Mr. Samuel Warren, D.C.L., died on Sunday evening at his residence in London, in his 70th year. Deceased was son of the late Rev. Dr. Warren, and was born in Denbighshire. He was the author of "Ten Thousand a Year," "Now and Then," and other novels. In February, 1856, he was returned to the House of Commons for Midhurst, which he represented till February, 1859, when he was appointed by Lord Chelmsford a Master in Lunacy. The post vacated is worth £2,000 a year. Mr. Warren resigned the Recordership of Hull in 1874.
