in mentioning my recollec-  
tions in them. — I remember  
now, that Well Quin's birth-  
place, was proposed to me to  
see, when I was at Here-  
ford; but Garrick's pre-

sented "metal nose attractive",  
and I found it, at the house of  
a goldsmith, which had formerly  
been part of the "Angel Inn",  
where he was born —  
But for your kind notice,  
& notification, of my error,  
I might never have recalled  
all this, to my rectifica-  
tion of it; therefore, I  
pray you to accept my  
sincere thanks. —  
also, to present my best  
compliments to Mr. Porter, &  
to the young ladies —  
feeling, indeed, a new  
satisfaction, from their  
showing it in signing, dear  
sir, with much esteem,
