

JERROLD, William Blanchard, the son of the preceding, was a journalist, and the author of several works of fiction and travel. He was educated at Brompton Grammar School, and was brought up as an artist, but did not follow the profession. He has contributed to many of the leading newspapers and periodicals of the day, and succeeded his father as editor of "Lloyd's Weekly Newspaper." His chief novels are "The Disgrace to the Family," and the "Story of a Bill;" his principal plays are "Cool as a Cucumber," "The Chatterbox," and "Beau Brummel;" while among his miscellaneous writings may be named the "Life and Remains of Douglas Jerrold," "Swedish Sketches," "Chronicles of a Crutch," "Children of Lutetia," and "On the Boulevards."
