over five townships.

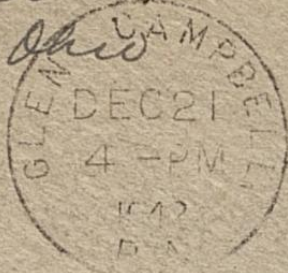
I'd like to hear from

My dear Gladys

It was a real relief to hear from you to-day. Seriously, we've wondered so much that it had turned into worrying - As for our telephone, you know we're living in good old Mrs. Wasserman's apartment, who would loan her telephone for the duration if we used our name. We do have a "reference" now, tho, so if you should call the Company, they would refer you to 42-311. It is not an attractive apartment, and we've tried since the day we moved in to find another, but nothing as yet. Such is New York in the midst of three hundred thousand and thirty!!

Awfully glad Wilam is back. Wish we could see you - all. Any chance of coming down this way? Hope we soon be able to step over his wrinkles and things! I started to word that differently + then corrected myself!

How is the other member of your family? Will he eat the new kind of dog food? We're having difficulty with "Mrs Brady" along that line. I've found that she does better if she has much of wagneria first!! no kidding!

What do you think? I've been home. It's history, now, for it was in January. Spent four days with Mawa, while doing little



things like seeing Dr. Keightley +  
 sorting clothes and checking on  
 our house. The time flew, I found  
 Charleston a different place - women  
 driving taxis and the streets  
 sorta empty. Renee's looked good  
 tho - so different from anything  
 over here. The Barnes were short  
 on whiskey, of course, and had a  
 new game called "Skittles" which  
 was playable in their living room.  
 No ping pong since the departure  
 of the Churchmans, here. - They  
 as well, as many others asked  
 about you + Hilary -- Ann and  
 Leonard have a new home, in South  
 Ruffner - Paul Craig is married  
 and both are working, I didn't  
 meet her. - Ephie and his

cute wife, Claudia, placed me  
 safely and tenderly in the  
 train when departing. It was  
 good to get back home at  
 that, and I hope it won't be  
 long before we may return  
 for good, and, the tender wife  
 come to see us!

By the way, I have a job.  
 I'm on duty, now, (from 4pm to  
 midnight) so that is why the  
 materials I'm using are funny.  
 I started working twelve days  
 ago after two hectic days spent  
 at N.O.B. going thru civil  
 service and a funny physical.  
 I had been doing aircraft  
 work since the date was  
 applied, remember? - however, Xmas

week, the civilians were relieved by waaci and then a month ago the government decided to do something else with the poor little woods and invited the civilians back - Dibley and I returned, and one day the navy representative asked me to consider a job with the navy Liaison Dept - He called it a war job - and right he was! There are five of us working around the clock in shifts. I'm the only one with a family close at hand, and the only chief cook and bottle washer - but nevertheless, so far things have gone smoothly. Good cooperation from the family - particularly Cherdman. Navy is on a salary, for after school



Sunday Afternoon.

Dear Gladys:

You were sweet to write me about the apartment and I do appreciate your interest in so doing. As I told Milam over the phone, I was just going to send you a night letter about it, so you would have it Saturday, but after getting his wire John thought best to call and find out what we could. We are very much interested in the apartment, if we can arrange to have an extra bed. Of course, the main reason for our wanting to stay in Louisville is that young John is there, and I would want a place where he could sleep when he had free time to come in and be with us.

That would be a necessary part of the set up, as you know. Then the matter of dates and time would also have some bearing. I imagine that John will start out on his trip about the third week in November, so it would be the latter part, after November 20th before I would be coming. I would love it for three months, as I know by that time big John would be ready to start west again and I would not want to be tied up for four or five months with the place. I write these points down, in case Milam did not understand over the phone.

He said the people who lived in the apartment were rather uncertain about what they did want to do, so after you talk with them and write us we can know better how to plan. However, if it can be had and there is a certainty that we can get a day bed or preferably an inner door bed, then we would be glad to take it. I felt it had almost fallen

in my lap and was trying to find time to write and tell you so, but when Friday came and I had not had the time, I was planning to wire you that night. I am hoping so that we can get this one or some apartment there- I would naturally prefer the Mayflower or the Puritan as you and Milam and Anne are all near by and it is very convenient and central. So until I hear further from you about it, I am keeping my fingers crossed hoping that things will break for us. In case this does not go through, if there is anything else coming up there, I would appreciate it if you let me know, and I will answer immediately.

I am glad you think John is a nice boy- we think he is mighty sweet and fine, and have found him very dependable in everything. He is more like Milam than he is like anybody else, I think and as he has always adored Milam I know that he likes being with you both. Thank you for taking him in, for I know he loves it and it means a lot to him and to big John and me.

It is nice you are home now and can take care of the place and have more time of your own. I think a small place can take a lot of care for there is no room that is private so one is always doubling back on his own tracks. I know all about that, for that is just what I am doing all of the time. Today I have been trying to catch up on some back jobs, and this is the first time I have sat down since I got out of bed. We were away for two weeks and as we left just after Lucy Belle and the baby left, I found lots to do when I came back. Today John has been taking it easy, so I put in

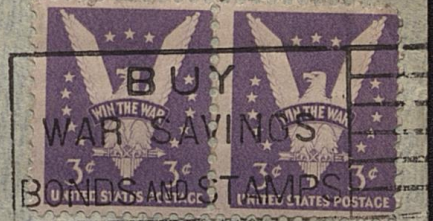
