Dear Mr North

Your letter of June 7th found me in bed with a bad attack of influenza, & it was a great treat to me to receive it.

When I was getting better I amused myself with copying out some Kelly letters for you, as I am sorry to say those nos of the Saturday Review are now out of print. I couldn't fit them

all done, & as we start for Switzerland tomorrow for 3 weeks, I thought I would send what I had copied, & let the other 6 follow when I get home again.

Please don't think it gives me any trouble, it is a real labour of love to me to copy Lamb's letters, especially for the benefit of any one who really appreciates him.

I am very sorry about Mr. Poor, but one can understand it, as I am a complete stranger to him.

I may possibly meet him next year, when he goes to see Mr. T. J. Wise, & then perhaps

he will be more friendly, I will show him my collection & offer exchanges. I think I heard about that false portrait of Lamb. Yes, I have a copy of the Balm Bibliophile edition - bought it from Mr Drake some years ago; it would be of course indispensable to anyone aiming at a complete collection of Lamb letters.

No, I had not heard of that extra-illustrated copy of Anjens "Letters." Can you tell me anything

more about it - its present whereabouts etc. Would it be possible at this distance of time to get hold of a catalogue of the sale?

I should imagine your guess of 50 unpub: letters in America, to be a good deal under the mark!
