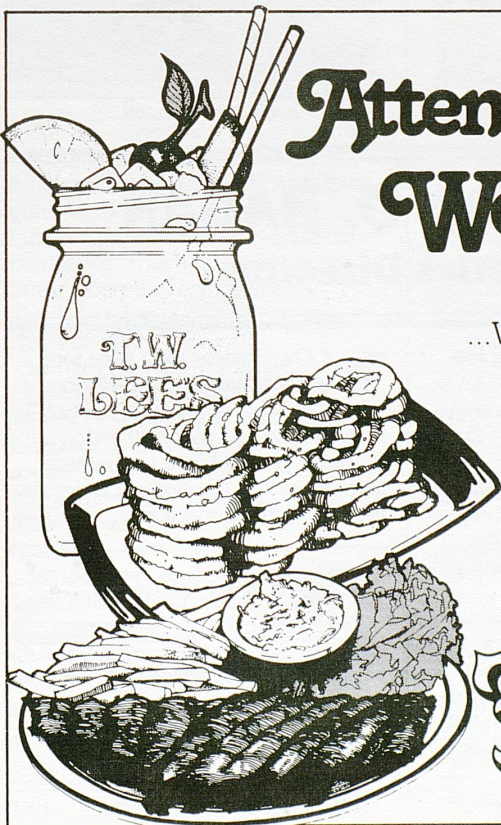
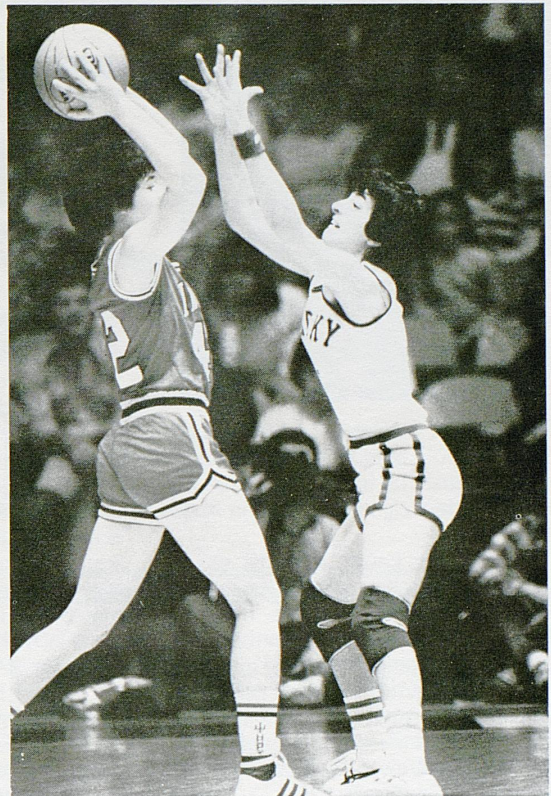

DR. OTIS A. SINGLETARY

President, University of Kentucky

Dr. Otis A. Singletary has maintained an active role both in academics and athletics since he became the University of Kentucky's eighth president in August 1969.

Great strides toward academic excellence have characterized Dr. Singletary's presidency at UK. The Schools of Dentistry and Pharmacy consistently rank among the best in the nation. Departments such as political science, history, and mathematics have also gained nationwide attention while the UK Library now rates among the best in the Southeast.

Under Singletary's leadership, the University of Kentucky has also become a major research institution. The Albert B. Chandler Medical Center is an established leader in research on cancer and the aging. UK's agricultural college

has provided important research in tobacco and equine diseases while other University research has focused on the field of coal and other energy sources.

Singletary's involvement in athletics is as impressive as his academic achievements. A former president of the Southeastern Conference, Dr. Singletary is a member of the NCAA Select Committee on Athletic Problems and Concerns in Higher Education. He is also chairman of the board of directors of the College Football Association.

As president of the principal institution of higher learning in the Commonwealth, Dr. Singletary is greatly concerned with the University's role as a land grant institution, a "people's university" accessible to all who can profit from education.

In the 13 years Singletary has been president, the University of Kentucky has grown in enrollment to about 23,000

students on its Lexington campus and more than 22,000 students in the University's 13 community colleges.

Recognition of his service to the University of Kentucky was evidenced by the UK Alumni Association which presented to Dr. Singletary its Alumni Service Award, an honor rarely bestowed upon a non-alumnus of the University.

A native of Gulfport, Miss., Singletary holds degrees from Millsaps College and Louisiana State University. An accomplished administrator, Dr. Singletary served as chancellor of the University of North Carolina at Greensboro and was executive vice chancellor for academic affairs for the University of Texas system prior to coming to Kentucky.

He and Mrs. Singletary, the former Gloria Walton, have three children: Bonnie, Scot, and Kendall.

the 1984 NCAA Basketball Championships. In 1985, the prestigious NCAA "Final Four" basketball championships will be hosted by UK and held in Rupp Arena.

Having graduated from the University of Kentucky with high distinction in 1954, Hagan has been a long-time advocate of a strong scholar-athlete program.

Hagan, one of the greatest players in UK basketball history, received one of his highest individual honors in 1978 when he became the first University of Kentucky player to be inducted in the Naismith Memorial Basketball Hall of Fame in Springfield, Mass.

An Owensboro, Ky. native, Hagan is married to the former Martha Milton,

also of Owensboro. They have four children: Mrs. Barry "Lisa" Thaxton of Lexington; Mrs. Jim "Laurie" Hill of West Liberty; Amy, a senior at the University of Alabama; and Kip, a sophomore member of the Transylvania University basketball and tennis teams.

When Terry Hall arrived at Kentucky in 1980, the Lady Kats were coming off their most successful season ever and beginning to gain national respect. They had been ranked in the Top 20 throughout the 1979-80 season and had finished the year with a 24-5 record and a berth in the AIAW National playoffs.



But the season was just a hint of the great things to come under Hall's guidance. The Lady Kats have gone far beyond respectability and into the perennial role of national contender. They have been ranked in the Top 20 every week and averaged 24 wins per season since Hall's arrival.

In her first year at UK, Hall's Lady Kats went 25-6, winning the Kentucky Women's Intercollegiate Conference and reaching the final round of 16 in the AIAW National tournament. Hall was named the KWIC Coach of the Year that season.

In 1982 and again last season the Lady Kats were considered among the top contenders for the NCAA championship. The 1981-82 squad won the Southeastern Conference championship and reached the quarter-finals of NCAA play before losing to eventual national champion Louisiana Tech on the Lady Techsters' home floor. Last year's Lady Kats were ranked fourth

in the nation but fell to Indiana in the first round of the NCAA tournament.

Hall's record at Kentucky is 72-19, and considering Kentucky's tough scheduling habits (10 games with ranked opponents last season AND this season), a .791 winning percentage is outstanding. Her career record is 165-79. That mark includes one season at Eastern Kentucky, five at Louisville and three at Kentucky.

Hall began her coaching career in the high school ranks. Following her graduation from Indiana State in 1966, she was named head coach at Butler High School in Louisville. In five seasons at Butler, Hall coached her teams to two Jefferson County titles and an overall record of 69-33.

Then it was on to Eastern Kentucky University, where Hall earned her Master's Degree in 1974 and was immediately named head basketball coach. The Lady Colonels went 14-6 that season and won the KWIC title over Kentucky, Louisville, Western, Morehead, Murray and Northern Kentucky.

Hall then accepted the coaching job at Louisville, where she was faced with rebuilding a program. She succeeded, guiding the Lady Cards to a 79-54 record over five years. In 1979-80, her last season at U of L, the Lady Cards won their first Metro Conference championship. Hall also coached tennis and softball at U of L.

A native of Salem, Ind., Hall earned both her undergraduate and graduate degrees in Health and P.E. While attending Indiana State, she starred in basketball, field hockey and volleyball. She was honored with the "T" Woman Award in 1965, and received the prestigious Hillman Award in 1966 as the most outstanding female athlete at ISU.

Coach Hall on Kentucky's Style of Play: "Our style of play, or trademark, is the fast break. We believe that applying immediate pressure on the defensive team is one of the best ways to win a basketball game. Kentucky is one of few teams in the country totally dedicated to fast break basketball. Defensively, we play whatever defense we feel will exploit our opponents' weaknesses. Our main concerns are controlling the tempo of the game, teamwork, and shot selection by our players."

Coach Hall on Working With the Players: "I place a high premium on hard work and dedication to the task at hand. I want my players to feel the same way. I try to teach them that "doors of opportunity" open and close very quickly in life as well as on the basketball court. So always be prepared. In the span of a lifetime, their 4 years of college basketball is short, therefore they should work hard, be dedicated, excel, and enjoy the opportunity that exists."



Mike Kindred

**Assistant Coach
Eastern Kentucky University, 1980**

Mike was hired as a part-time assistant at UK in July, and then was elevated to full-time assistant in late September following the resignation of assistant coach Dottie Berry. A 1980 graduate of Eastern Kentucky, Mike served for two seasons as assistant girls' basketball coach at Estill County High School in Irvine, Ky., before coming to UK.

A native of Winchester, Ky., Mike graduated from Clark County High School in 1975. He then attended Morehead State University for one year before transferring to Eastern. He received a degree in Industrial Education, and then taught at Clark County for one year before accepting a job at Estill County.

In his first season at Estill, Mike helped direct the varsity squad to its first-ever winning season in 1982. The following year, the Lady Engineers won their first district championship. Mike's junior varsity squad, meanwhile, was doing even better, finishing with a 15-4 record in 1982 and a 19-4 record in 1983.

Mike is very active in the Big Brothers-Big Sisters program, and currently sits on the organization's Advisory Board in Winchester. He is also an active member of the Fellowship of Christian Athletes, and was the FCA's 10th Region representative last year while coaching at Estill County.

Joining the coaching staff at UK fulfills a life-time dream for Mike, a 26-year old bachelor who has always been a "Big Blue" fan.

A former player for Coach Terry Hall at Louisville, Robin joined the Lady Kat staff in September. While at Louisville, Robin lettered in basketball four consecutive years, two of those seasons with Coach Hall at the helm. She was a member of the Lady Card teams that won Metro Conference titles in 1979 and 1981 and is in the record book for best free throw percentage in a season, which she set in 1979. Robin was also an outstanding high school player at Louisville Butler High. She helped her team to the Girls' State Tournament in 1976 and 1978. She was All-State honorable mention for three straight years and played in the East-West All-Star game in 1978. She also played tennis for three seasons and ran track one year at Butler.

Robin is pursuing a Masters Degree in Recreational Therapy at UK. She has a great interest in young people and has participated as a volunteer for Special Olympics for five straight years. She also is credited with starting two Youth Basketball Camps in 1981 and 1982 at the St. Matthews YMCA in Louisville.

A former collegiate softball player at U of L, Robin has umpired softball and officiated basketball and volleyball. She is 23 years old and single.

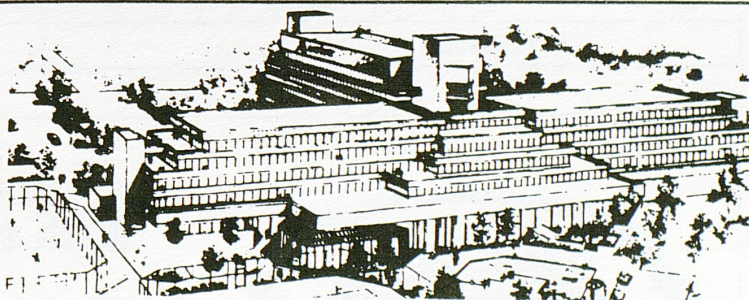

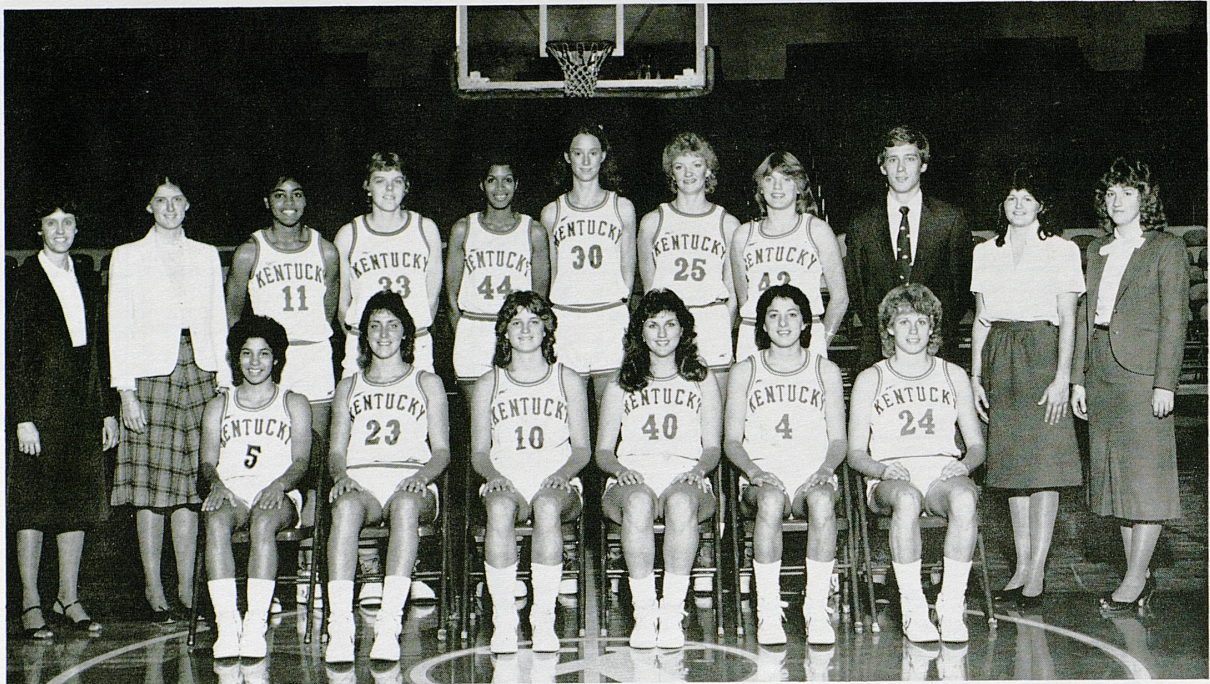

LADY KATS TO FACE TOUGH LADY REBELS

Records: Kentucky 9-9
Mississippi 17-2

Series: Mississippi leads 1-0

There is no rest for the weary Lady Kats. In the last 10 days, Terry Hall's thin troupes have struggled through five games, losing three to ranked teams. Now, with starting guard/forward Lisa Collins doubtful for tonight's contest, the Lady Kats face what may be the best team they'll see all season — No. 5 Mississippi.

The Lady Rebs, boasting perhaps the biggest front line in the country, bring a 17-2 record and a seven-game winning streak into the contest. Their two losses were to 12th-ranked Cheyney State (76-81) and 10th-ranked Auburn (49-58) last month. But since, Ole Miss has been on a roll, and last week avenged the loss to Auburn 46-45 in Oxford.

Mississippi starts three forwards in its imposing lineup. Center Eugenia Conner, who may be the best in the Southeastern Conference, is a 6-2 junior who averages 15.5 points and 8.8 rebounds per game. Jennifer Gillom, a 6-3 forward, leads the team in scoring (18.6) and rebounding (9.7). Marilyn Brooks, 6-2, adds 12 points and 8.4 rebounds while the third forward, 5-9 Alisa Scott, contributes 11.3 points and 5.3 rebounds.

The only time the two teams have previously met was on Feb. 6, 1980, when Mississippi rolled to a 79-62 win in the semifinal round of the

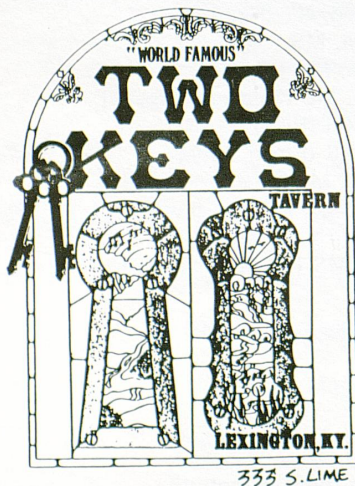

Southeastern Conference tournament.

Kentucky's Leslie Nichols is coming off a career-high 34-point performance against New Orleans in the Lady Kats' 85-68 win Monday night. Nichols also had nine rebounds. Karen Mosley, who hit seven of nine shots against Old Dominion last weekend, continued to play well against New Orleans, firing in eight of 11 shots and hitting all five free throws for 21 points. She also grabbed 11 rebounds as she started for the first time in several games.

The road doesn't get any easier for Kentucky, as the Lady Kats depart for Florida tomorrow for a game against the Lady Gators Friday night. On the way back from Gainesville, Kentucky stops over in Athens, Ga., Sunday, to take on the fourth-ranked Georgia Lady Bulldogs. Both Florida and Georgia beat Kentucky at home earlier in the season.

LEWIS FIGHTING INJURY-RIDDEN CAREER

From the very start of her career as a Lady Kat, Lynnette Lewis has been plagued with a knee injury she suffered during the summer after her freshman year at UK. Though the injury has slowed her progress somewhat, she remains a strong-willed competitor and contributes to the team in many ways. Her enduring spirit as a Christian has put her among the favorites of Lady Kats in recent years.

After her graduation from Cawood High School in 1980, Lewis passed up several scholarship offers to come to UK as a walkon. But after her knee injury the following summer, she reinjured the knee in the fall of her sophomore year, requiring surgery and forcing her to miss the entire season. "It gave me a lot of trouble," said the 5-9 senior. "I had a hard time rehabilitating it. Now I wear a brace to keep from reinjuring it."

Last year, Lewis came back as a junior, but was still showing signs of the injury, playing in only 12 games. But this year was going to be different. At least until she contracted mononucleosis in mid-December, which has caused her to miss seven of the team's 18 games.

"The mononucleosis set me back even further," Lewis said. "I was out for five weeks and it was a really hard time for me to go through. I was sitting there on the bench feeling really helpless. I couldn't do anything to help my teammates, and yet I didn't want to bring my problems on them because they were going through a hard time, themselves. They were losing a lot of games by close margins, and their team morale was hard to keep up."

During that span, the Lady Kats lost five of those seven games up to her return on January 17 for the team's game with Rutgers. So far this year, Lewis has played in four games for a little over 12 minutes of total playing time and connected on two of four shots. But her real contributions have come off the floor as a team leader.

"This year, I have tried to be a leader in all aspects of the team, both spiritually and morally, and give them support when they needed it," she said. So far, her support has been strong enough to earn her the responsibility of co-captain, along with senior Lisa Collins. Both were elected by the squad.

Lewis said her Christian faith has enabled her to cope with the knee injury as well as other personal problems she may face and has enjoyed her involvement with the Fellowship of Christian Athletes while at UK. "I've really benefitted from my involvement with FCA; We have a really good program here and fine Christian people associated with it. I've made a lot of friends, and it's really helped me, especially this year.

"As a Christian, I just turn my problems over to God because that's what he's for," she continued. "Why believe in something that you can't turn to and give your problems to? That's what he wants you to do, so I just try to encourage the other players to do the same."

Lewis, a native of Loyall, Ky., earned All-State honorable



mention at Cawood and has an outstanding shooting ability. She had her own ideas about the success of this year's team: "I thought all along that we were going to lose some games because we're young, but we have the talent and capability of being a good team in March. I don't think we have had a bad season by any means because we've grown closer together as a team and formed closer bonds between us. We didn't want to get down on each other or get discouraged.

"Basketball is just a game that we're playing for fun," Lewis continued. "It's the personal relationships that are more meaningful. Close friendships will last a long time, whereas a basketball game will only last 40 minutes."

After Lewis completes her degree in Elementary Education, she plans to continue by working toward a Master's degree in Guidance Counseling. Her advice to younger players is to keep a handle on personal identity: "College basketball can be as big or small as you make it and really go to your head. But after four years, you're just going to be a regular person again, so you have to make the most out of the time that you have."

In her final season as a Lady Kat, Lewis has positive words for the remainder of the '84 schedule by saying her team had recovered from the slump it suffered in early January. "I think we'll be ready for the tournaments. Everybody is playing well now, and we're starting to gel. It's going to take some time - with a young team, it always is - and I'm pleased with it."

WILDCAT TENNIS TEAM LOOKING GOOD SO FAR

After completing a very successful 5-1 fall season against some of the nation's elite, the University of Kentucky men's tennis team has continued its winning ways so far this spring and may be headed for a second consecutive post-season tournament appearance.

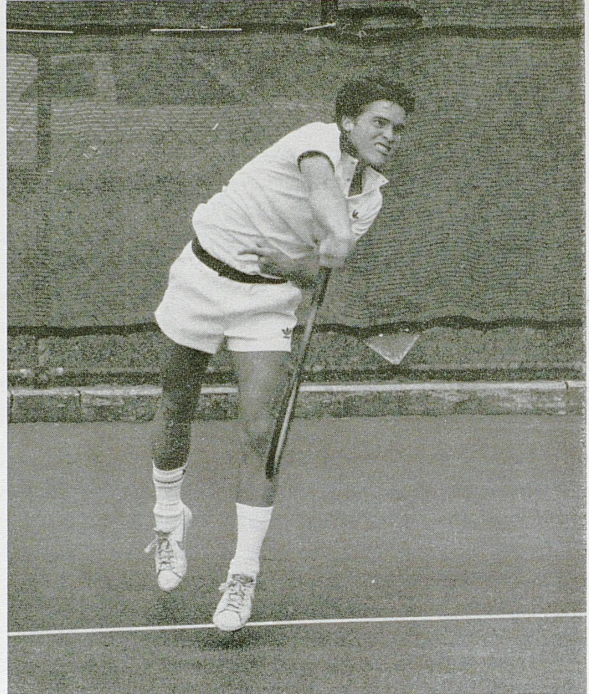
The Wildcats, who were finalists in last year's National Invitational Tournament, are coming off of their best-ever showing in the SEC indoor championships. Led by the No. 1 doubles team of Paul Varga and Pat McGee,, UK finished sixth in the event behind four teams ranked in the nation's top 15. One of those teams, Tennessee finished only one point ahead of the Cats in the final tally.

Kentucky placed three finalists in the flighted tournament, including Varga and McGee, who upset the eighth-ranked doubles team in the country, Alabama's Stefan Olsson and Hans Carlson, before falling to the nation's top doubles team, Georgia's Allen Miller and Michael Ternfors, in the finals. Additionally, UK's Mark Bailey reached the finals of No. 5 singles before dropping a tough three-setter to Phillip Johnson of Georgia, and teammate David Keevins lost in the finals of No. 6 singles to Tennessee's Eric Voughes. Moreover, Varga reached the consolation final of No. 1 singles before losing a close match to Neal Stapp of Ole Miss.

Certainly UK coach Dennis Emery has been pleased with his young team's accomplishments. Only one week earlier, the Wildcats, who feature only one senior (Andy Jackson) in thier top 10, lost a heartbreaking 5-4 match to 12th-ranked Alabama after having several opportunities to clinch a victory.

Despite the loss, Emery realizes the advantages of playing top teams.

"Our philosophy is you simply must play the top competition if you want to do well nationally, and we have made this commitment," Emery said.



Indeed, Kentucky has made that commitment. After having already faced Clemson, Alabama, and SIU-Edwardsville, the Wildcats can look forward to more highly-ranked teams, including Miami, Southern Methodist University, Texas Christian, Pepperdine and Southern California, in addition to the always tough SEC schedule.

Considering that last year's team received the NIT bid based on its fine record and the strength of its schedule, Kentucky could be looking at another very good year.

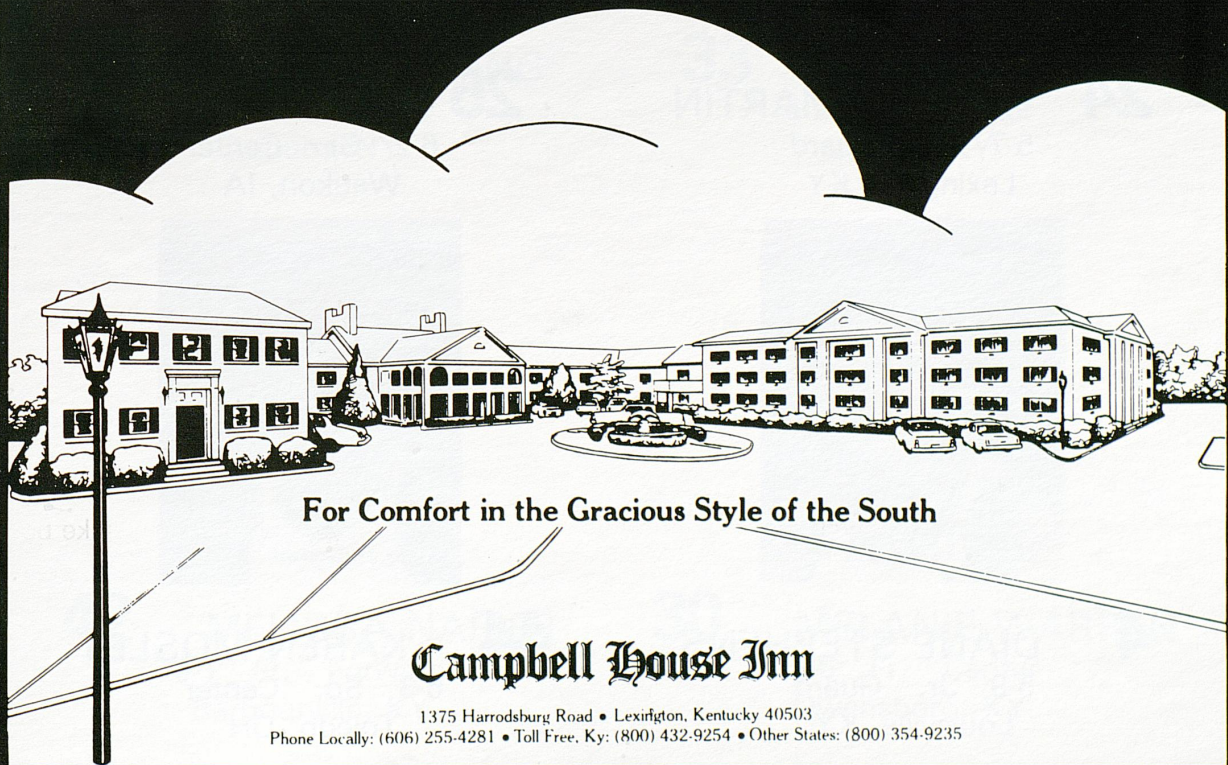

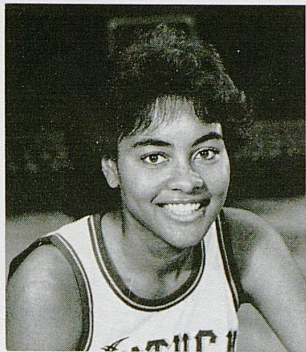

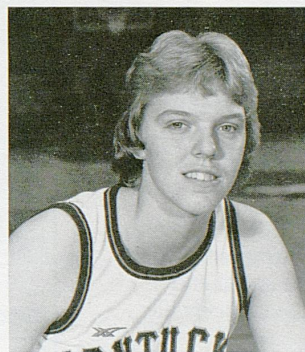

Opportunities for UK students are not limited to the academic world. Involvement in the social and cultural aspects of University life also is important.

Recognizing this, the University provides the widest range of opportunities for personal and social development.
