Dear Sir

I am greatly obliged by the very hearty letter
of commendation which you sent to us on 30 Dec.,
and very heartily reciprocate your friendly expression,
adding you to the list of very good men who have cheered
me in the same way for many past years.

My work is not of the highest order - it is only as the
peculiar compiler that I have acted. But this action
has continued since Jan. 1819 ^{a year after} when I became of
age. And "long dropping wears away stones." In these
46 years I have no doubt helped to advocate, plead,
very many winds. I thank God & take courage!

I'd be glad if all the leaders could appreciate, as you do,
the risk & loss of taking a clear stand. Years ago, when I
charged the Slavery contest upon John C. Calhoun, I lost
all South Carolina at once. And since, as further
development made further action necessary, we
endeavoured, "Standing in our lot" to do what we could -

to testify, if we could do no more; yet he believed me
while lamenting that neither by word nor by money
could I take part in the fight - Yet such support
as the living age could give, was not sufficient.

Perhaps I have been made as sensible of this, by
the wrath of Copperheads, as by any praise on
the other side. God knows that I would
gladly have given not only my own life - but
that of all my family - to secure the success of
our cause.

I have never doubted. It seemed to me that
the path of Divine Providence shone out bright &
brighter. How much has been brought! And the
strength of the Rebellion has only sunk its object
deeper - & the length of the fight at last will
bring all the North together. Our wheat must be
winnowed.

I am overburdened with work at this season, but
cannot delay, however hardly, to thank you for
yesterday, which is now in my pocket to be shown to
wife & daughters.

Wishing you a Happy New Year - I am your
grateful friend E. Little, (63 years old today.)
