My dear H. T.

Murray I think has given proof  
of being in earnest, by printing the concluding volumes  
of the two editions. But whether he be or not, it  
was always my intention to leave a copy of my history  
with all the improvements that further information could  
enable me to make. This I shall do liberally, & at my  
own convenience.

It is not likely that the Duke should of that history  
pretty much as Nelson might think of any life of him  
if he could read it. For it is certain that I know nothing  
of navigation, nor of the art of war, military or naval.  
But I have sense enough to keep close to my documents  
where technicalities cannot be avoided, & to compensate  
for this inevitable deficiency. I may say to you that  
I believe I know every thing else such as history ought  
to know. And in the history of such a struggle, battles &  
tactics are the lead part of it. - Col. Gurnwood's publica-  
-tion gives us all that the Duke might have given had he been  
so pleased; & a great deal which I am sure he could  
have written from any body, was put into my hands by  
Marguerite Wellesley's direction. - I am from this alone I  
suppose to be a careless person. My materials of appeal

correspondence was ample, I had private friends &  
private letters in abundance, & opportunities of asking  
questions concerning such & circumstances from persons  
well acquainted with them. Whatever the Duke may have  
said there, it is in my book that the ~~old~~ story of the  
war will be told hereafter.

I shall figure for ten successive months with my  
poems in the weekly journals, & am wholly desirous to  
meet with more help than kindness from them. My  
poets & poetry will in the way of reputation react  
upon each other; - & if the poems have any tolerable  
success as a speculation, ten minutes conversation with  
Murray would induce him to embark in the war.

I give you joy of the Parenthesis, & heartily  
wish you all happiness to the end of the chapter,  
wishing also that the chapter may be a long one.  
Your counsel is very beautiful, & wise as  
will.
