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Mr. Macdonald said that, the more unanimous the house was on one prominent feature of the speech, the more notice had they for noticing those points in the general state of affairs on which they disputed. He was rejoiced to find that retrenchment had taken place in our military establishments: if there had not, ministers would have deserved impeachment. But he regretted that of civil retrenchment he regretted that no hopes, but vague ones, were held out: especially he regretted ^{this}, in reference to the collection of the revenue, which now cost four millions annually. ~~He instances~~ the collection of the Stamp Duties and the Land Tax. As to the increase of the revenue, it undoubtedly ^{had been able} was, that the people ~~were~~ ^{ought} ^{to pay} nearly four millions more than last year: but that would not remedy ~~the~~ ^{what would} national evils: nothing but a ^{moral and political} increase of commerce could do that: and that would bring other evils, by absorbing too great part of our population ^{now much as} manufacturing labor. This led him to consider the present condition of our population: on which subject, he lamented the increase of crime, the overflow of our prisons, the legitimization of pauperism. ^{From whom} ^{poorly} passing to foreign ^{law} ⁱⁿ ^{respect to} foreign policies, we might in various ways, ^{as if} ^{engaged} in war: what should hinder it? The alliances, which we had made? — They were wholly ineffectual for that end. ^{thought as imp. as a dead tumult in} For what were they effectual? For ^{2d} ^{nothing} ^{which the nation required} ^{from} ^{the} ^{abandon} ^{at first purchased by large amounts: by France} ^{but it was not} ^{now} ^{under} ^{Spain} ^{under} ^{Portugal} ^{had} ^{been} ^{brought} (^{if not brought}) to give up ^{but not renounce} ^{in spite} ^{of} ^{itself had} ^{itself} ^{to} ^{all the services rendered to the Bourbons.} This infernal trade would thrive, so long as France opposed its' entire abolition: and then it did. To return to ~~the internal~~ politics, — the speech was wholly silent on all acknowledged grievances. In particular, with respect to the abuses of Public Charities, no notice had been taken of the act for appointing a Commission to inquire into them: the speech did not say whether that act had been put in force. Here Mr. Macdonald, ^{before} ~~after~~ ^{saying} that he would not trouble the house on this

subject considering how much his friend Mr. Brougham would be sure to trouble them in the course of the Session, did however trouble them a little; and travelled over the old ground ground - insisting chiefly on these four points: 1. that the objects of the inquiry commission were too much narrowed; 2. that the powers by which the commission was ~~to~~ ^{was to complete the objects the remand} ~~more~~ ^{less} limited. 3. that ~~is~~ the nomination of the ~~Com~~ members of that commission was bad in principle, ^{as contained in the original bill} inasmuch as it proceeded from the Secretary of State and not from the House of Commons: 4. that the nomination was bad in fact, ^{now} inasmuch as it excluded all who were friendly to earnest and radical inquiry - more especially as it excluded him who was the ~~head~~ ^{of} the whole ~~inquiry~~ business - and the original cause that any inquiry was at all ^{things in general} ~~not~~ ^{in itself} thought of. Passing from particulars to ~~general~~, - and to speak of the conduct of affairs in the ~~to~~ largest extent, - there was throughout the nation a general dissatisfaction, and in some cases a acknowledged malignant and ~~temporary~~ dissatisfaction, manifested ^{such a} with the present administration. Those, who moved and seconded the Address, ~~it~~ seemed to think this criminal. For his own part, it gave him no pleasure to witness it. But certainly it could not but extort from all persons this conclusion, that this dissatisfaction could not exist without an adequate cause. What was this cause? ~~How~~ whence was it that an administration, & under whom it would be ~~paltry~~ party-spirit to deny that the ^{our} military glory of this country had been carried to the highest point, were ~~viewed~~ viewed by the majority of the people with indifference and with disaffection by the remainder? whence, I say, is it? - ~~Like~~ what is the solution of this apparent riddle?
