Individualized language instruction is being offered for the first time at UK

Taking a cue from Ohio State Uni-versity, the UK Slavic and Oriental language department has imple-mented individualized instruction in Russian

Deborah Rooney, a visiting professor who received her degree at Ohio State, will teach in the new program for one semester. Next Fall, Rooney will leave UK and Gerald Janecek, Slavic and Oriental chairman, will teach the course.
According to Rooney, Ohio State has had individualized language instruction for years, but it has only been copyrighted since 1978. OSU has instruction in Russian, Polish, German, French, Arabic and Span-



Strip miner's rights should not override those of landowner

It is an age-old question. Personal property versus private profit. Memories fighting minerals.

Does Kentucky's broad-form mineral deed give some the right to strip away the history of a lifetime from a plot of land in order to extract minerals, despite protests from

of land in order to extract inherais, despite process from
the owner?

Right now the answer is yes. But the circumstances surrounding the controversial issue are going to be investigated by the Kentucky General Assembly, predicted to surface on the legislative floors sometime this week.

The issue recently has came to light through the plight
of Elizabeth Wooton, a 65-year-old widow in poor health,
who is being sued by a Bulan coal operator. The operator
is asserting his rights and privileges under the broad-form
mineral deed to mine her property.

The operator, thanks to the deed, possesses the right to
enter Wooton's property, to use its trees for mining purposes, to build roads and the option to operate upon its surface.

Between 1883 and 1915, a number of mountain specu-lators purchased mineral rights from mountain residents Surface owners kept the property and paid taxes. But min-eral owners bought all rights to extractable substances be-

neath the surface. Kentucky courts, according to historians, have backed up the deeds in court, giving mineral owners the right to extract their property despite the feelings of the surface owners. One official said surface owners only have a license to occupy the property until the mineral owner decides to destroy the land to remove any minerals.

But for Wooton, the land sought after by the coal oper tor cannot be bought. Her husband is buried beside t house. She raised her 11 children in the farmhouse. S promised to her husband on his deathbed that she wou never let the land be strip-mined.

The assembly must weigh the two issues carefully be-fore issuing a revision. The rights of the surface owner must be defined and protected. And the legal power of an-cient mineral deeds should be tempered, allowing for the rights of the people who live there above the minerals that are sought.

Police probe ticket sales

Rentucky State Police are investigating a charge against Kenneth Ray Lawson, 41, of Winchester, for collecting \$34,000 from UK basketball fans, according to a story in yesterday's Lexington Herald-Leader.
Eighty-five people in Fayette, Clark, Bourbon and Montgomery counties supposedly paid \$350 each for sets of UK basketball tickets, which they never received.
Lawson is currently in the Bourbon County Jail where he cannot be reached for comment.
However, Jeffrey Jett, a state police detective, was able to get an explanation from him on Thursday. His story was not very substantial, according to Jett. The state police are still investigating this case and will present their findings to a Bourbon County grand jury next month.

Lawson was allegedly involved in the ticket selling from May 1983 to January 1984. He not only promised the 85 people tickets but he also told them they would be placed on a priority list through which they would be able to buy tickets directly from UK.

SAN SALVADOR, El Salvador — Air force planes bombed and strafed leftist rebel camps in the north Friday, and El Salvador's infantry launched an anti-guerilla sweep in the eastern province of Usulutan.

In San Salvador, police said they arrested 15 labor activists suspected of cooperating with the guerrillas. They had been among 85 people police questioned Thursday at a Jesuit retreat.

There were no reports of casualties in either operation.

U.S. attache dies in plane crash

GUATEMALA CITY — A U.S. military attache was killed in a plane crash 15 miles north of Guatemala City, a spokesman for the U.S. Defense Department sid.

"He was part of the embassy staff in Guatemala," said Lt. Col. Tom Jones, the spokesman, in Washington. "He was on a normal diplomatic mission with" 11 Guatemalans who were on board the aircraft, Jones said.

Jones did not say if the Guatemalans were killed. But well-placed sources in Guatemala said an unknown number of Guatemalans died in the crash of a Guatemalan air force plane.


