May 6th 1823

Dear Sir,

On my return to Gloucester Place
the morning I ~~received~~ received your directions
for Mr Carrings. I found your oblige present
of your Books and the Medallion of

are forwarded to Westmoreland. In a day
or two I quit this place for a trip, I hope
I will have than three weeks, chiefly in
Holland. If I return through London it will
not be ~~to~~ to stop 24 hours, that I shall
be unable to call, and inquire after
Mr I have than long; for whose recovery
I assure you I feel not a little anxious.
Pray present my best regards and wishes to
them both in which I am to sincerely
join. — Mrs Southam who is
now here begs me to repeat the assurance

of his sense of Mr Chantry's kindness in
offering to sketch the monument, & himself; and
the further entreats (from us the performers
of this mark of respect to his deceased
wife much in his mind) that you would
be so good ~~now~~ as to communicate with
him as soon as Mr C's state of health
and engagements allow him to fulfill
his obliging intentions. I enclose this
