Cats Turn Tables And Toll Knell On 43 Years Of Vanderbiltism

KENTUCKY TAKES COMMODORES BY 21-13

Kentucky's football team kept a date with destiny and 43 years of waiting were climaxed as the Wild-cats—for the first time in the memory of man—defeated the Vanderbilt Commodores by a 21-13 margin Saturday in Nashville.

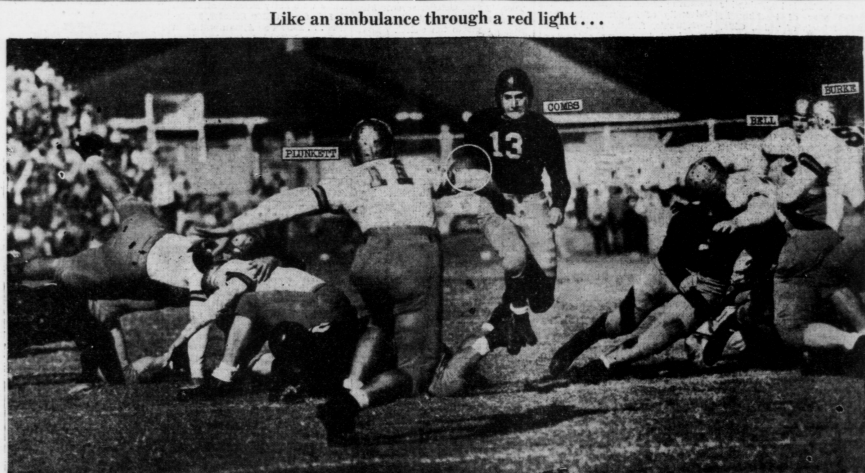
Picked to finish a comfortable second in the game, Kentucky was except for the first five minutes, the aggressor team. Not only did the lanky Cat backs tear the Vanderbilt line to pieces, but they beat the Commodores with their own weapon, the forward pass.

Kentucky put a well drilled team on the field, one which the experts agree is likely to furnish further upsets to the Southeastern conference fight. The Cats handled the ball well—but one fumble all afternoon—while superb blocking at times was demonstrated on plays through the line. Forced to resort to passes when its running attack was checked, Vanderbilt blurted shots in constant danger of interception by the alert Kentucky secondary.

Digging deep into his bag of tricks, Coach Ab Kirwan sent Ernal Allen, a 150 pound halfback with a passing eye as deadly as Robin Hood's bow, after the Commodores. Not only did Allen personally score the leather 61 yards but he found vacant arms for 7 of his 12 passes.

However, in spite of his brilliant show, Allen was forced to share the limelight with Junior Jones, Dave Zoller, Hoot Combs and Captain Joe Shepherd in the backfield and John Elmer, Bob Palmer, Phil Scott, Harry Denham, Jim Hardin, Bill McCubbin in fact, the entire Wild-cat line.

More Commodores were sent into the fray than saw action at the battle of Manila Bay as Coach Ray Morrison sought in vain for some combination that could cope with Kentucky's drives. When Vander-

bill would put its secondary back to protect its vulnerable passing zones, the Cat ball carriers would concentrate on their fire on the line. It was like deciding whether to be hit with a black-jack or a lead pipe.

Statistics tell the case with which Kentucky controlled the game. In first downs the Cats held a 19-6 edge and rushed the ball 220 yards to 40 for the Sailors. Kentucky passes were good 11 out of 23 times while Vandy hit with 10 of 21.

For the Vanderbilt cause the efforts of Junius Plunkett, left-handed passer, Ed Hiestand, giant end, Hardy Housman, and Roy Higgins were outstanding. The Commodores presented a dangerous aerial display but their runners were practically helpless against Kentucky's aggressive line.

The game was just 16 plays old when Vandy scored its first touchdown. The Sailors took the ball on their own 42 yard line after Shepherd had been forced to punt. Plunkett rifled two consecutive passes to Hiestand good for 25 yards and an off-sides penalty moved the ball to Kentucky's 28. On the next play Flanagan passed to Ed Ralph Hinton for the touchdown and Hiestand added the extra point from placement.

It was the Kentucky line that produced the break that knotted the score. On fourth down Elmer and Denham broke through to block Higgins' punt on the Cat 38. Allen shot around right end for 16 yards but his next try, a pass, was short.

At the half time intermission, the score was still tied tighter than a case of lock-jaw.

As the third quarter opened, Combs' kick-off was returned 19 yards to the Vanderbilt 33. Plunkett passed 33 yards to Hiestand and up to Kentucky's. Fading far back down the field, Plunkett flipped a long pass intended for Housman but Captain Shepherd intercepted on his own 31 yard line and, with beautiful blocking, dashed 79 yards to the marker that put the Cats in to the lead. Again Hardin added the point with a kick.

The final Cat touchdown came after a sustained drive of 78 yards down the field. With Combs power driving into the Vandy line and Allen shooting passes to Scott and Denham broke through to block Zoeller's pass to Scott and Allen smashed his way into the promised land. This time Jones added to the total with a place kick.

After that it did not matter that Vanderbilt scored in four plays. Plunkett, after the kick-off, quick kicked to the Kentucky 8 yard line but Mullins booted the ball back to the Cat 49. From this point Plunkett rifled a pass to Hiestand in the end zone for the final marker.

Calling 'Em Wild

Dudley Stadium, Nashville, Tenn. (Kernel Special Service)—Without consulting the American Bar Association, Kentucky's football team has appointed itself attorney for the defense.

The Wildcats have taken it upon themselves to defend this sports writer, who, after seeing them mail VMI without getting up a sweat, sprang to his typewriter and showered them with superlatives. One fellow I know, in fact I live with him 365 days in the year, was so enthused that he was ready to compare the team, and not unfavorably, to the discovery of fire, the first printing press, A. Lincoln, G. Washington and the Monroe Doctrine.

When I first ventured the prediction that Kentucky had a fine football team I thought that I was merely whistling past the grave-yard. Then I actually grew to believe it but couldn't offer proof. But after hinting that Kentucky would mail Vanderbilt, I began preparations for a deluge of mail beginning "You Bum" or "Dear Idiot." I bought a pair of asbestos gloves to wear in opening some of the hotter letters while some I knew should not be read before any less hardened company than the Foreign Legion.

Then Kentucky came to my rescue with an all gold, yard wide 21-13 win over Vandy here in Nashville Saturday.

Recorded For Posterity—That's the way it will stand in the record book; in next black type, an inconspicuous line to be glanced at and forgotten by generations of football players and lovers of the game.

But that was only the result. To simply say Kentucky beat Vanderbilt, and let it go at that, is like saying the Titanic hit an ice-berg, the Indians massacred Custis or Brutus knifed Caesar. That one short line is a terrific understatement. The Wildcats, in testing their first Southeastern conference meat since 1897, had it over Vanderbilt like a tent over a circus; in first downs a 19-6, in rushing by 220 yards to 40 and in completed passes 11 to 10.

Wildcats Spotty—This does not mean the Cats played over their heads in scuttling the Commodore ship for the first time in history. They did not. In fact, at times the Kentucky blocking was almost pathetic and the runners had to carry on without any help. But at other times the Cat blockers cut down tacklers like grass before a lawn mower.

Then Kentucky alternated two lines that held the longest Vandy run of the afternoon to five yards. Against the hard charging Cat forwards, the heavier Commodore leather lugging corps was as helpless as a wooden legged man in a forest fire.

We've Got Something There—Yes; sir, this Kentucky team has more on the ball than the cover and if I had time I'd compare it, and not unfavorably, to the first printing press, Man 'o' War, the Grand Canyon, A. Lincoln, etc.
