Blair Smith doesn't remember any of the Sept. 27 assault that resulted in him being taken to the hospital with brain injuries, his father said.

Lexington Police found Smith critically injured on the 500 block of Euclid Avenue in the early morning hours of Sept. 27 after he was struck over the head with a bottle. Smith was taken by ambulance to the UK Hospital. As of 8 p.m. Sunday, Smith was in fair condition, according to the hospital.

Smith's recovery since the incident has been "a miracle," his father, John Smith, said.

"He had two brain surgeries last Sunday, and he's already up and taking short walks," John Smith said Sunday, night. "He took a shower this morning. He's cognizant. How the state of the sta

John Smith said he has no plans on attending the Monday arraignment.

John Smith said that while his son's accident is fresh and painful in his mind, he feels bad for the parents of whoever committed the crime.

Student organizations used Voter Madness to register as many people as possible, said Ioe Gallenstein, president of the UK College Democrats and a participant in the event.



"Without those two plays. I think we had a legitimate shot at them," UK head coach Rich Brooks said in reference to Hartline's and Coffee's fumbles. "They made those plays, we didn't make those kind of plays."

And that's the difference between UK and Alabama right now. Alabama knows how to wim. UK is still learning. While the Cats got plenty of experience in the area of winning football games last year, beating the likes of then-No. 1 Louisiana State and then-No. 9 Louisville, this is a new team full of young and inexperienced players. They'll have to go through the same learning process that Andre Woodson and Co. had to go through a freshmen and sophomores.

Alabama had to do the same thing last year as the Crimson Tide melded with new head coach Nick Saban. The Tide went through its ups and downs and eventually finished 7-6. Now, Alabama is the class of the Southeastern

Conference and arguably the best team in the nation.

"We have to get the ground game going. We have to run the football," Hartline said. "We just have to get more solid up front (with) protection. We re still not catching the ball. We have to do that too."
