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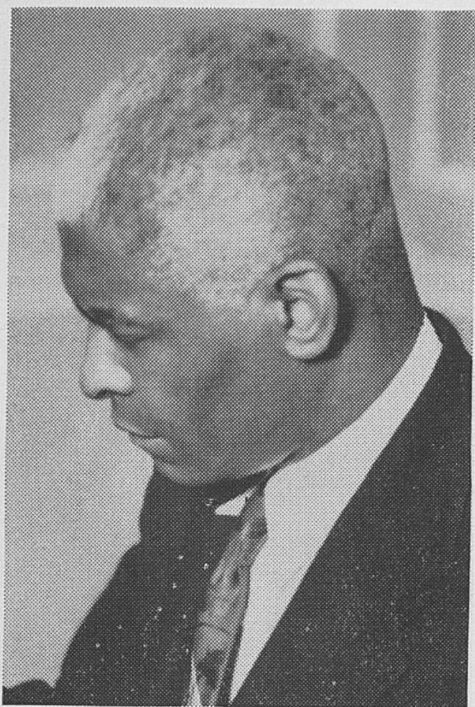

Mrs. Edith S. Sampson is a native of Pittsburgh, Pennsylvania. Trained as a social worker and engaged in social work for a number of years in Chicago, her interest in people led her into the study of law. She obtained her degree in law at the John Marshall Law School in Chicago. Later she distinguished herself by becoming the only woman to receive a Master of Law Degree in the Graduate School of Loyola University, and she was honored in 1952 by the John Marshall Law School with the Honorary Degree of Doctor of Law.

Mrs. Sampson's interest in and service to people expanded when she became a member of the World Town Hall of the Air. This was followed in 1950, 1951 and 1952 with appointments as Alternate United States Representative to the 5th Session of the General Assembly of the United Nations.

Mrs. Sampson is chairman of the committee on International Relations of the National Council of Negro Women, member of the Executive Board of the United Nations Association of Chicago, member of the National Bar Association, the Chicago Bar Association, the League of Women Voters, a life member of the National Association of Women Lawyers.

Dr. Benjamin E. Mays was born in Epworth, South Carolina, August 1, 1895. Graduating as the valedictorian of his class, having finished the high school department of So. Carolina State College in 3 years. He received the A.B. Degree from Bates College; the M.A. and Ph.D. Degrees from the University of Chicago.

From 1921-1924 he taught mathematics at Morehouse College and served as pastor of the Shiloh Baptist Church, Atlanta, Georgia. He served as instructor of English in 1925-26 at State College of South Carolina. At Tampa, Florida, he held a position of Executive Secretary of the Tampa Urban League. This was followed by a position as National Student Secretary of the YMCA. In 1934 he went to Howard University as the dean of the School of Religion. Since 1940 he has served as President of Morehouse College, Atlanta, Georgia.

Dr. Mays has written several outstanding books and many articles for leading periodicals. He has served as delegate to several international church conferences, as a member of the Southern Education Foundation, and as a member of the Commission in Interracial Cooperation. He holds honorary degrees from several institutions.

Who is Who on Convention Program

Born in Logan County, Kentucky, Mrs. Jane M. Spaulding later moved with her family to Nashville, Tennessee, where she was educated in Napier Elementary, Pearl High School and Fisk University. After her marriage to the late Dr. Albert L. Spaulding, Sr., she moved to Charleston, West Virginia. It was there that Mrs. Spaulding's interest was sparked in the health and welfare needs of people.

Mrs. Spaulding was the first major Negro appointee of the present Republican Administration. She served first in a sub-cabinet post as Assistant to Secretary Oveta Culp Hobby of the Department of Health, Education and Welfare. She is now serving as Special Consultant in the War Claims Commission.

A nationally known social welfare worker and world traveler, during a twenty-year period, Mrs. Spaulding was a leading figure in the health and welfare activities of West Virginia. At present, she is national treasurer and member of the Executive Board, National Council of Negro Women, Inc.

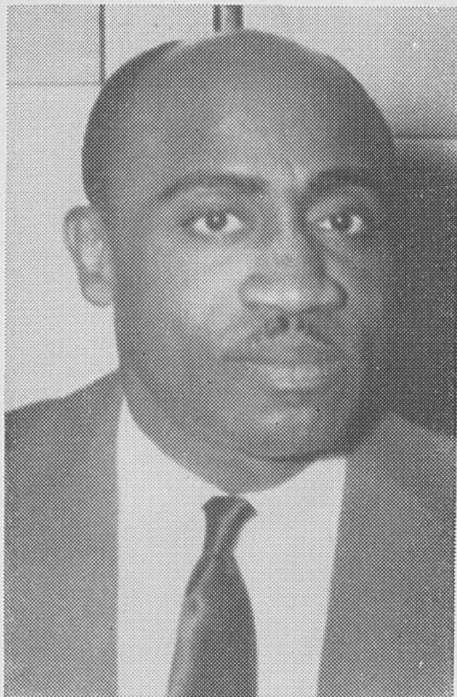


Karl H. Berns

A native of Ohio, Dr. Berns taught in the public schools of that state for 19 years, serving as a rural school teacher, high school principal and school superintendent. From 1935 to 1945, he served as assistant secretary of the Ohio Education Association. Dr. Berns received a B.S. Degree in education from Kent State University, an M.A. from the University of Akron, and LL.B. from William McKinley Law School and a Ph.D. from Ohio State University. He is the author of three books. During World War II, he served in the armed forces.

Dr. Berns joined the NEA headquarters staff in 1945 as assistant secretary. In 1948 he was named assistant secretary for business. At present, he directs two major programs of the Association. He is responsible for the NEA field service program and is in charge of the \$5 Million Building Fund Campaign of the Association. In this capacity, he works in cooperation with the various state and local education associations.

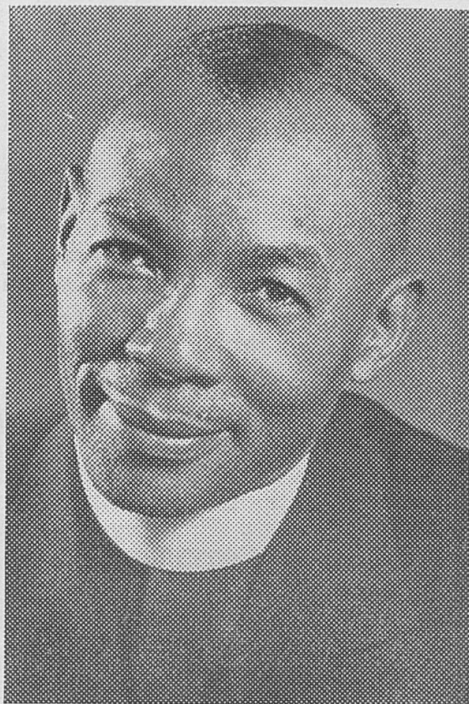
Dr. Blyden Jackson was born in Paducah, Kentucky, in 1910. He came to Louisville in 1914 where he was graduated from Central High School in 1925. Since that time Dr. Jackson earned his A.B. Degree from Wilberforce University and the A.M. and Ph.D. Degrees from the University of Michigan.

Dr. Jackson taught at Madison Street Junior High School in Louisville, Kentucky, for eleven years. He left Louisville to teach in the English Department at Fisk University where he is now Associate Professor of English.

A past president of the Louisville Association of Teachers in Colored Schools (now the Louisville Teachers Association), Dr. Jackson worked actively with the Kentucky Teachers Association.

Dr. Jackson was both a Rosenwald Fellow and a University of Michigan Fellow during the years 1947-1949. He is the author of numerous articles, papers, and reviews dealing particularly with the criticism of Negro Literature.

Dr. Felix Sylvester Anderson, a native of Wilmington, North Carolina, came to Louisville from Mobile, Alabama, in May, 1948, to serve as pastor of Broadway Temple A.M.E. Zion Church. He holds the A.B. Degree from Livingstone College and the Degree of Doctor of Sacred Theology from Western Theological Seminary, Pittsburgh. Last fall he was elected to the Kentucky Legislature. Sympathetic towards the working man and his problems, Dr. Anderson, both in the pulpit and in the Kentucky Legislature, has worked hard and constructively to advance the course of labor. Dr. Anderson has introduced a bill in the 1954 General Assembly of Kentucky that will tend toward integration of Negro youth in the private and parochial schools of Kentucky.

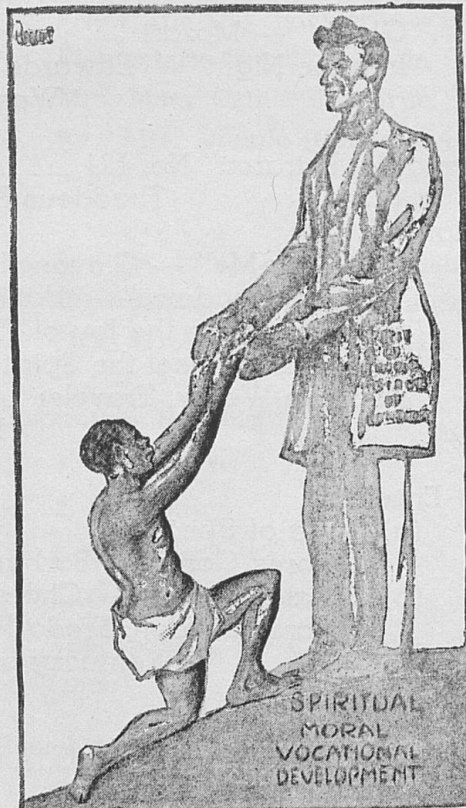
