Watts pleads guilty to 2 counts

Ex-UK center chooses to begin serving time now; sentencing set for later in April

SOMERSET — Former UK football player Jason Watts spoke softly as he pled guilty to two counts of reckless homicide in Pulaski County District Court yesterday.

Although yet to be sentenced for the crimes, Watts chose to begin serving time immediately. He reported to the county jail yesterday at 4 p.m.

Watts will return before April 16 to be sentenced for the charges. Each charge carries a possible sentence of one to five years in prison.

By entering a plea of

guilty to the charges, Watts admitted to recklessly causing the death of freshman transfer Arthur Steinmetz, 19, and Eastern Kentucky University student Christopher Brock, 21. He also waives his right to a trial by jury.

As standard procedure, presiding Judge Daniel J. Ventures asked Watts a lengthy series of formal questions to be sure he understood his choice to issue a guilty plea.

Asked if he had been treated for any mental illness, Watts said he is being treated and taking medication for depression.

Watts said neither the

condition nor the medication affected his ability to make decisions about the case.

Ventures offered Watts the option to wait until being sentenced before beginning to serve his time.

"It's more typical to remain out of custody until sentenced," Ventures said. The decision to begin serving time immediately or after sentencing was up to Watts, Ventures said.

Prosecution agreed to the reduced charges, Commonwealth Attorney Eddy Montgomery said, because he's more concerned about the sentence.

"My main concern was the number of years (sentenced)," Montgomery said.

As a prosecutor, he was not considering probation in place of jail time, but the final decision is up to the judge, he said.

"Jason Watts needs to go to jail, and he'll be in jail tonight at 4," Montgomery said.

Asked if he believed Watts showed remorse for his actions, Montgomery said Watts is facing his charges appropriately.

"He is willing to come in here and plead guilty, and admit that he did something wrong," he said.

Watts' attorney, James Lowry, was unavailable for comment.

Police said Watts, 21, was driving on U.S. 27 in Pulaski County on the morning

of Nov. 15 when he lost control of his 1985 Chevy pickup after trying to pass a car.

The truck flipped, throwing all three from the truck.

Steinmetz and Brock were pronounced dead at the scene. All three were legally drunk at the time of the accident.

Watts had been charged with two counts of second degree manslaughter, each of which carried a jail term of up to 10 years.

Although neither implies intent, reckless homicide is a less serious charge than manslaughter, which implies wanton conduct.

Reckless homicide implies only reckless conduct, Montgomery said. Both are felony charges.

Really Out-There Corps

Overcoming obstacles: Students gaining necessary field expertise even after rain cancels rappelling exercises

The soldier made one wrong move. "You're dead," Cadet Major Joseph Williams said. "Set those down. Every-one start counting."

The members of an ROTC squad of freshmen and sophomores began counting. They had 15 minutes to navigate a makeshift obstacle course of cement blocks, two-by-fours and chairs. While carrying gas tanks and bricks. This penalty cost them precious time.

Three ROTC squads were drilling in Buell Army yesterday after bad weather canceled a rappelling exercise.

The freshmen and sophomore cadets were preparing for the Field Leadership Reaction Courses this summer, said Cadet Lt. Commander Damon Durall, commander of the Wildcat Battalion.

The courses teach cadets leadership and basic military principles, Durall said. "They have to react to a variety of situations, many of which don't have book answers," he said.

In addition to physical training, cadets assume all levels of leadership roles, he said. That can be a tough job on

multiple levels. "You have to motivate your peers," Durall said. "Even though you're a platoon leader, those are your peers you're working with. It's tough."

Success in the courses depends on leadership skills, not technical ability, he said.

"These are team-building exercises," said Cadet Major Todd Polk, a combat engineering senior. "Corporate America's doing the same thing."

Polk, whose great-grandfather was Civil War General Leonidas Polk, is a senior at UK. In addition to ROTC work, he has a regular course load at UK and is on the swim team. All of his fellow cadets attend college, and many are on athletic teams, from rifle to football, he said.

UK also is the host battalion for cadets from Centre and Midway colleges. Mary Katharine Jayne, an English and biology freshman at Midway, is a corporal who travels to Lexington with her roommate, also a cadet, for drills and military science labs.

Her squad was about to open the Door of Death, an exercise in which cadets had to find out what's on the other side of a door without losing a life.

"It's a lot of work, but a lot of fun," she said.

A third squad, made of juniors and seniors, practiced tying Swiss seats, rope seats for rappelling and rope bridges, and being drilled. "The Swiss seat is primarily an all-purpose seat," Polk said. "The drills they're doing will be the same drills they'll do in Airborne training."

Juniors and seniors will be going to Advance Camp in Fort Lewis, Wash.

Polls having decent turnout

Most say they're happy with participation, candidates

The Student Government Association elections are successfully getting students to vote, while helping student organizations at the same time.

"The turnout has been wonderful, compared to the last couple of years," said Joe Schuler, chairman of SGA's Elections Board of Supervision.

Eleven different voting sites are on campus, each with poll workers representing a student organization. SGA is giving each organization that helps \$10.30 per hour.

"We sent letters to all student organizations on campus," Schuler said. "Those who are participating have two students working every hour."

Poll workers said they have noticed the big turnout. "It's been pretty fast and furious," said Jim Chesser, a poll worker at William T. Young Library and a member of the Wesley Foundation. "We have to call in every student's college and birthday before they can vote to make sure they are a student here."

Chesser has worked polls for city government elections, and said he finds this job much easier.

"I was a judge for the polls for an election in Lexington," he said. "I had to make sure all the voters didn't get out of line ... I had to write up some people, but these students have been very patient ... no complaints."

Within an hour, one poll worker could tell students were interested in this year's elections.

"I was here from 12 p.m. to 1 p.m. and had about 30 to 40 students come to vote," said Nick West, a communication senior and Student Center poll worker with the Communications Honor Society.

And some students say this is all because of better preparation by this year's candidates.

"There's been really good campaigning," Settles said. "Right now there's 10 people outside with flyers ready to give them to anyone walking by."

But some students are not voting. "I've read a little about it," said Elizabeth Smith, an elementary education freshman, "but I've been real busy so I haven't given it too much consideration."

"It's a step toward reclamation of our legacy and history. For me personally, they provide fresh hope in that they are young brothers who are striving to define themselves more accurately in contrast to Western ideology."

The group encourages its members to study spiritually-

empowering literature and to practice what they learn. The members say they build bonds by learning from each other.

"(The group) has helped me gain discipline and establish myself," said Donnie Hardison, a finance and economics junior.

Derek Littlejohn, a marketing junior, said he has matured and become more focused since joining the group.

"The group made me more responsible for my actions," he said. "I'm not childish like before. Now I actually think about my actions."

Members said they also learn more about other people. Jermaine Reeves, a materials engineering junior, said he learned respect for those who came to help him and all they accomplished and endured.

Group members also volunteer around the community at places such as God's Pantry.

"The group brings to our community a new model, founded on an ancient African model of fraternity and brotherhood that is based on cultural recognition and tradition," said Chester Grundy, director of Minority Student Affairs, who helped form the group.

Future's so bright for site

On the up and up: Overhaul of website's look, content drawing hits from community

UK's website has a bright future ahead of it.

Chuck Ham, UK web coordinator, said the UK web site is a constantly evolving entity.

"Not a week goes by that we don't do something to it," said Ham. "It is still not done and will never be done."

Ham said the web site has seen some major changes over the past year.

"We wanted it to be more modern," Ham said. "We looked at other universities and corporations and felt that this design was practical."

Ham, who works through the department of public relations, said the University was looking for someone on campus that knew something about design to take over the web site. Not just from a look, but a navigation perspective.

"One of our main goals is easy navigation, especially for students," Ham said. "We don't want people to search all over for something."

Ham said they used to get complaints on the old site from

people outside the University they couldn't find anything.

Ham said the website is coded by a private company called Orbit. The site was contracted out because the project was bigger than what anyone on campus could handle.

When the site was revamped, Ham said they held over 26 meetings with people on campus to see what people wanted.

"Orbit took what they got from those meetings and added color," Ham said. "They're really just responsible for the coding."

Ham said that during the meetings, they felt like students were one of the main groups they wanted to attract and make the site easier to use.

James Temprano, a medical student and candidate for a masters in health administration, said he finds the site useful and easy to navigate.

"The student information system is great," Temprano said.

"It's bland, yet functional," said Jonathan Moore, a senior art studio major and web designer for UK. "It's much more user-friendly than it

was. Although, I don't know how much concern they gave to slower modem speeds."

Moore said he thought the site was on-par with other university sites, if not better than most.

"I've looked at other sites like Northwestern's and Harvard's," Moore said. "The UK one is just as advanced if not more so."

However, Moore said he doesn't think the web site is representative of the student body. He noted that not all of the University's departments get equal time.

Billy Hylton, WRFL's webmaster, agrees. He finds it frustrating that WRFL isn't mentioned anywhere on the main site. Hylton said there's a list of popular sites at UK, but some of the sites are included because the administration thinks they should be.

"If it were a fair thing, where it was just a matter of hits received, that would be one thing," Hylton said. "But it seems to me like the University would want to promote something like the radio station if they use the site as part of their recruiting strategy. I mean, here's this great opportunity for students to learn about radio and it doesn't even get mentioned."

Success brings expectations

I'll be back: 12 players return for the Cats to try and match this season's success

A little faith, a lot of talent and some good chemistry took the UK women's basketball team to new heights this past season. And with 12 of its 13 players returning next year, the Cats look to improve on their 21-11 record.

After three consecutive losing seasons, the heat was on Coach Bernadette Mattox to lead the women's team back to glory.

Mattox silenced all the critics, and led UK to its first NCAA Tournament in eight years and tied a school record for Southeastern Conference wins. Perhaps most important, the women earned the respect nationwide they have longed for over the years.

Despite being picked to finish next to last in the SEC pre-season poll, the Cats finished third overall in a 12-team conference in which more than half the teams were ranked in the Associated Press Top 25 final poll, and six teams received bids to the NCAA Tournament.

UK made an impressive

showing early in the season, winning its first five games, including victories over rival Louisville and Ohio State in overtime.

Point guard Erica Jackson broke UK's record for free-throw attempts in a game against the Buckeyes. Jackson hit 13-of-18 free throws in the win, breaking Liz Lukschu's record of 17 attempts against Morehead in the 1979-80 season.

Jackson wasn't the only Wildcat record-breaker. Junior guard Tiffany Wait scored her 1,000th point when the Cats played Alabama on Jan. 24.

Wait finished the season as UK's top scorer, averaging 13.7 points per game. She joined 19 other Wildcats on the all-time scoring list with 1,000 or more points.

Perhaps the biggest win of the year came in February, when the Cats handed eventual Final Four Georgia an 80-76 loss at Memorial Coliseum. Wait smoked the nets, pouring in 27 points and hitting on 13-of-14 free throws.

Mattox's squad would lose only two more regular-season games before falling in the

semifinals of the SEC Tournament. The Cats then had to wait a week before they found out their NCAA Tournament seed. The Cats rolled over Nebraska in the first round before falling to the UCLA Bruins in Los Angeles.

After the loss, Mattox finally gave a piece of her mind to the critics who had doubted her along the way.

"For all of the writers who had us voted to end up last in our conference and not do anything, I think the team did a tremendous job and above and beyond that," she said last month.

Even with 12 returning players, sophomore forward Laura Meadows knows next year is going to be an even bigger challenge.

"Now that we've earned recognition, we'll be at the point where we won't be able to sneak up on teams anymore," Meadows said.

Mattox said she is proud of how her players have matured.

"We're just going to work in the offseason to be able to become a better basketball team so that at this time next year we will be the ones moving on in the tournament."

"I feel like coming off of our best performance ever in the SEC Championships has prepared us well for the NCAA Regional," she said.

"The pressure and intensity of the SECs is the best rehearsal for the competition we face in Baton Rouge," Little said. "We are in the best possible position going in next weekend, and we are ready to go out and have another great meet."

Fifth-ranked LSU, No. 7 Stanford, Central Michigan, Auburn and Ball State are also competing in the Southeast Regional. The top two teams from each regional will advance to the championships in Salt Lake City on April 22.

This is the sixth consecutive visit to the tournament and seventh all time for the Cats. The Cats notched their best performance in 1996 when Jenny Hansen led them to a third-place finish with a team score of 193.925.

In addition, UK Assistant Coach Hajile "Mo" Muhammad and junior Krissy Hoeflerin are up for assistant coach and athlete of the year.

Men notch two in a row

The men's tennis team played host to Auburn on Tuesday and ripped the Tigers a new one.

UK spanked Auburn 6-1 by winning five of six singles matches and extended its record to 11-5 and 4-2 in the Southeastern Conference. The loss was the Tigers' (7-9, 0-5 SEC) third straight.

The Cats picked up their sixth point by taking two out of three doubles matches.

The team of Johan Hesson and Patrik Johansson won 8-4, as did the tandem of Tomas Smid and Edo Bawono.

Auburn's only point came via Tiago Ruffoni's singles-match win over Smid as UK rolled to its second straight win.

The first win of its new-found streak came Monday against the 28th-ranked LSU Tigers in Baton Rouge, La.

Play began Monday with the Cats taking a 2-1 lead, but rain forced the teams to post-

pone the remaining matches until Monday.

Once the rain subsided, UK picked up where it left off and downed LSU 5-2.

Smid, Bawono, Johan Grunditz and Gustav Poussette grabbed singles victories for UK and the Cats won the doubles point by taking two of three matches for the second time this week.

Bawono's 6-0, 6-7, 7-6 win at No. 5 singles clinched the victory for UK.

UK keeps rolling on with a match at home today against No. 14 Ole Miss for its third match this week.

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Double trouble

NEW YORK — They were born to the same woman on the same day, loved and cared for in the same way, and raised as brothers. But the 3-month-old boys are not related. One is black, one is white. They ended up in the same womb apparently because of a doctor's mistake. Now the only mother the boys have ever known says she'll return the child who does not share her DNA to his genetic parents. "We're giving him up because we love him," Donna Fasano said in a handwritten statement supplied by her lawyer Tuesday. "Both of these boys are beautiful — two precious, normal little boys," said her lawyer, Ivan Tantler. "They sit in the swing together. They sit in the tub together. ... We're going to try to arrange some kind of visitation rights so the boys grow up to know that they are brothers." Rudolph Slias, lawyer for the black couple, Deborah Perry-Rogers, a nurse, and Robert Rogers, a teacher, of Feamick, N.J., said they are amenable to visitation. "It's in the children's best interest," he said.

PARIS — "Bonjour," Monica Lewinsky said over and over. "Merci, merci. Si ... I'm sorry, I mean oui." About 300 people, including a healthy sprinkling of tourists, waited Wednesday on an unseasonably warm afternoon for a quick autograph in their copies of Lewinsky's book. Team of the '90s?

Duke's stats look good, but Cats own the Devils in wins

It began at the beginning of the season. Is it Duke? Or maybe it's UK. The only thing for certain was it had to be one of the two. One owned the first half of the decade, the other the last.

Coming into 1999, the last-chance year of the decade, word was whoever went farther in the NCAA Tournament would be declared "Team of the Decade." So it must be Duke, right?

Well, yes and no. Personally, I think it is a toss-up. Both are worthy of the title for showing an excellence no other programs have been able to attain or sustain. Each has persuasive arguments, but each also has a black eye, so to speak.

UK Sports Information Director for basketball Brooks Downing compiled a list of comparisons between the Cats and Devils late Tuesday, depicting how the two teams matched up in 16 categories. Duke led in seven of those categories, while they were tied in three others. That leaves UK leading six categories. But the breakdown is more interesting upon closer observation.

Duke ruled the early part of the 1990s, as Devils' hero Christian Laettner led the Devils into the first three Final Fours of the decade, winning back-to-back national titles in 1991 and 1992. In the only year Duke didn't win the title (1990), the Devils finished second, losing to Nevada-Las Vegas.

Duke returned to the Final Four and championship game in 1994, before losing to Arkansas in the final game.

Duke's black eyes came in 1995 and 1996, when it combined for a 31-31 record over the two-year span. A 13-18 record, including 2-14 in the Atlantic Coast Conference, hurt the Devils' cause in 1995, but was forgiven because Head Coach Mike Krzyzewski took a sabbatical because of exhaustion.

But alas, the Dookies did return. In 1997, the Devils finished 24-9, winning the ACC, before being upset by Providence in the tournament. That season set the stage for the Devils' improbable 1998, where, led by a stellar freshman class, Duke cruised to the regional finals, where only a complete mental collapse kept them from returning to a fifth Final Four in the 1990s.

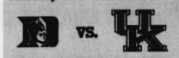
The Devils may have been shocked by Connecticut the other night for the title, but a fifth game in the 1990s is impressive, even if Duke's record is only 2-3 in the title contest.

Duke has more tourney wins (82-31), more All-Americans (7-3), more NBA draft picks (11-9) and has won two of the three head-to-head matchups.

Last Saturday was lonely and cruel.

After a week of agonizing acceptance, reality set in when a Cat-less Final Four took place in St. Pete. It was rough. Biological calendars kept prepping students up for a block party on the corner of Woodland and Euclid. Families were set for a late night drive into Lexington, and UK fans were ready for a Tuesday night celebration in Rupp Arena. All because that feeling in late March had become as routine as grandma's house on Christmas Eve.

Many went on a Final Four boycott. "I don't plan on finding out who wins the championship until next year's previews come out," one fan said.

There was an itch, though, in the back of their brains. I've got to check out the score. When the Wildcat faithful noticed Duke was losing to UConn, it suddenly became their duty to root on the Huskies. A 10-year victory was on the line, a title still to be given: "Team of the Decade." UK earned that title Monday when the Devils lost the NCAA game, giving Coach K a 2-3 record in the title game.

UK and Duke hold four 30-win seasons and two national championships in the '90s. From that mark, we can begin to break down the statistics. Duke has appeared in five Final Fours to UK's four. Look at any other team statistic, and you'll find UK has the edge. The Cats have a better NCAA Tournament winning percentage, a better decade winning percentage and two more Associated Press Top 10 finishes than Duke. Most important, UK has more wins (282 to 271).

Duke's individual numbers look good on paper, but it sure hasn't produced the hardware in Durham. Its seven All-Americans (compared with UK's three) have brought home the same amount of titles. (Ronald could have coached this year's bunch of Micky D's All-Americans to the Final Four.) They've had 11 draft picks to UK's nine, yet 10 Cats are in the NBA compared to six Devils.

Duke also did a bad job of handling adversity. When Coach K sat out the 1994-95 season because of a bad back, the Blue Devils posted a 13-18 season. After the loss of four players to the NBA after the '96 season, losing Shepard to redshirt Derek Anderson to injury in mid-season, UK handled adversity quite well. They made it to the finals.

Someone in print has to declare a king. Not only is UK the team of the 1990s, it's the team of the century. Who-CL?

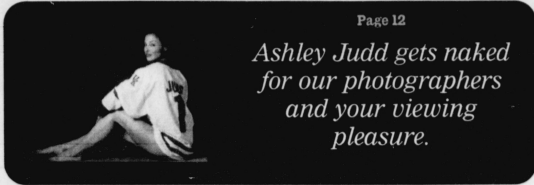

Another celebrity wants to get in on the action as well.

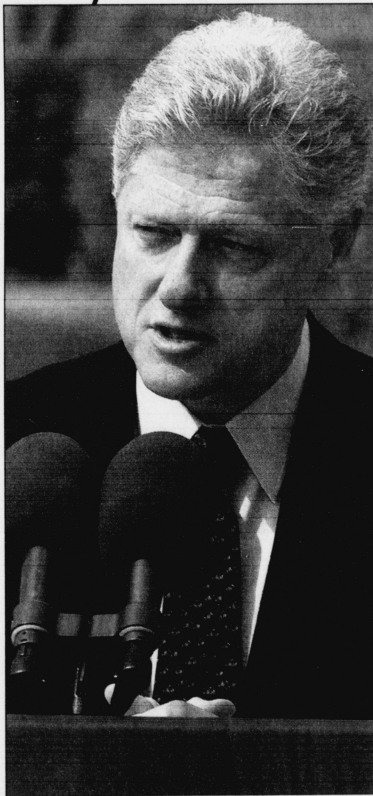
