THE KING'S CERTIFICATE OF HONOUR FOR DISCHARGED FIGHTERS.—On the left is a reduced reproduction of the certificate to be presented to soldiers (with red border) and on the right that for the Navy (with blue border). The certificate, which has been designed by Mr. Bernard Partridge, the famous cartoonist, will be given to all warrant officers, non-commissioned officers and men who have served since August 4, 1914, and have been discharged on account of wounds or of disability incurred on active service or directly attributable to enemy action. A special "second certificate" will be awarded to men who, after discharge, voluntarily serve again, and are again discharged as disabled.
