



A BUST OF CHARLES DICKENS



A FINE SERIES. These plates were issued originally to illustrate Chapman and Hall's Household Edition of "Pickwick", and were engraved on wood by the Brothers Dalziel and others.

The present plates have all been beautifully colored by hand [artist unknown; perhaps by Pailthorpe?] and are without titles. With the exception of the title-page, the plates are full-page, with hand-colored borders of various colors around each, and are deftly inlaid on heavy drawing-paper. From the W. R. Hearst collection, and with the L. G. Du Bois bookplate.







