My Dear Mary

Sergeant Talford, as you may know, is about to publish a history of Mr Lambton and I have sanctioned my manuscript & am looking over my letters to supply any thing which would render it more complete - In one of your letters I find you referring to some criticism of his about a widow burning weeds - which I seem to recollect as a very good thing - but cannot recollect it out definitely - perhaps you may - and if as I suppose liberally, Mr Moxon (who married my friend, Mr's, Isob's, mine) and is collecting for him, can get a frank and inclose what I have sent him (which he has been obliged to have copied, Oime!) of letters and scraps, to you - you will see what it is may be acceptable - with any thing - respecting him or his sister - which you may recollect and which has escaped me - I sent 2 letters by frank since I received your last - but not having seen the person who was to forward them - I am uncertain if they have reached you - I heard from home about 10 days ago - My father & mother well - Barbara & the children had colds - but were getting better of them - Fred Drunk tea with me yesterday - The says Annisa has a very sweet voice - and by ear has learnt to sing at church - joins them & practices at home - He has invented a draining plough which answers uncommonly well & does not cost more than a common one - You will receive an account of my god - daughter M M Fox's court marriage when you get my letter - and with kindest love to Miss Norwille & Geneva believe me your affectionate A.
