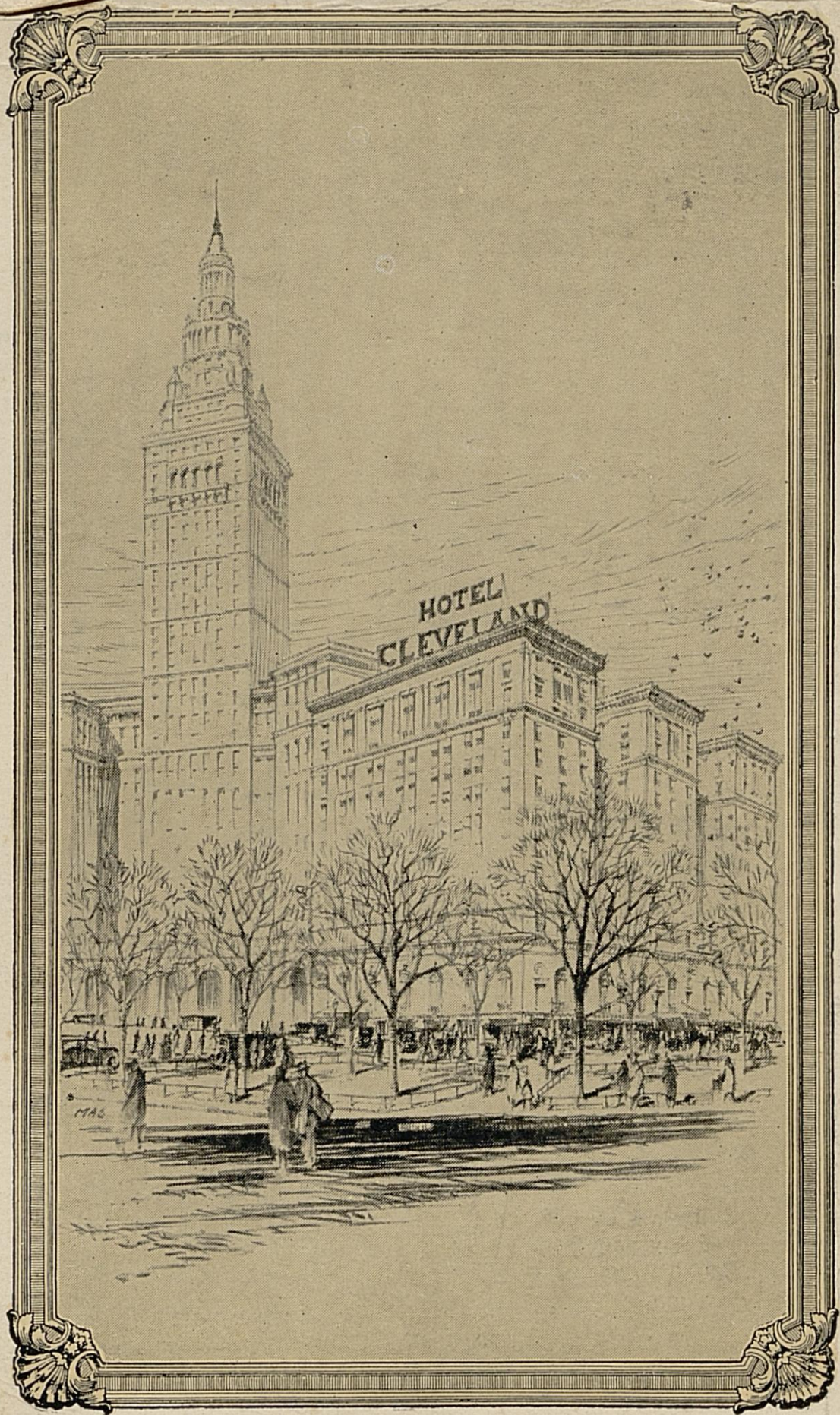
The enclosed letters are the only mail which seems to be of a personal nature.

I am certainly missing you. For some reason I have tired very quickly and so have gone out very little. The apartment seems very empty but, thank goodness, there are only six more days.

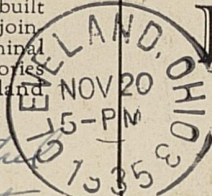
Yesterday I had lunch with Foster and John Dunlop. Apparently Wood is still at home. Probably Anne and he will be on the way to Tucson the next we hear.
