

Police: Drinking occurred in room

UK police found evidence Mon-day night that two students had been drinking in the dorm room where UK cornerback Ted Presley was fatally shot Thursday morning.

was fatally shot Thursday morning.
When police returned to 113
Blanding II shortly after 10 p.m.
Monday night to gather more evidence, officers discovered two empty containers of malt liquor in a garbage can. UK spokesman Ralph Derickson said, Police also found a bottle of gin in the refrigerator, he said.

one from possessing or consuming alcoholic beverages in a residence hall.

The two men, Jeffrey Mitchell and Jason Smith, both told police that they were in the room whee Presley allegedly shot himself in the head with a .22-caliber pistol while playing a game of Russian roulette with Smith.

Smith, who was Presley's roommate and lifelong friend, and Mitchell, a 21-year-old UK Student from
Louisville, Ky, also told police
they had been drinking malt liquor
and gin the night of the shooting,
but the new evidence is the first indication that they consumed the
alcohol while inside Blanding II.

Presley, who died at the age of 22 on Friday, had no traces of alcohol

Bob Clay, director of residence life, could not be reached for com-ment yesterday because he was traveling to Hopkinsville for Presley's funeral.

Clay said Monday, however, that it is virtually impossible to keep al-cohol — or any contraband, includ-ing firearms — out of residence halls.

On any given Sunday morning, scores of beers cans can be found in garbage bins at residence halls across campus — including garbage cans at Holmes Hall, where Ciay lives.

"We speak to students pretty reg-ularly about that and ask, 'How did they get here,' but it is not illegal to possess (an empty) beer can," he said.

Clay admits that students do sneak alcohol by front desk workers and resident advisers, but he said UK cannot run its residence halls like police states, where students and their rooms would be subject to random searches for contraband.

"If we did that, we'd probably have a lot of empty residence halls," Clay said.

"We basically adopt a posture with our rules: We will neither look for nor ignore a violation. I don't want my staff member hiding around corners, but if my staff person turns the corner and you're standing there with a can of beer,

More than 400 attend funeral for Presley

HOPKINSVILLE, Ky. — UK efensive backs coach Rick defensive backs coach Rick Smith was emotional Tuesday as he described Wildcat football player Ted Presley as the tough-est player he ever coached.

Presley died last week after al-legedly shooting himself in the head playing Russian roulette. Police are still investigating cir-cumstances surrounding his death

More than 400 people, including the UK football team, attended the two-hour funeral service at Freeman Chapel CME Church.

Female athletes protected by Title IX

The UK Athletics Association spent more than \$5 on men's sports for every dollar it spent on women's sports in 1992-93, according to budgets obtained from the association

The question then for UK and other universities around the nation is whether that type of spending constitutes a violation of Title IX of the Education Amendments of 1972 — a federal statute that mandates equal extracurricular opportunities for men and women at federally-funded institutions.

Because of the ever-growing gap in interpretations of the law and a lack of consistent enforcement throughout the years, it is difficult to determine whether a school is in compliance with Title IX. But the law does exist, and because of in-The question then for UK and

compliance with Title IX. But the law does exist, and because of increased interest in it by political action groups. Congress, the courts and the media, the push for stricter
enforcement of the law is growing.
"There are more teeth in the word,"
said Katheryn Reith, assistant
executive director of the Wornen's Sports Foundation, a leading
Title IX advocacy group. "There is
much more possibility now that a
university could really suffer for
not complying."

The UKAA detends itself by say-ing that it interprets the statute as mandating equality, not on the basis of dollar-for-dollar spending on male and female athletes, but on the basis of fair and equal treatment of the sexes.

"You have gotta be naive to sit here and say that every female or male athlete is completely happy with what goes on overall, but you'd be hard-pressed to say they have not been treated fairly (at UK)." UK athletics director C.M.

Title IX states that "no person in the United States shall, on the basis of sex, be excluded from participa-tion in, be denied the benefits of, or be subjected to discrimination un-der any education program or activ-ity receiving federal financial assis-tance."

Based on a literal interpretation. UK could be in violation of the law. In 1991-92, UK spent an average of \$31,185 on each of its male athletes while allocating only fish,099 to its female athletes. Those are grim numbers, especially considering they are worse than the average Division I program. In 1990-91, the average Division I school spent 2.2 percent on its women's sports, according to a Rights, though, to force a school to

1991 gender-equity study commissioned by the NCAA. UK spent 15.9 percent on its women's sports in 1990-91.

"In a department like the University of Kentucky's, you have a lot of issues," said Kathy DeBoer, UK's assistant athletic director for non-revenue sports. "If you justice, where you will find the inequises. Where so post in the other 19."

Those two sports — football and men's basketball — receive higher funding because they are the only two sports in the department that make a profit, and that profit must be protected because it pays for the other 19 sports, DeBoer said.

"Thie IX only addresses the issue of expenditures, it does not address revenue." said DeBoer, who added that UK is making strides toward leveling the playing field for its female athletes.

"I would not be here if I were not confident that our leadership, not only in our athletic department, but also in our institution, were committed to fairness in athletics based on gender," she said.

The NCAA and legislators are still determining precisely how Title IX applies to intercollegiate athletics.

The NCAA, some major conferences and UK are working on various studies to decide precisely how to deal with complying with Title IX. The NCAA has a task force working on a definition of gender equity and a plans to help its members schools achieve it.

"We need a central, single definition that we can all work from," said Micki Hogue, who was hired this fall as a special assistant to Newton, primarily to conduct an internal study of gender equity within the UK Athletics Association. "In the absence of that, we are defining it at UK as fair, and fair doesn't necessarily mean equal."

But with suits being filed by female athletes who feel short-changed, Congress and the courts are showing more interest in enforcing the law, and the media seem more intent to let female athletes know hat their rights are.

comply. That's another reason the law is just now receiving its due, Reith said. Title IX was never and still isn't enforced as thoroughly as it should be by the Office of Civil Rights, Reith said.

"The OCR has not monitored its complaints thoroughly," Reith said. "For the most part, schools found in violation of Thite IX in the early '80s ignored it. The worst thing that could happen if the school didn't do what OCR or the court ordered them to do is that the court would order them to do is that the court would order them to do is that the common them to do it again. the women's swim club, filed a Ti-tle IX complaint against UK with the OCR. The coach wanted the same resources a men's varsity team received, and he wanted his team elevated to varsity status.

The OCR investigated in April 1982 and filed a report stating that UK was discriminating against its female athletes. Among the many observations and recommendations for improvement found in the OCR report was that same practice floor at Alumni Gymnasium, which itsaid was in poor condition and needed to be repaired.

Byers, a UK graduate student, has lived in an adjoining room of the abandoned, ravaged Phi Kappa Tau fraternity house on Woodland Avenue since January 1992. He lives there free-of-rent in return for safeguarding the house from possible break-ins.

Byers said he accepted the in vitation to live in the apartment room before viewing the house in its entirety.

"The apartment wasn't in bad shape, and it was free," he said.
"I walked through the house a few days later and couldn't believe it had been trashed like this. It looks like it used to be a really nice house."

Fraternity members were forced to leave the house in 1990 when the chapter was suspended for alcohol-related hazing. An estimated \$100,000 to \$200,000 worth of damage to the house

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Four ex-Cats snatched up in NFL draft

Four UK football players have been selected in the 1993 National Football League Draft which ended Monday at the Marriott Marquis in Manhattan.

Dean Wells, Todd Perry, Chuck Bradley and Doug Pelfrey represent the second-highest number of UK players selected in the NFL draft during one year.

The greatest number taken was five in 1966, which included three first-round selections (Sam Ball, Rick Norton and Rodger Bird), a second-round choice (Bob Windsor) and an 18th-round selection (Rick Kestner).

Wells, a 6-foot-3, 243-pound linebacker from Louisville, Ky., was the fourth-round selection of the Seattle Seahawks and 85th pick

Perry, a 6-5, 292-pound offensive guard from Elizabethtown also was a fourth-round choice, going to the Chicago Bears as the 97th pick overall.

Both Wells and Perry were draft-ed Sunday. The NFL held rounds one through four Sunday and five through eight Monday.

Bradley, a 6-5, 305-pound line-backer from Louisville was taken by the Houston Oilers in the sixth round as the 158th selection.

Pelfrey, a 5-11, 183-pound kicker from Edgewood finished out the UK draftees, being selected in the eighth round by the Cincinnati Ben-gals as the 202nd overall pick.

gais as the 202nd overall pick.

"Obviously, we are thrilled for these outstanding young men," UK head coach Bill Curry said. "We were really blessed to have them in our program. Three of them were recruited by Jerry Claiborne's staff, and the other (Pelfrey) came to the University as a walk-on.

"All four were markelous on the

"All four were marvelous on the football field for us, but most importantly, they are excellent people."

Curry also said that the four former Wildcats have a chance to succeed in the NFL.

"After spending 14 years in the National Football League, I believe I still understand what it takes to play on the next level. That's why I feel confident all four have a legitimate chance to be a NFL player."

Wells ended his career with the Cats with a total of 206 tackles in 43 games, including 17 quarterback sacks and nine tackles behind the line.

In 1992, Wells set the UK single-season record with 10 sacks while posting 71 tackles.

Wells also played in the Blue-Gray All Star game, the East-West Shrine game and the Senior Bowl.

Perry started 37 of 43 at left guard for UK. Last year, Perry was named to the second team All-Southeastern Conference by The Associated Press.

Bradley started 33 of 40 games during his career, including a string of 27 consecutive starting assign-ments which ended with an ankle injury against Louisiana State this

As a freshman, he was named to the Football News Freshman All-American team. He played in the Blue-Gray All-Star game and the Senior Bowl.

Pelfrey was the Wildcats' place-kicker the past three seasons after beginning his career as a walk-on. He owns five UK kicking records for field goals and ranked third on the all-time SEC list for most field goals of 50 yards-or-more with a to-tal of eight.

As a senior, Pelfrey was names second team All-SEC by the coach es and The AP. He also participates in the Blue-Gray All-Star game.

UK has had four players selected in the NFL draft on four other occa-sions — 1961, 1962, 1976, 1978, 1985 and 1988. The Cats have had three players chosen in one year a total of seven

chosen in one year a total of seven times. In all, UK has had 93 players taken in the NFL draft since 1950.

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
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

Prophecy of this sort is nothing.

Prophecy is usually thought of as some impossible vision of the future, denied to most people but plain as day to the second-siphted shaman or wise man.

There is, however, another kind of prophecy: the ability to foreset peopssible future based on past and present realities.

For some reason, this second kind of prophecy finds its voice most often in the utterances of popular writers, artists and musicians.

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
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Report revealed Alumni's problems 10 years ago

Angela Salvatore spent four years knowing and hating the answer to a decision she had to make several times a week during volleyball practice — to dive or not to dive. Salvatore dove.

"You dive in volleyball," has ead of the said. "There's no getting around it. You either face the wrath of the nails or you face (UK Volleyball coach Kathy) DeBoer's wrath."

Yes, she did say nails. The kind that tend to hurt when you land on hom. The ones that she said were abundant and protruding from the old floor in the Alumni Gymnasium, where the volleyball team practiced about three times a week last fall and many falls before that.

"Every practice, we were pounding nails back into the floor over there," Salvatore said. "I don't know how many shorts have been ripped. I mean it's a very dangerous facility, and we don't have a choice because of men's baskethall. Men's basketball gets to decide, even when we're in season, when they want the gym (at Memorial Coliseum)."

That is partly true, said Beverty Jones, who assists Director of Ad-Jones.

want uie gyni (at svientoriat Coum)."
That is partly true, said Beverly Jones, who assists Director of Administrative Services Rodney Stiles in doling out the practice time at Memorial, which is shared by both basketball teams and women's volleyball team, as well as women's soccer and gymnastics on occasion. There are priorities in scheduling, Jones said.

The men's basketball team has priority in choosing practice times,

but only when it is in season. Before Nov. 1, the volleyball team gets first choice of practice time at Memorial. After that, it has to share with both basketball teams. The men's team gets first choice. Women's basketball and volleyball have

men's team gets first choice. Women's baskethall and volleyball have to compromise, making the best of what's left.

Men's baskethall doesn't have another place to practice "because it would cost a lot of money to practice at Rupp Arena. They have to pay every time they use that, so they get first choice of times when they're in season," Jones said.

Thus, basketball usually takes what Jones called the "prime-time" practice slot of 3-6 p.m. During November, that leaves the volleyball team with two options — either practice from 6-9 p.m. at the coliseum or move to Alumni.

Usually, DeBoer said, the team practices at Memorial two nights a week and at Alumni three days a week from 3-6 p.m.

So, since a varsity team was practiced in the floor way weard; it

So, since a varsity team was practicing on that floor, why wasn't it fixed?

"Money," DeBoer said.

"Money." DeBoer said.
Eventually, it took the combined generosity of UK President Charles Wethington, Chancellor for the Lexington Campus Robert Hermenway and the athletic association to get the funds to replace the floor. Money had to come from all three because campus recreation uses the facility as well.

But that doesn't help Salvatore, who said that the floor wasn't the only problem with practicing at Alumni.
"I could maybe find a counte of

to take a shower over there," Salvatore said. "I mean, it's just disgusting. It's the kind of example that if
basketball were forced to practice
over there, it would not be like that
because, when it comes down to it,
we're a no-nothing kind of sport.
"It has been like that since my
freshman year and not only that, we
just now got lights in there."

DeBoer confirmed the floor was
in bad shape, adding, "it was so bad
that the basketball people didn't
feel that they could practice over
there."

Kutheryn Reith, assistant executive director of the Women's Sports Foundation, said Salvatore and her teammates could have sued the University under Title IX to get the floor replaced long ago, especially considering its history.

In 1982, the Office of Civil Rights investigated UK on a Title IX complaint filed by Ray Mernaugh, a volunteer coach for the women's swimming club. An observation in that OCR report said that the floor was in poor condition and that UK should consider replacing it. That was 10 years ago.

"That's one of those things that the OCR should have gone back and checked out," Reith said. "That's fairly typical.

"Schools are always relying upon the fact that their female athletes will not sue or will not file a complaint. So they think they can get

will not sue or will not file a com-plaint. So they think they can get away with things like this. Not only is it wrong, it's illegal."

Reith said although DeBoer doesn't have a problem with com-promising practice time at Memori-al, she and women's basketball coach Sharon Fanning shouldn't

have to.

"A team should have priority in a facility in which they compete," Reith said. "You cannot give periority to men's baskethall if that's the gym that the volleyball team competes in. If both teams are in season, then you have to figure out a way to share."

By giving men's baskethall first choice, "they're telling those volleyball players that their efforts are not valued as much as those on the men's baskethall team," Reith said.
Eastern Kentucky University

faced a similar problem. According to EKU sports information director
Karl Park, OCR investigated EKU
and discovered that the women's volleyball team was playing at a
physical education building and
that the women's basketball team
was playing some of its games in

slot of 7:30 to 8 p.m.
The OCR ordered, among other

Solito of 7:30 to 8 p.m. In the line is the first of things, that EKU move its volley-ball team into the 6.500-seat Alumni Gymansium, where the two basketball teams play, and that no basketball teams play, and that no basketball game could start before 6:30 p.m., so that both the men's and women's teams would have an equal opportunity to draw fans. Reith said it wouldn't cost UK anything to give volley-ball and women's basketball some priority to choose practice times or to split the "prime time" evenly among the three.

"It's not an expense to allow the volleyball team to have priority to practice in a gym where they compete." Reith said. "It's not gonna cost the school a dime."

month, some 11 years after the OCR completed its investigation. A lack of money was the reason for the long delay, DeBoer said, "Typical," Reith said.

The closest thing to specific law is the OCR's three-prong test to determine if a school is violating Title IX requirements. After years of debate, it seems those three criteria were determined valid by an appellate court less than two weeks ago, Reith said.

Brown University had cut women's volleyball and gymnastics, as well as two men's sports. Female students at Brown filed suit, arguing that the school's proportion of male and female athletes did not meet Title IX standards and that because the two teams already existed, it was obvious that there was an interest and ability on the zero of femalerest and ability on the zero of femalerest and ability on the zero of femalerest and ability on the zero of femalers. interest and ability on the part of fe-male student body at Brown to re-quire the two sports.

The appellate court ordered the university to reinstate the two programs as quickly as possible and declared the OCR's three-prong test valid.

Basically, Reith said, the test gives a school three ways to prove it is providing adequate athletic op-

portunities for female students.

portunities for female students.

*To be in compliance, the proportion of male and female athletes at a school must be similar to the proportion of male and female students at the school.

If the proportions are significantly different, the school must demonstrate a good-faith effort to expand opportunities for female athletes.

pand opportunities for female athletes.

If the proportions differ and the school is not expanding its opportunities, has the school met the interests and the abilities of its student body?

Using those same criteria, UK seems to be out of big trouble.

While the proportion of female athletes at UK is off (50 percent of the student body was female in 1991-92, while only 26 percent of UK varsity athletes were female), the UKAA has made improvements in expanding opportunities for women athletes by adding women's soccer this year. Reith said the courts would look kindly upon UK and "give it another chance."

On the third prong, though, Reith

On the third prong, though, Reith said that UK would fail because it

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is not meeting the interests and abilities of its female student body. A softball club with a strong membership and a desire for varsity status remains ignored.

remains ignored.
"If a club sport exists, obviously they are not meeting those students' interests and abilities," Reith said, recommending that UK make soft-ball a varsity sport as soon as possible.

Assistant athletic director Kathy
DeBoer said softball is "probably"
the next sport UK will add to its
varsily package and added that any
additional sports would definitely
be for women, eliminating the possibility that strong men's clubsports could become varsily sports.
The only thing stopping UK from
starting softball, DeBoer said, is
that the NCAA sponsors a championship in fast-pitch softball while
Kentucky high schools, from which
the majority of UK's student popu-

Rentucky high schools, from which the majority of UK's student popu-lation originates, offer only slow-pitch softball.

"If either of those two things change, we would certainly look at it," DeBoer said.

en's sports program has expanded at a much higher percentage than its men's programs.

In the 11 school years since the Title 1X investigation, UKAA spending on women's sports has increased 179 percent, while spending on men's sports has increased only 99 percent. In that time, UK added two women's sports — swimming and soccer — while maintaining the same number of men's teams (the association dropped wrestling after the 1982-83 season and added men's soccer in 1991-92).

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




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
