I am pleased to provide you with this fact booklet which contains a brief summary of the University of Kentucky's 1997-98 Operating and Capital Budget, a profile of pertinent facts about the University, and information about the many excellent programs underway at the University.

The appropriation to higher education for 1997-98 represented a 3% increase in the operating appropriation. As was the case in 1996-97, the increase was distributed to the higher education institutions based on the Council on Higher Education funding model; i.e., within the overall 3% increase and after funding for current services, 60% of the new funds were distributed to deal with equity concerns, a significant portion of which was allocated to the Community College System to help redress the long-standing inequity in the funding level of the community colleges. With that distribution we were able to develop a budget which, along with some reallocation, met continuation needs as well as modest program needs in the University System and which continued to address salary and position catch-up needs in the Community College System. As a result of the Special Session in May, additional operating support of some \$1.5 million was appropriated directly to the University System and \$4.0 million was appropriated to the Research Challenge Trust Fund for the University of Kentucky. The \$1.5 million is being utilized

during 1997-98 for graduate student support, new research initiatives, and the renovation of research space and facilities in order to move forward on the goal for the University of Kentucky of becoming ranked nationally in the top twenty public research institutions. The \$4.0 million remains in the Research Challenge Trust Fund pending resolution by the Council on Postsecondary Education (CPE) of the criteria and process for application for these funds.

The remainder of 1997-98 promises to be an exciting and challenging one for the University of Kentucky. The CPE has put forth a budget recommendation for 1998-2000 which includes a 2.9% current services increase in 1998-99 and a 2.8% current services increase in 1999-2000; funding for the operations and maintenance of new facilities coming on line; participation in a \$25 million bond pool (to be matched on a dollar for dollar basis) for deferred maintenance and government mandated projects; funding for the Mechanical Engineering Building and Phase II of the Aging/Allied Health Building; and participation in a research equipment and laboratory replacement or acquisition bond pool of up to \$30 million for the University of Kentucky and University of Louisville. In addition, the CPE has recommended an additional \$10 million in the Research Challenge Trust Fund for debt service on a bond issue to create the Endowment for Research Excellence.

To step up to the challenge of being ranked nationally in the top twenty public universities (and let me remind you that we are starting from a position of strength - having moved up to the 45th ranking and having met our current strategic planning goals relating to increased external support), we are currently embarking on a number of initiatives. First, I have appointed a Graduate Education and Research Task Force to identify institutional strengths and recommend those strategic priority areas for investment in graduate education and research consistent with the mission and current strengths of the University. The Task Force Report will be used to position the University for eligibility for the \$4 million currently in the Research Challenge Trust Fund as well as for funds added to that Trust Fund. That report is completed. Also, the University has underway a comprehensive review of its current strategic plan. Critical elements of that review will be designed to meet the research challenge as well as to deal with other aspects of the recent higher education legislation. The revised plan will be finalized in spring 1998. Last spring, the University began fundraising in the Fund for Academic Excellence to match state appropriations in the incentive trust funds. We also have a feasibility study underway in anticipation of a major capital campaign beginning

in 1998 which would target endowments for academic excellence. The fact that the new W. T. Young Library will be opening this spring furthers our ability to move forward academically.

It is with the sustained commitment from the state as well as significant private support that we can all work together to build this University into one of the nation's great universities.

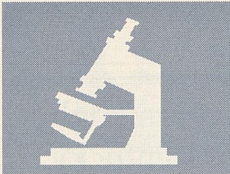
TEACHING

The Academic Quality of the University of Kentucky
is widely recognized.

- ◆ Total student enrollment was more than 24,100 in fall 1997, reflecting a slight increase over the 1996 fall enrollment. Preliminary graduate school enrollment was recorded at 5,289 students and professional enrollment at 1,868 students.
- ◆ UK has enrolled 56 National Merit Scholars, 126 Governor's Scholars and 125 high school valedictorians in the current freshman class. The high school grade point average for this freshman class is 3.45 -- a new record at UK!
- ◆ At Lexington Community College, 5,558 students are pursuing associate degrees in 15 programs. Of that number, 3,365 are full-time students.
- ◆ The UK faculty is highly qualified with approximately 97 percent having the highest degree available in their fields.
- ◆ UK receives high marks from a number of publications for the quality of its academic programs:
 - ✓ *U.S. News and World Report* ranks UK 26th in the Top 50 "national universities."
 - ✓ *U.S. News and World Report* ranks the College of Pharmacy third best in its annual "America's Best Graduate Schools" issue.
 - ✓ *The Student Guide to America's 100 Best College Buys* includes UK and highlights the university's outstanding research programs and teaching facilities.

Maximizing Access to Higher Education is a High Priority of the University of Kentucky

- ◆ UK reaches beyond its Lexington campus to offer a number of joint doctoral programs at the University of Louisville as well as the regional universities.
- ◆ UK continued strengthening ties with the University of Louisville, launching a new joint doctoral program in social work, the first of its kind in Kentucky.
- ◆ UK established the Robinson Scholars program, which will provide free tuition to selected students in 29 eastern Kentucky counties who complete high school with acceptable grade point averages. The program, funded by the E. O. Robinson Trust, inducted 162 eighth graders into its first class in June 1997, and will support the students by offering counseling and cultural opportunities throughout their high school years. A new group of eighth graders will be selected each spring.
- ◆ The College of Medicine encourages young people to consider medical, science and health-related careers with programs overseen by the Outreach Center for Science and Health Career Opportunities. Since 1993, the center has interacted with more than 25,000 students.
- ◆ The new W. T. Young Library neared the end of construction as the fall semester began, and plans called for opening the 351,350 square-foot facility in spring 1998. The library will seat more than 4,000 patrons and house 1.2 million volumes.
- ◆ UK is educating over 65,000 students. In 1996-97, the University -- including the University System in Lexington and the Community College System -- educated 45 percent of the students attending public colleges and universities in Kentucky.



RESEARCH

UK is One of the Major Research Institutions in the United States.

- ◆ The Carnegie Foundation has designated UK as a Research University of the First Class, one of only 59 public universities so ranked.
- ◆ UK improved its standing among all national research universities, rising from 72nd to 66th over a recent three-year period. Among all public research universities, UK rose to 45th.
- ◆ The U. S. Department of Energy awarded a \$2.1 million grant to the Center for Applied Energy Research to evaluate coal liquefaction processes.
- ◆ The Sanders-Brown Center on Aging, one of the premier aging centers in the U.S., is one of ten original Alzheimer's Disease Research Centers funded by the National Institutes of Health.
- ◆ The University of Kentucky faculty and staff last year attracted over \$125 million in outside grants, contracts and gifts -- a solid testimonial to their talent and expertise and a positive contribution to the state's economy!
- ◆ The Kentucky EPSCoR Office was awarded \$1.8 million from the National Science Foundation for work stimulating research into carbon-based materials, the theory of complex materials and developmental neurobiology, and in support of the Kentucky Center for Structural Biology.

PUBLIC SERVICE

The University of Kentucky's Public Service Programs Reach Out into Every County in the Commonwealth.

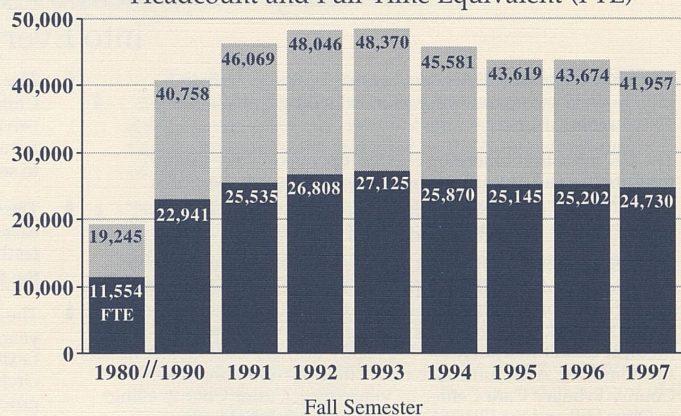
- ◆ The UK Cooperative Extension Service makes more than 5 million service contacts every year, extending to each of the 120 counties.
- ◆ The UK Industrial Extension Service, operated by the Center for Robotics and Manufacturing Systems, annually performs more than 400 engineering assistance projects for small and medium-sized manufacturing companies.
- ◆ The UK telemedicine network has used compressed video and audiographic systems to provide immediate consultations to primary care providers serving more than 300 patients at sites across Kentucky. Examples of currently active sites are: St. Claire Medical Center in Morehead, Big Sandy Primary Care Center in Prestonsburg, ARH June Buchanan Clinic in Hindman, Lewis County Primary Care Center in Vanceburg, Carter County Clinic in Olive Hill and the Elliott County Clinic in Sandy Hook.
- ◆ The UK Chandler Medical Center opened its \$10.6 million Children's Hospital, providing 12 pediatric intensive care units, 38 private acute care units, 70 pediatric specialists, 200 pediatric nurses and more than 100 support personnel in a facility designed to serve Kentucky's ill and injured children.
- ◆ The UK College of Dentistry launched a new program in 29 eastern Kentucky counties to apply dental sealant to children's teeth to help reduce tooth decay. The program is funded through the E. O. Robinson Trust.
- ◆ The Singletary Center for the Arts hosted 369 events in the last year, attracting nearly 109,000 people to concerts by the Lexington Philharmonic Orchestra, the Central Kentucky Youth Orchestra, elementary and secondary school music and choral groups and UK bands and groups.

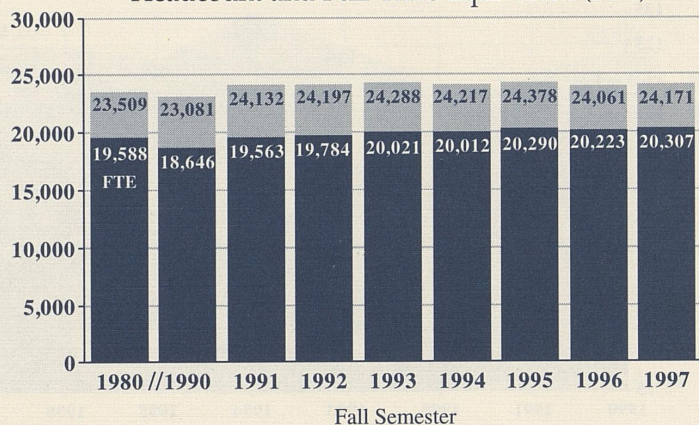

Headcount and Full-Time Equivalent (FTE)



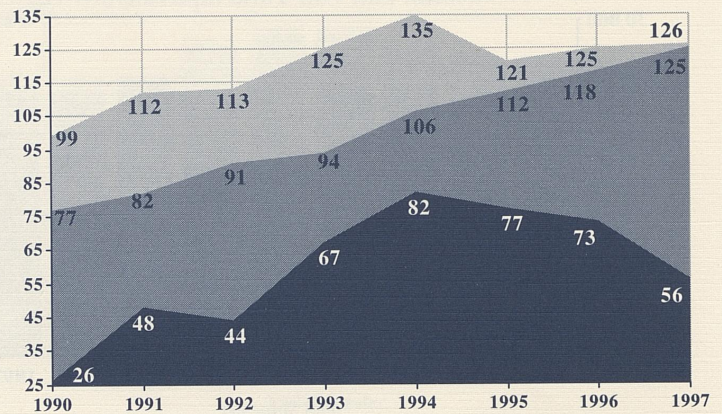
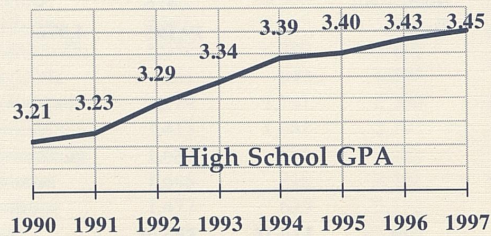

Academic Year

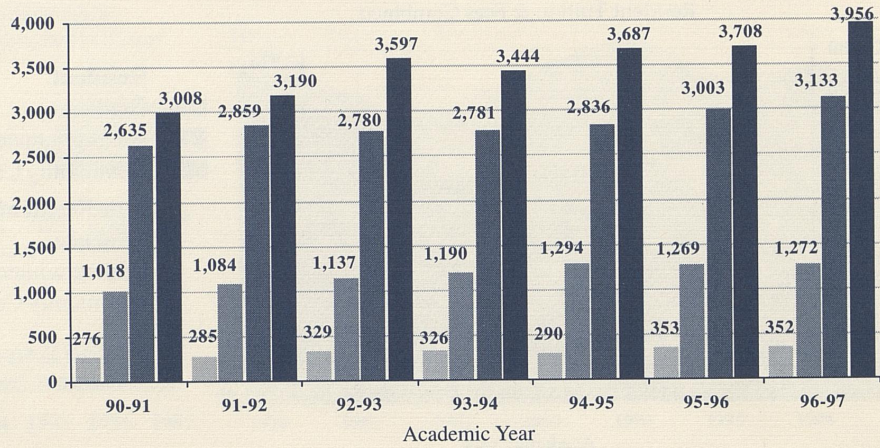

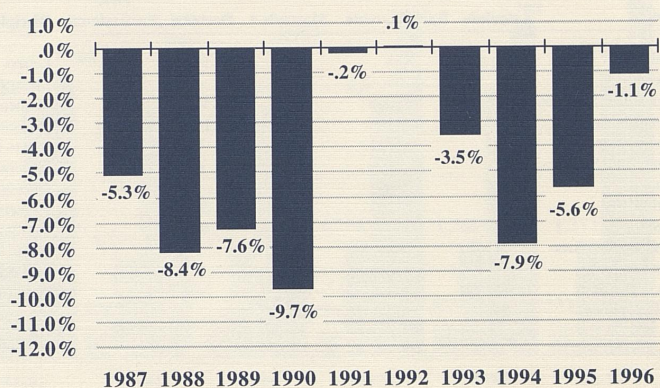

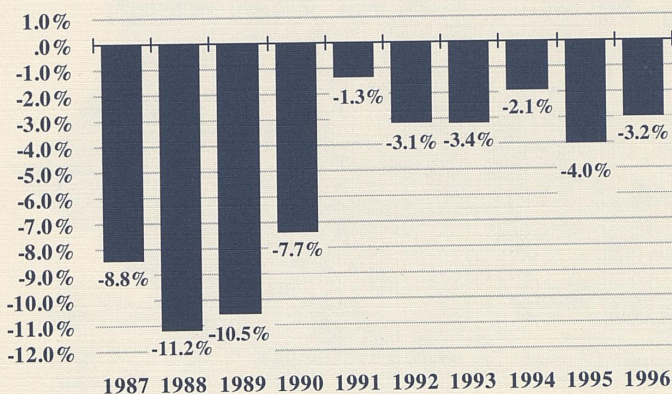

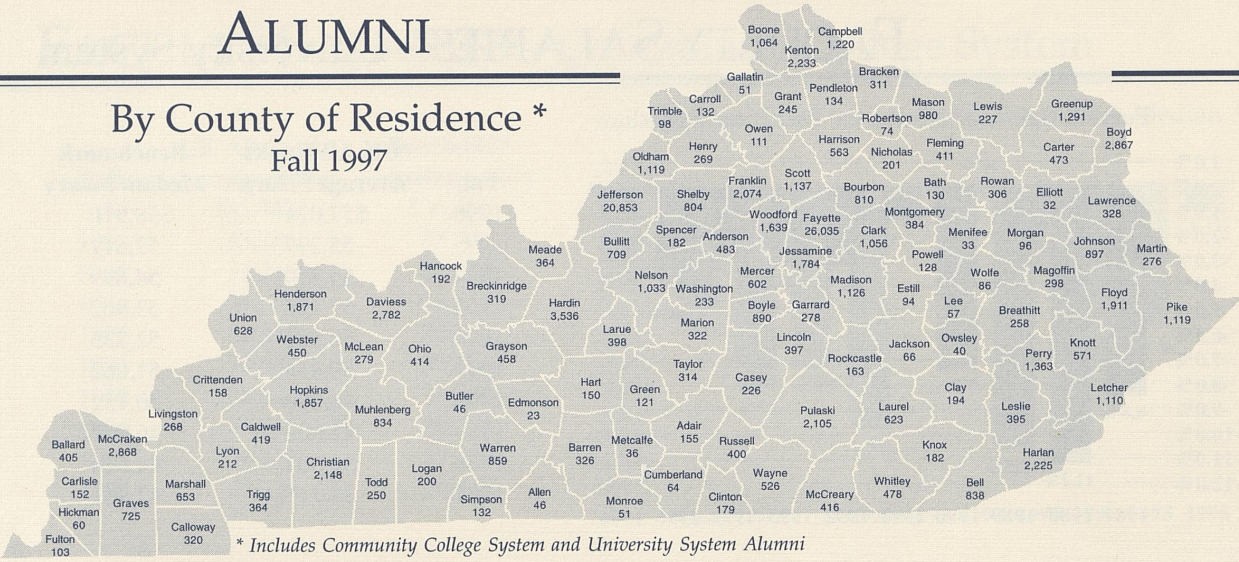

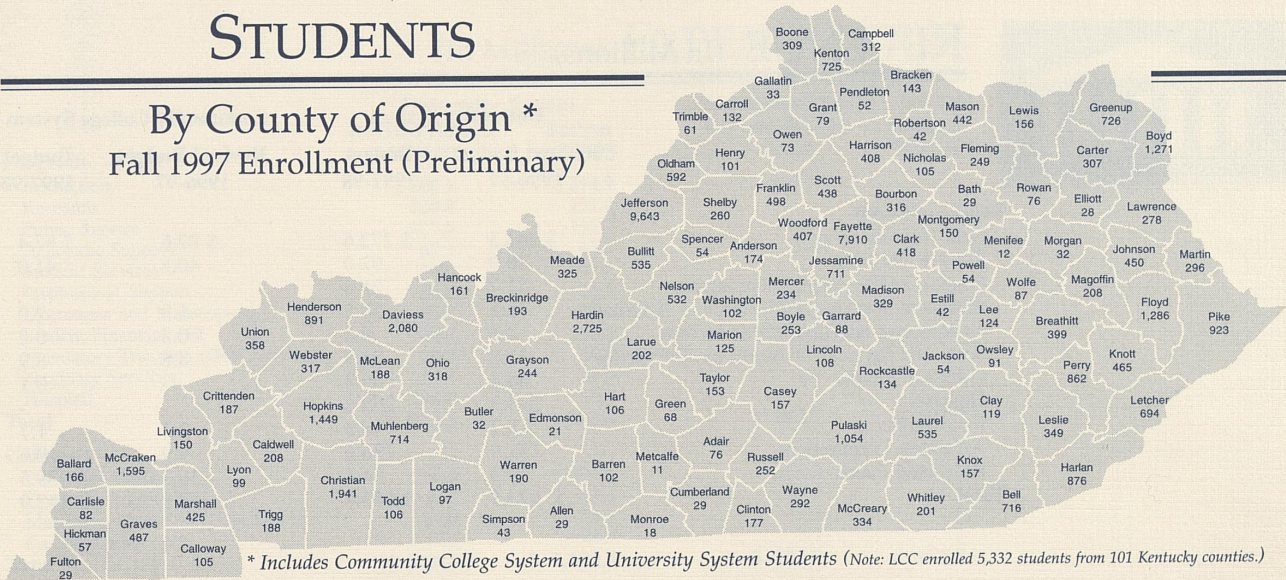
By County of Residence *
Fall 1997



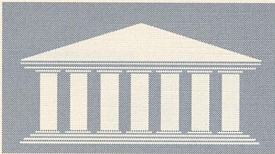

By County of Origin * Fall 1997 Enrollment (Preliminary)



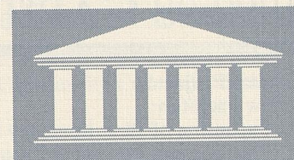

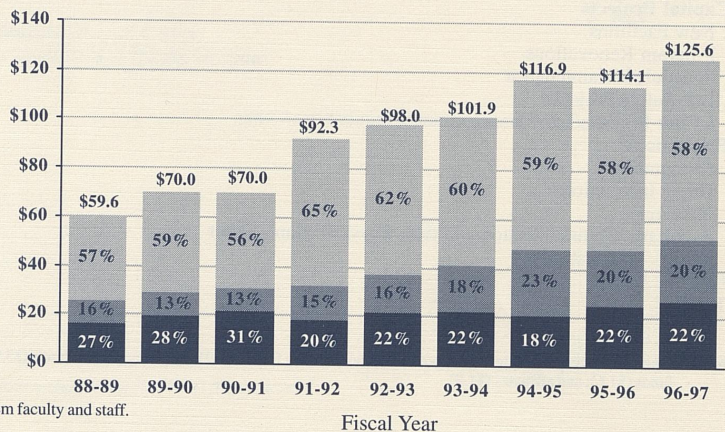

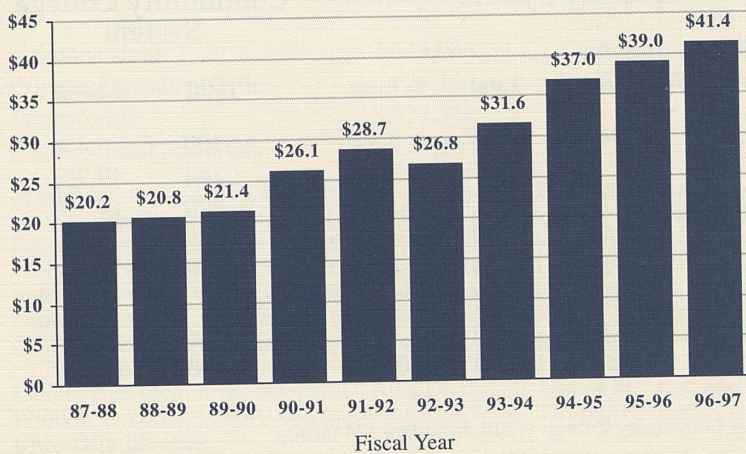

In addition to the above, the Library's collections include 238,677 maps; over 5,200 Oral History program interviews; 284 current state, national, and international newspapers; the University Archives and Records Program; Audio-Visual Archives; the Modern Political Archives; the Bert T. Combs Appalachian Collection, including the Appalachian Regional Commission Archives; and the W. Hugh Peal Collection of 19th century English and related literature. The library is a regional depository for U.S. government publications and is also a depository for European Economic Community and Canadian publications, British Parliamentary Papers, Kentucky government publications, and technical reports from federal agencies, all selectively collected. Numerous CD ROM and on-line databases are accessible in the main and branch libraries.

Library sites include the Margaret I. King Library, 12 branch libraries, and 19 libraries within the Community College System. The William T. Young Library will open in spring 1998. The NOTIS library system provides an on-line catalog for the holdings of all University libraries.

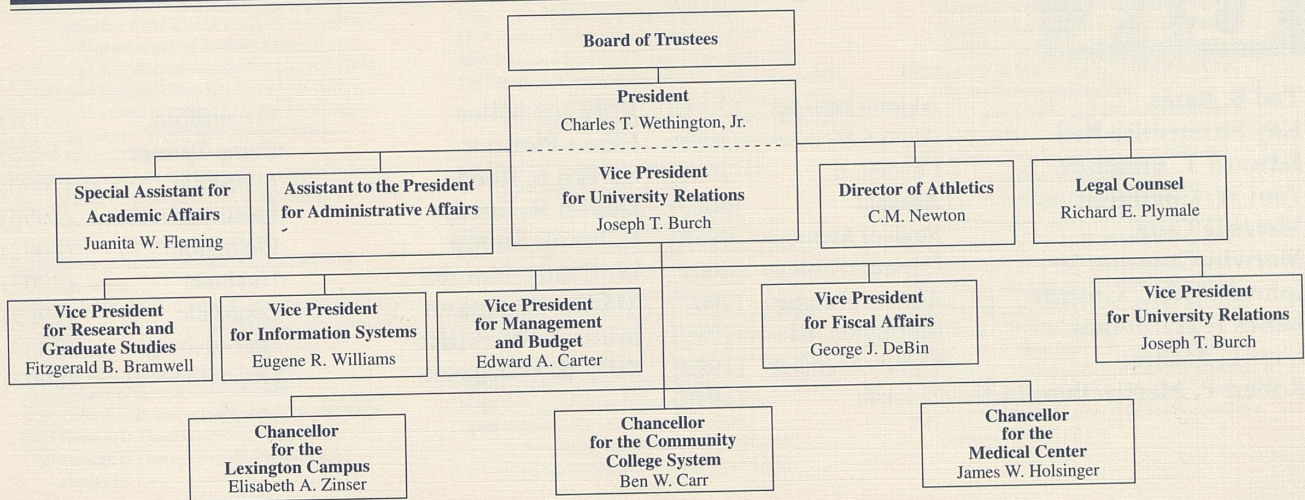

ADMINISTRATIVE HISTORY

- 1865** Agricultural and Mechanical College (A&M) established as part of Kentucky University
- 1869** James K. Patterson became President of A&M
- 1878** A&M separated from Kentucky University
- 1882** A&M moved to current location in Lexington
