An acceptable thesis on some division of the major subject must in every case be presented.

English, Latin, Mathematics, or Philosophy may be selected by the student as the major subject for the M.A. degree and minors will be assigned by the Faculty. An acceptable thesis on some division of the major subject must in every case be presented.
