STOCKDALE, Percival, was born 26 Oct., 1736, at Branxton, Northumberland. He studied at St. Andrew's, after which he obtained a commission in the army, and served in the island of Minorca; but in 1759 he took orders, and officiated some time in London, where he also wrote for the booksellers. He next became chaplain of a manof-war, and in 1783 was presented to the livings of Lesbury and Long Houghton, Northumberland, where he died 11 Sept., 1811. He wrote a 'Life of Waller;' 'Essay on the Genius of Pope;' Treatise on Education; 'Lectures on the Poets;' his own 'Memoirs,'&c.
