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Schools finding new ways to recruit

Perks: Unlike UK, some business, law schools paying students to visit

In the competition to land highly qualified candidates, some law and business schools across the nation have adopted various unique tactics to entice such individuals to choose them.

For instance, the University of California at Berkeley's Boalt Law School offers a fly-free program, now in its second year. Prospective students can visit the school, and the school will pay for it. Tickets are booked at a discount are limited to \$350 for out-of-state travel and \$150 for in-state travel.

"Every school wants to put its best foot forward on this one," said Victoria Ortiz, dean of students at Boalt. "There are more highly qualified students who have a great choice."

This option helped make the decision for aspiring attorney Rosie Shatkin. She was delighted when she was accepted by Boalt, but not sure she wanted to move 400 miles north or pay for the airfare for a campus visit. The free flight helped influence Shatkin, who is now a first-year student at Berkeley's Boalt Hall law school.

"Coming to this school really had a huge impact on my decision," she said. "It's like a communist spirit. Once you're accepted, we'll do everything we can in order to make the decision and the transition easier for you."

Boalt, which gets about 7,000 applicants a year and accepts 800 or so for 270 spaces, spent about \$31,000 on the program this year with 123 students accepting the offer.

"There are other things that one might spend money on that wouldn't be as effective," Ortiz said. "We strongly believe that if people are going to spend three years of their life in a community, they really ought to know the community."

But UK isn't able to do such recruitment because of budget limitations, UK deans say. And some say they wouldn't even if they did have the funds.

Alan Vestal, dean of UK's Law school said UK does not offer such an enticement. He said UK runs a lean administration operation, spending very little money, and does not have the funds to spend money on such an operation. Even if they did have the money they wouldn't spend it that way, he said.

"If I had additional money that could be used for admission-related activities, I'd use it for scholarships before I'd use it for such a program," he explained.

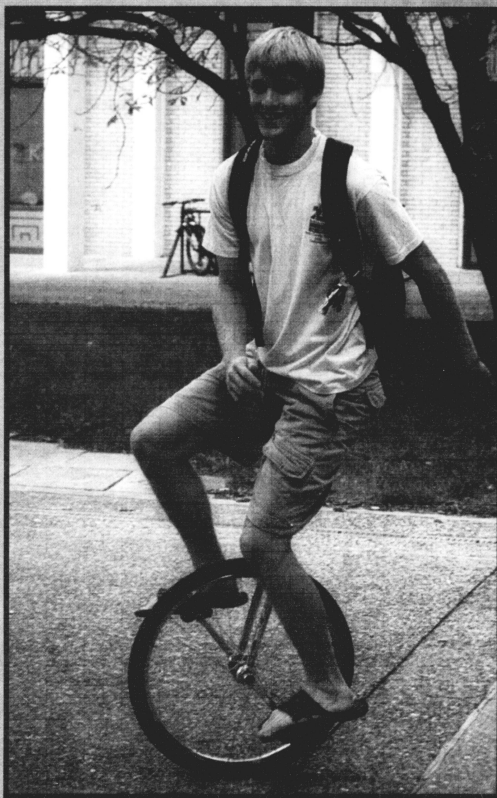
Vestal said one of the reasons he would focus on scholarships over a fly-free program is because UK's Law school already has a very high caliber of students. UK is ranked 36th for Law schools in the nation, both private and public.

Law schools aren't the only ones recruiting students — business schools have joined in.

UC-Berkeley's Haas School of Business doesn't offer free airfare, but it does ditch plain-vanilla accept-

Candidate: UK primed for change

Prospect: Wendy Baldwin says the University currently has untapped research potential

Wendy Baldwin says she can help UK achieve its goal to be a Top-20 public research university.

"I want to understand where people are, where they want to be and how I can help," Baldwin, a candidate for the UK vice president for research position, said at a public forum on campus Thursday.

Baldwin, who is one of three candidates for the vacant post, is the deputy director for extramural research at the National Institutes of Health in Bethesda, Md.

She said her experiences working with the NIH would help her at UK.

"I can draw on skills about administration and how research is built," she said.

The vice president for research helps promote and obtain funding for UK's research programs.

Baldwin said she is knowledgeable about more subjects that just clinical research.

"My experiences are in no way limited to the life sciences or biomedical research," she said.

Baldwin said teamwork is key to creating successful research.

"Getting everyone together and figuring out what they want, that's what I'm good at," she said.

Baldwin said UK has untapped potential with regards to research.

"I think UK has more capacity — whether it does grow comes from many different things," she said.

Involving undergraduate students in research should be a primary focus of the university and students are often untapped resources for researchers, she said.

"To have undergraduates who get excited about research is incredibly important," she said.

Professors agree that students should play an active role in research.

"Research should be a part of the whole education process from the time they come in until they leave with a post-doctoral degree," said Glenn Collins, the director of undergraduate studies in agriculture and biotechnology.

Baldwin said that, if chosen for the position, one of her first steps would be to talk to deans and researchers and learn about UK.

"I want to see where the university thinks their

Candidates support cultural centers

Facilities like UK's Martin Luther King, Jr. Cultural Center, located in the Student Center, may get more attention once a new mayor is elected, mayoral candidates Vice Mayor Teresa Isaac and Councilman Scott Crosbie said last Thursday.

The two squared off at a debate sponsored by African-American Lexingtonians Emerge at the Dunbar Community Center.

Among the issues discussed was possible aid given to local minority community centers, including the one at UK.

Isaac cited her experience with Lexington neighborhoods. She said she has traveled to every district in Lexington and visited the churches, grocery stores and

community centers in each district.

"Every time a vote has come up for more financial support of the centers, my vote was solid," she said.

Crosbie also said there are ways to aid local centers. He believed motivation, though, was the key.

"You have to have communication," he said. "You have to be part of the initiative. That's critical."

Other topics discussed were:

• Funding sexual abuse treatment. Since the Ron Berry scandal, in which Berry, a Lexington government youth organizer, was charged with molesting six boys, many have been questioning the government's role in aiding victims.

Pinner ranked second in the nation

Artose Pinner, a running back for the UK football team, has been ranked second in the nation in yards from the line of scrimmage, which is the sum of rushing and receiving yards. Pinner has 765 yards from scrimmage this season. The No.1 ranked football player in this category is Michael Turner of Northern Illinois, who has 802 rushing and receiving yards.

Port shutdown in its second week

LOS ANGELES — A second week of a West Coast port shutdown will cause a noticeable increase in plant closings, job losses and financial market turmoil, say analysts and business leaders who are increasingly skeptical of a quick end to the labor dispute. Already, storage facilities at beef, pork and poultry processing facilities across the country are full, crammed with produce that can't be exported. Experts have estimated the shutdown could cost the U.S. economy \$2 billion a day, and one report said a 20-day shutdown would cost \$48.6 billion. With nowhere to move their product, plant operators will begin shutting down Monday and layoffs will follow, said Mary Kay Thatcher, public policy director of the American Farm Bureau Federation.

Iraq resolution may pass soon

WASHINGTON — Congressional leaders said a resolution authorizing war against Iraq, expected to pass with little dissent, will strengthen the U.S. hand at the United Nations and increase pressure on Saddam Hussein to disarm. President Bush, after a weekend in Maine, returned to the White House and prepared to address the nation Monday night from Cincinnati. He was making the case against the Iraqi president on the one-year anniversary of the start of bombing in Afghanistan. Senate Majority Leader Tom Daschle, who has counseled caution in unilateral moves against Saddam, said he will vote for the resolution but only after trying to make it more to his liking. A leading moderate Democrat suggested Bush was winning broad Democratic support for reasons of domestic politics as well as concerns about Iraq's weapons of mass destruction. Many Democrats opposed similar legislation that authorized the Persian Gulf War waged by Bush's father in 1991, and the party is still smarting from a perception as anti-war.

Oil leak sets French tanker on fire

SAN'A, Yemen — An explosion and fire engulfed a French oil tanker on Sunday off the coast of Yemen, and the tanker owner said a small boat struck the vessel in a "deliberate attack." Yemeni officials, however, said there was no indication the tanker was attacked and that the fire was caused by an oil leak. French officials said it was still too early to say if the explosion was an act of terrorism. "We don't have enough elements to allow us to formulate a ... hypothesis which would point to a terrorist attack," French Foreign Ministry spokesman François Rivasseau said Sunday night in Paris. France will quickly send investigators to Yemen. President Jacques Chirac's office said after Chirac spoke by phone with Yemeni President Ali Abdullah Saleh. Yemen's prime minister, Abdul-Kader Bammal, formed a special committee to investigate.

Audiences hunger for Hannibal

LOS ANGELES — Hannibal the Cannibal took a smaller bite of the box office this time. "Red Dragon," Anthony Hopkins' third stab at serial killer Hannibal Lecter, debuted as the No. 1 film with \$37.5 million, a healthy return but well below the \$58 million "Hannibal" took in over opening weekend last year, according to studio estimates Sunday. Still, "Red Dragon" had the best debut ever, beating the \$28.6 million opening of "Meet the Parents" in 2000.

tance letters in favor of a personal call from an admissions director - to all 500 or so students.

This year, successful applicants to The Fuqua School of Business at Duke University got an e-mail innocuously titled "admissions status." A link in the text took the reader to a jazzy slide show with a shot of a jubilant crowd, the sound of cheering and the message "Congratulations! You've been admitted!"

The first round of recipients said "it was the coolest thing they'd ever seen," said Liz Riley, admissions director.

Walter Ferrier, assistant dean of UK's Gatton College of Business and Economics,

said that while personal calls are made to some of the more highly qualified applicants, the college does not have the staff to conduct large-scale operations of such kind.

"We don't have a budget like Duke's to spend on fancy e-mails or personal calls," he said.

Ferrier added that he wasn't sure how effective such methods actually are in enticing applicants to choose one school over another.

He said that now that he was aware that other schools were doing large-volume calls to accepted applicants, he will try next year to raise the number and intensity of calls made to applicants, and then look at the results.

"They seem like a good idea, but if they turn out to be ineffectual and expensive, then what's the point?" Ferrier said.

Arab TV airs voice said to be bin Laden

Threats: al-Jazeera broadcasts audiotape, male voice says expect more attacks on United States

CAIRO, Egypt — The Arab satellite station al-Jazeera broadcast an audiotape Sunday in which a male voice attributed to Osama bin Laden said the "youths of God" are planning more attacks against the United States.

"By God, the youths of God are preparing for you things that would fill your hearts with terror and target your economic lifeline until you stop your oppression and aggression," said the voice in the audiotape. It wasn't immediately clear when the tape was made. The short message was broadcast with a picture of bin Laden in the background.

The man on the tape said his message was addressed to the American people, whom he urged to "understand the message of the New York and Washington attacks which came in response to some of your previous crimes."

"But those who follow the activities of the band of criminals in the White House, the Jewish agents, who are preparing for an attack on the Muslim world... feel that you have not understood anything from the

message of the two attacks," he said. "So let America increase the pace of this conflict or decrease it, and we will respond in kind," he said.

The reference appeared to be to the U.S.-Iraq confrontation many believe will lead to war, which could date the tape to recent weeks.

Qatar-based al-Jazeera has become known for its broadcast of audio and videotapes of al-Qaida leaders. Last month, it aired excerpts from a videotape in which a voice said to be bin Laden's is heard naming the leaders of the 19 Sept. 11 hijackers.

Until then, bin Laden had not been heard from since shortly after the U.S.-led bombing campaign began in Afghanistan last October.

An interview al-Jazeera said one of its correspondents conducted in June with two top al-Qaida fugitives was aired to correspond with the first anniversary of the Sept. 11 attacks. Shortly afterward, U.S. officials announced one of the fugitives had been captured in Pakistan.

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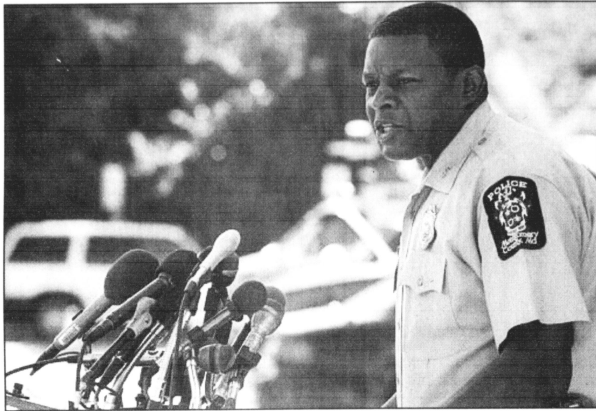

Bullets match in Virginia, Maryland shootings

ROCKVILLE, Md. — The bullet used to shoot a Virginia woman matches ammunition used to kill at least four of six victims of a sniper spree in Washington, D.C., and suburban Maryland, investigators said Saturday.

Tests conducted by the Bureau of Alcohol, Tobacco and Firearms confirmed that the same weapon was used in five of the random shootings over the past three days in Montgomery County Md., and Washington. Tests were still under way to find any links to two additional shootings in Maryland.

“The round that we collected there is in fact a match to the rounds that were used here in Maryland and also in D.C.,” said Maj. Howard Smith, of the Spotsylvania County, Va., sheriff's office.

The 43-year-old Spotsylvania woman was shot in the back in a parking lot at a craft store in Fredericksburg, Va., about 55 miles south of Rockville, at about

2:30 p.m. Friday. No arrests had been made in the scattered shootings that began Wednesday. Authorities were talking to one man late Saturday afternoon, but they stressed that he was not a suspect and no weapons were found with him.

In the Washington suburbs where the killings occurred, police still encouraged residents to go about their normal lives and enjoy their weekend.

Authorities said late Friday that .223-caliber bullets used to kill four of the victims came from the same weapon, perhaps a hunting or assault rifle.

But the bullets used in the two other killings “are in very poor shape,” Moose said. “We may not be able to link them.”

The Virginia victim was hospitalized in serious condition Saturday at INOVA Fairfax Hospital, officials said.

The five victims in the Washington suburbs were gunned down in broad day-

light in public places during a 16-hour span Wednesday evening and Thursday morning: two at gas stations, one outside a grocery, another outside a post office and the fifth as he mowed the grass at an auto dealership.

Thursday night, a 72-year-old pedestrian in Washington was shot to death as he stood on a street corner.

Each victim was shot once from a distance. There were no known witnesses to the killings. Montgomery County police said about 100 of its investigators were following up on about 600 credible tips. They were working with federal law enforcement to search for two suspects they believe fled in a white box truck with black lettering on the side.

Moose said late Saturday afternoon that a 33-year-old Rockville, Md., man who had been listed as missing and who police wanted to talk to about the case was in custody in Fairfax, Va., on an outstanding auto theft warrant from Florida.

“We’re having conversations with the gentleman at this time,” Moose said. He stressed that the man was not a suspect.

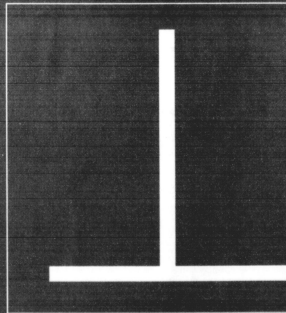

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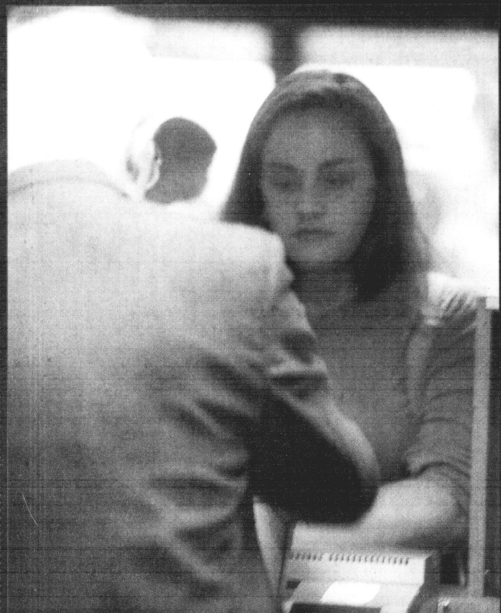

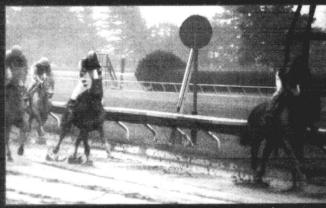
The sight of old men scribbling away on race cards, parents watching their young children cheer at the start of every race and thousands of elegantly dressed adults, mixed with the strong scents of cigar smoke and hot dogs seemed to lure people in like no written invitation.

In fact, 10,600 diehard Keeneland fans proved that neither rain nor strong winds would keep them away from opening day of the fall meet this past Friday.

For many attendees, the strong tradition of Keeneland served as the main draw.

"It's an old tradition, where students have a chance to mingle with the community," said Matt Bowling, a pre-med senior.

Bowling said Keeneland is an all-day

event for him and his Kappa Sigma fraternity brothers.

He said they start tailgating before the races, and everyone brings a date and wears business attire to gain entrance to the clubhouse, where they go after the races are over.

Wes Fleming, a fourth-year dental student and regular at the track, said he not only loves Keeneland, but also credits it for helping him make an important school decision.

After finishing four years at Western Kentucky University, Fleming said the track's proximity to UK influenced him to come to Lexington for dental school.

Another of Keeneland's traditions is betting.

Keeneland's on-track winnings Friday were \$1.6 million, plus another \$6.6 million in off-track payoffs.

Sociology senior Carissa Curry said she won \$26.

"At the start of October, when you go to UK, you think of football and Keeneland," she said.

"What other state has that?"

Howard McKenzie, manager of guest services at Keeneland, said the staff tries to please spectators,

but can't guarantee they'll win big money.

"It's our job to see that you have a seamless experience from the time you pull in the gate until the time you leave," he said.

"losses notwithstanding," Keeneland has 170 employees on its guest services staff, and their jobs range from making seat and dining room reservations, to operating elevators, to answering questions attendees have.

These are the employees wearing navy blue or green blazers, greeting people at the gates all day, always smiling in spite of Friday's hard rain and cold wind.

Tom Barnes has been with Keeneland for 12 years. He said he loves to meet people and there is never a dull moment in his job.

His brother Jud, who also works at Keeneland, described Barnes as "well behaved" and "a cut above general people."

Jud Barnes said people frequently ask him for betting tips.

He said he has a pat answer for all of them.

"It's usually better for the front end of the horse to go past finish line first," he said.

MONDAY

The European Union gave its 15 member states the authority to negotiate specific agreements with the United States, which would hold that these countries would not have to turn over Americans to the new international war crimes tribunal, Reuters reported.
 EU foreign ministers approved a set of guidelines that will apply to U.S. soldiers and officials sent overseas. As part of the agreement, the individuals must be tried by U.S. courts.

WEDNESDAY

Richard Colvin Reid, the man accused of attempting to blow up a trans-Atlantic flight with explosives in his shoes, filed a motion saying he will plead guilty to all charges against him, the Lexington Herald-Leader reported.
 Reid was scheduled to be tried Nov. 4 on several charges, including attempted murder and attempted use of a weapon of mass destruction. Federal prosecutors said the plea was unexpected.
 Justice Department officials aid the motion did not involve any plea deal, and that Reid still faces a potential life sentence.
 Reid had attempted to blow up Paris-to-Miami flight Dec. 22.

THURSDAY

A series of seemingly random sniper shootings began in Montgomery County, Md., the Washington Post reported.
 Five people were shot Thursday morning in Montgomery, a suburban county directly north of Washington, D.C. A sixth shooting occurred Thursday on the corner of Georgia Avenue NW in Washington.

A seventh shooting occurred Friday in Spotsylvania, Va., a largely rural community about 50 miles south of Washington.
 Montgomery officials said forensic evidence linked the Spotsylvania shooting to those in Montgomery and Washington, meaning that five of the seven shootings, in which four people were killed, have been attributed to a single .223-caliber rifle.

Police questioned a Rockville, Md., man Saturday, but officials said they had all but ruled out the possibility that he had carried out the shootings.

UK received a \$22 million grant from the National Sciences Foundation, making it the largest grant in the University's history, the Kernel reported.

The five-year grant is intended to improve math and science education in the 52 school district in the Central Appalachian region, many of them in Kentucky.

UK President Lee Todd said the grant epitomizes the "higher purpose" that UK serves as a public university in Kentucky.

FRIDAY

Five people, four of whom were American citizens, were charged with trying to join al-Qaida and Taliban forces in Afghanistan after the Sept. 11 attacks, the Lexington Herald-Leader reported.

A sixth person was charged with wiring the group money.

Three were arrested in Portland Friday morning and a fourth in Detroit. The two others remain at large overseas.

All could face life in prison if convicted.
 U.S. Attorney General John Ashcroft did not say whether the United States knew the whereabouts of two at large suspects.

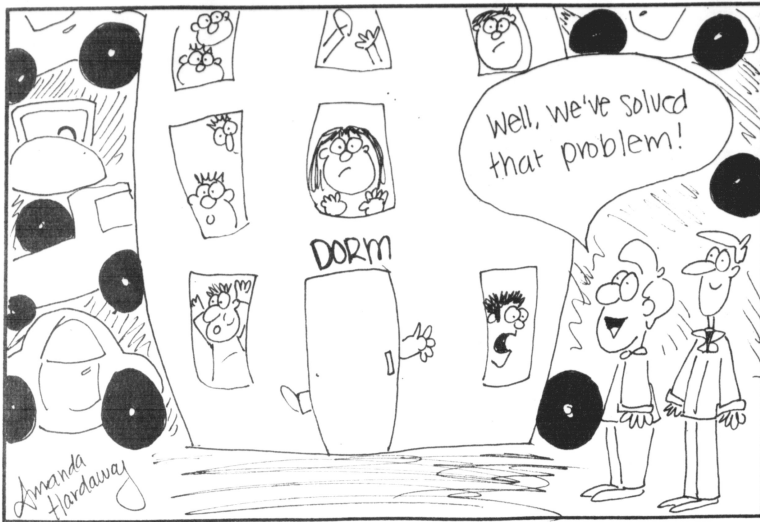

MGM's refusal to edit film the right move

MGM has spoken. There will be no cuts to the "Barbershop" film starring Cedric the Entertainer and Ice Cube.

The Revs. Jesse Jackson and Al Sharpton have publicly requested that certain scenes in the movie in which a character makes jokes about the achievements of civil rights icons Rosa Parks and Martin Luther King, Jr. be cut from the movie.

The film is centered around a neighborhood barbershop on the South Side of Chicago notorious for the straight talk of its clientele.

In a single two-minute Barbershop scene, Eddie — played by Cedric the Entertainer — delivers barbs aimed at numerous civil rights leaders. Eddie wisecracks that being the first black person to refuse to ride on the back of the bus did not make Rosa Parks "special," just "tired." Over the objections of the regulars and customers in the barbershop, Eddie goes on to state that O.J. Simpson "did it," and that Rodney King got what he deserved. He also aims a dig or two at Jackson and briefly mentions Dr. King's extramarital affairs.

The brief scene has caused quite a bit of controversy. Sharpton and Jackson are adamant that the scenes be cut from future DVD and video releases of

the film. Sharpton has threatened to begin a boycott of the film, which was a surprise hit for MGM, reaching the top spot at the box office.

Martin Luther King Jr.'s daughter, Rev. Bernice A. King, has told the press that she finds the jokes disrespectful, and views them as a personal affront. Jackson said he had spoken to the Parks' family and that they also felt personally offended by the jokes.

MGM has issued an apology for the jokes, but says it has no plans to eliminate the scenes. And it shouldn't. Jackson and Sharpton have every right to request that the jokes be cut, but MGM also has every right to deny that request. As public figures, Parks and King are fair game for public criticism. This is true of all public figures. It's why Will Ferrell can imitate George W. Bush every week on Saturday Night Live, and it's why every late-night talk show host is perfectly free to make any number of jokes about Bill Clinton and his infamous Monica Lewinsky scandal.

A film is the culmination of the artistic vision of the filmmaker. It is going too far to ask a filmmaker to change that vision because people are offended.

Hospital staff treated second-class by UK

When it comes to touting its achievements, UK is quick to include the hospital as part of the campus community. Of course, with a level-one trauma center, award-winning nurses and an excellent and experienced staff, who can blame them?

Indeed, with more and more Kentucky students opting for out-of-state colleges, our medical and nursing programs continue to attract the best students and retain their talents for the University.

Somehow, though, when budgets are being figured and re-figured, the link between the school and the medical center breaks down, and as a result, many of UK's most valuable employees are treated as second-class.

This year, for the first time, it was announced that UK employees will be receiving an additional paid holiday on the day after Thanksgiving, reputedly the busiest

shopping day of the season.

Then, there was the second e-mail, the one that wasn't covered in the Kernel. This exercise in clumsy about-face was from the hospital director. Pleading poverty, he announced that hospital employees, who are still the "valuable employees" UK touts in its ads, will not be given the day off.

There rationale was simple: UK and its hospital operate as different institutions, and as an institution the hospital was unable to pay for the extra day.

Sometime over the summer, that attitude, and the bottom line, changed. In the space of six weeks, the hospital raked in almost \$6 million of profit, more than ample money to pay for the day off with cash to spare.

The sun must have been shining mighty hard on south campus last week, and as fair-weather friends tend to do, UK came to collect from the hospital.

That amount was \$6 million, but that doesn't begin to tell of the good it would have done the hospital. From furthering the construction on Rose Street to adequately staffing the annexes it has, the hospital would have no trouble at all finding ways to constructively re-invest that wealth.

The money UK hospital "gave back" to the university is a shame. It was enough to

fund that extra holiday, but it's about more than a shopping day to the employees who staff the medical center day and night.

It's about being recognized as an equal member of UK's community, being accepted on par with the academicians, teachers, resident advisers and other university employees.

It's about Lee Todd accepting not just the hospital's accomplishments, but its needs. And more important, it's about treating hospital employees like the first-class professionals that they are.

I know I work with them every day, and I challenge anyone to find a harder working staff on our campus. The nurses, techs, housekeepers, maintenance guys and even humble clerks like me are what make a trauma center like UK's successful.

The poverty excuse worked when we were losing money, but this time, UK ought to do the right thing and give its employees equal benefits for equal work.

We work hard for the University, and the University ought to recognize the hospital staff's contributions to UK by granting us the day after Thanksgiving holiday.

Cats shutout Gators for first time

The UK women's soccer team defeated the Florida Gators for first time ever, 3-0, Sunday.

In the game's opening minutes Florida showed why it has been so tough to beat, holding the majority of possession and frustrating UK. UK had few good opportunities to score until the Cats were awarded a free kick in the 21st minute, but Kara McCue's service was easily intercepted by Florida goalkeeper Jordan Kellgren. One minute later Florida almost took the lead when forward Robin Fulton dribbled past UK keeper Liz Butler. Fulton's shooting angle was too acute, however, and the Cats were given a life line.

UK broke through in the 29th minute when Jen Wilkinson played a perfect through ball to Elizabeth Ramsey. Ramsey's shot found the inside of the left post and the Cats led 1-0. The goal was Ramsey's fifth of the season. "It's just great to beat Florida finally. This is a big accomplishment for us," she said after the match.

With the pressure now on Florida, UK was able to maintain better possession the rest of the half. Florida's best chance to equalize came when Kelly Viscontini shot from long range in the 38th minute. Butler did well to parry the

shot out for a corner.

"It was great team defense today," she said. "It started with our forwards and was continued on back."

An inspired UK side came out for the second half. A few minutes in, however, the game was delayed momentarily as the referee decided to deal with a small number of boisterous supporters behind Florida's goal.

Down two goals, Florida desperately tried to get on the board. Fulton was able to threaten again but Butler produced a great diving save.

Playing with confidence, UK looked to add to its lead and at times had all 10 field players in their attacking half.

In the 66th minute Kathy Fulk played a ball through. Christal Mattingly buried the shot, and the Gators along with it, for the historic victory.

"I've always challenged my players to do things better and achieve more," said UK Coach Warren Lipka. "Maybe this is a step toward that."
