains at large, may be involved in all of the alleged attacks. The sus-pect is described in police reports as a white man in his mid-20s, about six feet tall with a medium to stocky build and short, dark blonde hair.

According to witnesses, the assailant was wearing different clothes in each attack, ranging from sweat pants to blue jeans. He also was reported to be wearing and a multi-colored warm-up jacket or a



That mattered little to the 40,000 folks at the downhill, where Moe turned a mountain full of clanging cowbells and howling fans into an Alpine wake.

The Moe medal and the debut of the U.S. hockey team provided a welcome break from the Harding-Nancy Kerrigan flap, which ended with American officials agreeing to tel Harding state.

"The matter has been resolved," Kerrigan said in a statement yesterday that pointedly omitted Harding's name. "Regardless of my opinion on the ruling, the Olympics have begun and it's time to skate."





Gay groups break ties with pedophiles

WASHINGTON — The gay community has long allowed other sexual outcasts to ride its coattails, from transvesties and transsexuals to bisexuals and leather fetishiance itself from pedophiles.

Last month, a New York group called Stonewall 25 voted to bar the controversial North American Man-Boy Love Association from its international march on the United Vations on June 26. The demonstration will commemorate the 25th anniversary of an uprising at the Stonewall Inn, a Greenwich Village gay bar.

"Those who advocate or engage in sexual abuse of young people are not welcome in the family of gay men and lesbians who live upstanding and honorable lives," said Pat Norman, a co-chair of the march.

In January, the Senate unanimously passed an amendment, introduced by Sen. Jesse Helms, R-NC., to sharply reduce funds to the United Nations unless it severs ties with the Intermational Lesbian and Gay Association. Helms objected to the association's relationship to NAMBLA, one of about 350 groups that belong to ILGA.

David Smith, a spokesman for the National Gay and Lesbian Task Force, a Washington lobby, ac-cused the religious right of trying to link homosexuality to pedophilia to serve its "twisted interests."

"It's very clear that every major U.S. gay leader has condemned NAMBLA and condemned groups that promote pedophilia," he said.

But he acknowledged disagree-ment among gay leaders about NAMBLA's presence at gay events. For example, the annual gay pride march in Los Angeles ex-cludes NAMBLA, but the marches in New York and San Francisco have allowed it to participate.

"There's an argument in the com-munity that if you start with exclud-ing NAMBLA, who's next?" he said. "I disagree."

Gay leaders say ILGA is being attacked unfairly, and that the association has been trying to expel NAMBLA.

SOUTH BEND, Ind. — Their campaign was meant as a joke. Who would take them seriously when they promised a university-subsidized Grateful Dead concert and dissolution of student govern-

Fifty-six percent of the voting Student body, that's who.
Meet the University of Notre Dane's unlikely student leaders: David Hungeling and Matt Orsagh, a pair of "free-spirited, regular guys" who didn't enter the race un-til a week before the deadline. Hungeling was elected student government president and Orsagh vice president in a runoff election Wednesday.
"That proves what we have heard

with the pressuent in a runoit election Wednesday,
"That proves what we have heard from people all along," said Hungeling, a government major. "The voters are tired of the same people with the same ideas. They feel the need for something fresh, and they think a couple of knuckleheads will bring it."

The entire student body was eligible to vote, including about 10,000 undergraduate and graduate students. Hungeling and Orsagh, both juniors from Atlanta, received 2,730 votes.

University officials, who remained silent throughout the election, would not comment on Wednesday's results.

In addition to the Grateful Dead concert and the call to dissolve student government, Hungeling and Orsagh endorsed daily harassing phone calls to administrators and free football tickets.

"We wanted to add a lighthearted ticket to the election," Hungeling said. "In no way did we think we were going to win."

Their ticket gained steam after acadidates' debate, where statements like "We have created a campus-wide, grass-roots, social movement" were met with wild ovations. Even the student newspaper, the Observer, which endorsed their opponents, professed "strong affection" for the ticket.

Hungeling and Orsagh take office April 1. They've afready called the Grateful Dead's public relations staff to line up a concert. But they're prepared to break another promise: they won't dissolve student government, although they will try to "pare it down."

"Student government serves a purpose," said Orsagh, who majors in English and communications.
"But a lot of it we think is waste-ful."



Speaker: Obstacles facing social theory

Sounding more like Allen Gins-berg than a prolific theorist, Charles Tilly spoke Friday of what he sees as the loss of an entire gen-eration of scholars at the hands of pervasive skepticism.

His lecture at UK, the second in a series of five sponsored by the Committee on Social Theory, sought to answer the question fac-ing many academicians today: Where do we go from here?

"At issue is the capacity of the social sciences now and in any possible form to generate systematic knowledge," Tilly explained.

Tilly, a history professor from the New School for Social Re-search in New York City, outlined with broad strokes a possible future for the social sciences, one which emphasizes "shared understand-ings" across disciplinary boundar-ies

The majority of Tilly's argument, however, focused on obstacles fac-ing this new synthesis of social in-teraction.

Central among these is the belief in what he termed a "new shell game," which places all knowledge in a contestable position.

This stance calls into question any claims to absolute truth, leaving it's converts skeptical of truth in any form.

Tilly sought to hold out to to-

day's skeptics the possibility of recovering "systematic knowledge," which he described as commonly held observations that transverse the different codes and agendas of academic disciplines.

These codes — how we mean the same thing in different specialized jargons — and disciplinary agendas — the ways and reasons each group seeks knowledge — are the mortar holding together the walls separating the social sciences, he said.
