





WOMEN'S NEWS

The following is a continuation of an excerpt from <u>Our Right</u> to <u>Love</u>, <u>a Lesbian Resource Book</u>, which was produced in cooperation with women of the National Gay Task Force. The book was published in 1978 and is now out of print.

WOMAN TO WOMAN: LESBIAN INTIMACY

... The difference in "blind spot" between two women living together and two men doing the same is quite interesting. In the case of two men, everyone seems capable of imagining what they can do together, even if it is the "love that dare not speak its name." With women, all aspects of the relationship are granted as acceptable except any sexual dynamic, which is either unimaginable or unthinkable. Women are almost expected to be intimate emotionally with each other. It is a well-recognized fact that communication is different between two women, a woman and a man, and between two men. A rather amusing illustration was provided by the early attempts to form all-male CR groups using the model of the CR groups that have been so helpful to many women. In one case the men were told that they could talk about anything except business, sports, cars, politics, and religion. There was silence for ten minutes! Women are far more used to discussing feelings with each other than men are. As a result, it is scarcely surprising that society has recognized that two women are very capable of giving each other emotional support. After all, women have been defined almost exclusively as emotional. To carry the point a bit further, since men are given less credit for being able to give each other such support, it is hardly surprising that straight people's minds wander to other topics when two men live together. The difference is easily demonstrated: most communities two women can walk down the street holding hands and few people will notice. If two men do it, they may be arrested for inciting a riot!

AIDS UPDATE

HOW MANY MEN HAVE YOU HAD SEX WITH IN THE LAST TEN YEARS?

At present, 17 per cent of all people being tested for the HIV virus are turning up positive. This figure holds true not only in large cities with the highest number of AIDS cases, but also right here at home in Lexington, KY. Yep, Aunty Em. Right in our own back yard. That means that one out of every six people in Lexington who have taken the HIV test have been exposed to the virus. It also means that chances are very high that anyone who has had sex with six or more gay men or intravenous drug users since the late 1970's has been exposed to the AIDS virus.

Pretty scary, isn't it? But anyone who consistently has Safe Sex, or is careful not to use other's hypodermic needles, stands a much, much better chance of not being exposed to the virus. Think about it - for your life's sake. Please be careful! We gay people are, truthfully, about all we've got. We need each other now more than ever.

THE NEXT GOVERNOR AND AIDS

On May 7th the Lexington Herald Leader reported the response of each gubernatorial candidate to the question, "Should the state keep a list of all people who are carriers of the acquired immune deficiency syndrome virus if it remains confidential?" They answered:

As we prepared this issue for press we didn't know the outcome of the May primary, but the results are now in. Who won, and how does his answer to this question compare to your personal opinion?

Johnson:

We all know AIDS is a question of life and death. You should expect it to become an increasingly important political issue because of the magnitude of the problem, and because of the fear it generates.

CONSUMER'S GUIDE TO CONDOMS

Ever wonder what the "experts" say about condoms? Well, according to Clark Taylor and Jim Garner, these are the best, along with their "vital statistics."

In "Lubed" category, the Sheik condom was recommended. The Sheik condom has a width of 2.13" and length of 8" with a reservoir end. It's color is opaque and it's known for being strong, stretchy, and inexpensive.

Among Non-lubed condoms, Taylor and Wilson recommend the Gold Circle (not the

department store!) condom. The Gold Circle condom has a width of 1.9" and a length of 7.5" with rippled sides and a reservoir end. It's color is clear and is thin with no smell or taste. This condom was distributed at The Bar by ACT-Lexington during Valentine's Day Weekend.

Whichever condom you choose, remember what the United States Surgeon General says (much to the dismay of many in the Reagan cabinet), "next to abstinence the best protection against AIDS is the use of a condom." Happy shopping!

We must work to help ourselves as well. We must set examples that all people would be proud to follow. To do this we must take pride in who we are as a group and individually.

There are any number of ways to do Whether it be working in one of this town's organizations, or financially supporting civil rights' causes, or perhaps most effectively, saying, "I'm gay and I'm glad it's a part of me," or "I'm a lesbian and I'm proud that's the way I was meant to be." Whether that be to someone you know or even yourself, when you say that, you're helping all of us.

Thanks to those brave people at Stonewall for this possibility. I hope your Pride Month is a good one. Hope to see you at Dignity In Dignity, soon!

GAY AMERICA

ANNAPOLIS, MD

The United States Naval Academy recently forced a midshipman to resign after revealing to a fellow cadet that he is gay. The last time a student was subjected to such treatment because he was gay was in 1984.

LYNCHBURG, VA

Jerry Falwell's Moral Majority/ Liberty Foundation has stepped up its crusade against homosexuality, and is continuing to preach Falwell's claim that AIDS is God's judgment against those who practice or accept homosexuality. Liberty Front, fundamentally religious organization's newspaper, ran the first installment of an anti-gay "AIDS Cover-up," and a feature article condemning Planned Parenthood's progressive views on homosexuality. The paper also criticized condom advertising; and printed six gay/AIDS related news briefs, and an "Action Alert" urging readers to insist that their federal legislators support anti-gay, AIDS-related legislation.

They'll succeed in these bigoted attempt, too, unless everyone of us makes some effort to help the fight against them, whether it's by writing or calling legislators, volunteering time and work, or giving monetary donations -

DENVER, CO

The Colorado legislature passed a bill requiring doctors and laboratories to report names of all people who test HIV positive and granted sweeping powers to quarantine people with AIDS. The new law also directs officials to notify parents of any minor who tests positive; allows state health officials to access and inspect any relevant medical records while inspecting sources of HIV infection, without requiring subpoenas to obtain the records; and does not require individuals to be notified that their records are being examined.

"A lot of people here did not think that anything like this could happen," said Tom Witte, a gay activist in Colorado. "It could have been prevented if people had taken it as seriously as the bill's proponents took it. Like everywhere else, most of Colorado's gays

and lesbians thought they'll be able to hide at home forever. But they - and the rest of us - will learn the hard way that's just self-deception at its worst. Ask six million dead Jews and 500,00 dead homosexuals if you don't believe me."


RAINBOW FADES FOR THIS SEASON
