Ragland pleads guilty to manslaughter

UK graduate will serve 3 more days under house arrest in death of former football player

Shane Ragland pleaded guilty to second-degree manslaughter in the 1994 sniper-like shooting of a UK football player yesterday morning at a hearing in Fayette Circuit Court.

Ragland will serve three more days of home inaccreation before gening free. He was awaiting his second murder trial in the death of former offensive lineman Trent DiGiuro.

New technology spots repeat parking offenders

Bill Ayers has been cruising through UK parking lots as usual this year, making sure cars have permits and ticketing those that don't. But now he has a helper in the passenger seat to scan the masses. The new Automated License Plate Recognition system, a high-

tech tool that UK is the second campus nationwide to implement, notfies Ayers, a parking control supervisor assistant, every time he passes a
car that has outstanding parking
fines.

This new enforcement method
will help free up parking spots for
permit holders, said Don Thornton,
director of Parking and Transportation Services.

The license plate is then run against a database of vehicles with outstanding parking citations, notify-ing officers immediately with an alert sound on their laptop if a match is

AG tells Fletcher trustees must resign

Kentucky's attorney general has called for the resignation of three members of UK's Board of Trustees, saying the board's Republicam anjority violates a state law. The statute requires that the number of Republican and Democratic appointees on the boards of trustees at the state's public research universities reflect the affiliations of registered voters. Gov. Ernie Fletcher's recent appointments to the boards at UK and the University of Louisville violate the law, said Attorney General Greg Stumbo, a Democrat, in a letter to the Republican governor yesterday.

in a letter to the Republican governor yes-terday. "The citizens of Kentucky are entitled to representation on these Boards that faithfully reflects their own political choic-ess and makeup." Stumbo said in the letter. "By creating a Republican majority among gubernatorial apopintees to those boards, you have denied the people their guaran-teed voice."

In Kentucky, 57 percent of registered voters are Democrats and 37 percent are Republicans, according to the Kentucky State Board of Elections.

SG proposes cutting salaries in

Student Government President Nick Phelps and his staff are taking a pay cut. In the first draft of the 2007-08 Operating Budget, which passed unanimously at the Appropriations and Revenue meeting last night, the SG executive and legislative staff salaries are 56,500 less than last year. "I feel like compensating the staff is important if we expect any kind of work out of them," Phelps said. "But we've worked hard to decrease the budget this year, and paying the staff less is part of those cuts." Thelps will be paid \$1,000 less than last year's president, Jonah Brown, and the Senate president's salary went down \$1,200.

"Our budget is less this year," Phelps said. "We have less (money) to start with, and we're spending less everywhere in the

The 2007-08 budget also removed the salaries for the chairmen of the SG committees, a cut A&R Chairman Jesse Parrish didn't expect.

tees, a cut A&R Chairman Jesse Parrish didn't expect.

"I was surprised to see these salaries removed," Parrish said. "It's not because I think I need to be paid, but I'm interested in hiring a support staff to help me, and I think we should be able to pay them. They have to be compensated to do the work."

Senate President Tyler Montell said amendments to the budget, including the salaries of committee chairs, would be made at Wednesday's full Senate meeting, "These are issues that need to be



Johnson signed with UK as one of the nation's most highly touted recruits, earning numerous All-America selections and Kentucky's Mr. Football award. He made 29 tackles and earned Southeastern Conference All-Freshman honors last year but still felt like he fell short of both his and the fans' expectations. This offseason, he took strides to prove he can live up to those expectations as a sophomore.



Loosening rules on mining technique will harm region

Mountaintop removal, the destruc-tive strip-mining practice that has rav-ished the Appalachian landscape for more than 20 years, is on the verge of gaining a stronger legal foothold if a proposed federal regulation becomes law.

proposed federal regulation becomes law.

The mining technique entails blowing the tops off mountains to make the coal inside more easily accessible, and a large amount of waste, known as spoil, is produced in the process. The proposed new regulation, which the Office of Surface Mining Reclamation and Enforcement published Friday, makes it easier for mine operators to dump the spoil within 100 feet of flowing streams as long as they agree to mininize damage to streams "to the extent possible."

But the proposal gives no specific guidelines about which waste-dump-ing practices fall outside the law. Instead, it says regulators will decide "on a case-by-case basis" whether mine operators have failed to do enough to avoid damaging the environment.

So whereas current law errs on the

So whereas current law errs on the side of the environment — mine operators must get an exemption each time they put spoil in a stream, the Kernel reported Friday — the change, if enacted, will give waste-dumpers the benefit of the doubt.

A coal-industry representative downplayed the significance of the proposed change, saying it wouldn't lead to more mountaintop removal.

"This new change is intended to codify existing practices that have been occurring for the past 50 years, said Bill Caylor, president of the Kentuckers, which was the contract of the con

already done irreparable harm to waterways in Appalachia. By 2002, spoil from mining sites had already affected 724 miles, or 12 percent, of central Appalachian streams, according to herotronmental impact statement accompanying the proposed change — and the damage isn't slowing down. "If valley fills continue to be constructed at this rate," the statement said, "an additional 724 miles of headwarts stream would be buried in 17 years or by 2018." Mountaintop removal is not an is-

Mountaintop removal is not an issue that the UK community can comfortably ignore, even if the landscapes being ruined are hundreds of miles east of Lexington. Coal makes up 14 percent of Kentucky's economy and provides 90 percent of the state's electricity, according to figures on the state's Web site (www.kentucky.gov). Even when we just flick on the lights, we're reaping the benefits of a mining practice that is ruining stream cosystems in Appalachia.

Fortunately, the new rules won't take effect until at least the end of a 60-day period, which ends Oct. 23, for residents to submit comments about the proposal.

Federal officials should be Federal officials should be strengthening regulations on moun-taintop removal, not making it easier for mine operators to harm Appalachi-an ecosystems. At this point, public outcry may be the only way to remind them of that.

the cost of installation, which Thornton estimated to be under \$1,000.
The cameras had been in the UK Hospital parking structure, said PTS spokeswoman Christy Balding Tune, where they scanned passing license plates to detect student vehicles in the hospital parking.

After one a year, PTS decided to install the system into a campus partol car. The new system combines the recognition technology with the database of UK parking violations.

"This technology is a great fit for us,"

Thornton said in an Aug. 22 news release.

'It adds value to parking permits by allowing us to enforce parking regulations effectively and efficiently."
However, if a student backs into a spot, the only way for the officer to check the license plate is by manually entering the permit number, which Thornton said the officer

would do, even though it would slow down the process of checking plates.

After the first system was installed on Aug. 8. Tune said PTS ran through a demonstration of the system. After a period of 40 minutes, the new system had scanned 2,500 license plates, five of which contained outstanding tickets.

Eventually, PTS would like to use the system for detecting stolen vehicles, as well as monitoring a vehicle's length of stay in a time-designated area, according to the news release.

If students are parked on campus and they have an unpaid citation, they risk impoundment, Tune said. If a student receives six or more parking tickets during one school year, the vehicle can be impounded each and every time it is in violation until the student pays the fines.

Tune said while PTS has a more efficient system to crack down on parking violators, it is not trying to increase punishment for students parking on campus.


