
Human rights activist Hill tells life story

What doesn't kill can only make one stronger, and Paul Hill is living proof.
He came to UK "to educate and to inspire" and to question the ways humans are being treated by the governments and the police.
In November 1974, Hill was arrested by armed British special forces and subjected to grueling interrogation methods. He said he was "interrogated eight to sometimes 36 hours non-stop," as well as being "denied sleep, given bad food and threatened with guns."
Hill — unlike his co-accused, who received sentenees ranging from 30 to 35 years in

Hill — unlike his co-accused, who received sentences ranging from 30 to 35 years in prison — was told he would "spend the rest of his natural life in prison, never to see the outside again." Furthermore, Hill said the judge stated, "My only regret is that I couldn't sentence you to death."
Hill was told this, even while evidence that proved his innocence was hidden in a police station.
While in prison, Hill spent five of his 15 years in solitary confinement, where he became physically and mentally ill for a time.
During the rest of his time in prison, Hill and a few other prisoners held four separate protests, which involved the dismantling of four different prison roofs, causing seven million pounds worth of damage.
Hill continued by sharing his views on the death penalty and human rights problems here in the Cauldrid Hall last night.
He compared the treatment of young blacks in

NATION Term limit battle up next for GOP Contract

WASHINGTON — Anticipating defeat on a key element in their "Contract With America," House Republicans hope to reap credit for holding a vote on term limits while blaming Democrats for the measure's likely demise.

"If we get half the Democrats, we will pass the term limits constitutional amendment," House Speaker Newt Gingrich declared yesterday as debate opened. He said that more than 85 percent of GOP Jawmakers would vote for the measure and "its ought to be possible to get half the Democrats to side with the country that elects them."

Gingrich's partisan jabbing aside, the term limits such has had a rocky path toward this week's expected vote, particularly for an issue that commands support in the 70 percent range in public opinion polls.

It takes a two-thirds vote — 200 if all 435 lawmakers wote — to send the measure to the Senate. Republicans hold 230 seats in the House, Democrats 204, and there is one independent.

Supreme Court debates drug testing

Supreme Court debates drug testing
WASHINGTON — A lively debate about students' privacy rights and the war on drugs seemed to leave the Supreme Court deeply divided yesterday over mandatory drug tests in public schools.

In a case closely watched by educators nation-wide, an Oregon school district and the Clinton administration urged the justices to allow such tests for all student-arbitlets in schools where drug use is deemed a problem.

But a teen-ager's lawyer said his client wrongly was barred from his junior high football team for refusing to undergo urinalysis because such tests amount to unreasonable searches.

The court's decision, expected by late June, could deal with student arbitets only. But, depending on how broadly the justices rule, the decision conceivably could affect all schoolchildren — even those in elementary school.

WORTO Cult may have used bacteria TOKYO — The doomsday cult suspected in a nerve gas attack on the Tokyo sulway may also have been preparing for another, equally alarming form of combat warraer with deadly bacteria.

Police raiding the compounds of the Aum Shinri Kyo seet already had found large quantities of chemicals, some of which reportedly can be used to produce the deadly sarin gas used in the subway attack.

Then yesterday came news of another disturbing find. Lethal bacteria whose discovery would suggest that the group, known in English as Supreme Truth, might have been trying to prepare for germ warfare.

The sect is suspected in the March 20 subway attack that killed 10 people and sickened about 5,000.

National Debate Tournament at West Georgia College.

Debate coach J. W. Patterson said he usually doesn't like sports comparisons with his debaters, but he acknowledges he hopes his highly ranked team makes it farther than the UK basketball team did last weekend when it fell in the NCAA regional finals to North Carolina.

Although the seeds have not been announced yet, Patterson said the competition for the coveted No. 1 seed is spread among UK seniors Paul Skiermont and Jay Finch, and teams from Wake Forest and Harvard universities.

"I think we're going in in good shape," Patterson said.

He said Wake Forest probably will get the No. 1 seed because it has the most major victories this season, although UK has posted a winning record over Wake Forest. Skiermont, who was top speaker last year, and Finch probably will have to settle for a sec-

ond or third seed depending on Harvard's rank.
Patterson said that Skiermont is considered by many to be one of the top debaters in the country because he has won the most top speaker awards at tournaments for the past two years.
"I think our chances of winning the tournament are about the same as last year," Patterson Said. Skiermont and UK senior Jason Patil were the top-seeded team last year, but were eliminated in the quarterfinals.
Patil and UK junior Jason Renzelmann make up the second UK team that qualified for the 72-team tournament bracket this year. Patterson said they are a likely darkhorse duo capable of defeating any team in the country.
Patil is one of the top two researchers in the country, Patterson said.

With UK's basketball season having drawn to a close, it's high time for Wildeat basketball buffs to turn to their second-favorite sport for a while.

The word is that the Cats are far from finished in their quest to sign some of the nation's top high school prospects for next season. The only done deal is 6-foot-9 Oliver Simmons from Nashville.

UK has received oral commitments from Wayne Turner, a 6-1 point guard from Beaver Country Day School in Massachusetts and Nazr Mohammed, a 6-10, 280-pound center from Chicago.

Those guys, along with 6-8 forward Jason Lathrem, who will walk on next season, probably are coming to campus next fall.





Phones in aid office automated

An automated attendant is taking over the phone lines at the Financial Aid Office. As of April 10, one number is all you need.

Now, students who need to gain access to financial aid advisers call a variety of numbers for special avariety of numbers for special avariety of numbers nake a call, they take a big risk-receiving the dreaded busy signal.

On any given day, the Financial Aid Office receives 250 to 300 calls on the main phone line alone, said Rhonda Bryant, scholarship coordinator.

"We're eliminating the personal phone lines in hopes of gaining a quicker, cleaner method by which the students can obtain the information they need," she said.

The new system can port four incoming calls at a time, which will speed up the processing time for students.

After getting through to the main number, students can immediately dial the extension of the person they wish to speak with or listen for prompts for additional messages.

The operator can be reached by dialing '0.

The new phone system is the result of a re-engineering of the whole office last fall.

The system itself was the brain-child of the public relations committee.

Judy Osborne, instructor in the communications and marketing department, has programmed the

"Judy has mapped it all out for us," Bryant said.

Osborne has incorporated all the fine tuning for the Financial Aid Office, programming every-ching from messages, to which group of people are reached which Touch-Tone number.

An official notification of the number changes and instructions on using the system will be mailed to all students living on campus about a week before the system is operational.

Those students living off cam-pus may obtain copies of the noti-fication at the same time in 127 Funkhouser Building.
