SELECTION OF HARVEST QUEENS IS TRACED THROUGH AGES TO PRESENT

Although differing in many respects from the present day fall festival such as the University Ag students are holding tonight, an annual festival was held by the ancient people of northern Northumberland at the close of the reaping, according to English folk-lore. They had a harvest queen, too.

When the sickle was laid down and the last sheaf of corn was set on end, it was said that they have "got the kern". This accomplishment was announced with loud shouting by the reapers. An image crowned with wheat sheaths and dressed in a white frock and colored ribbons was hoisted on a pole by the tallest and strongest men of the group. The workers all circle around this image or harvest queen and proceed to the barn. They then set the image on a high place and did justice to the harvest supper.

In some localities this image or "kern baby" was quite small, fashioned with much care and neatness, and platted with astonishing skill. In other places it was large and cumbersome, taking a husky man's strength to bear it.

Festivity after the harvest is traced back through the ages and histories of all nations. The vintage or harvest celebration appeared among the Hebrews and was called

L. T. IGLEHART Despite the careless attitude evidenced by the majority of University students on the subject of venereal diseases, there are today approximately 353,000 reported cases of syphilis in Kentucky alone...

UK Nursery School Plans Toy Display

Exhibit Of Playthings Will Open Friday In Ag Building

Designed to aid parents in selecting suitable toys for children an exhibit will be made by the United Kingdom nursery school Friday through Wednesday, November 19-21 in the Agricultural building...

The exhibit will include toys made by members of homemaker clubs over the state and obtained by Miss Florence Inlay, extension specialist in foods and nutrition...

Accompanying the toy display will be a book exhibit showing books for the small child, prepared under the direction of Mrs. Kay K. Dunham of the University training school...

Topically on exhibit will be designed from the smallest child up to those of 12 years. Many of the toys will be homemade and so constructed that parents will have no trouble in making similar ones...

Fully as many were born dead. New cases reported jumped from 2,855 in 1936 to 5,481 in 1937. In the face of this growing plague, the Kentucky State Medical Association, meeting at Richmond in September, unanimously adopted a resolution which, if given the support of the people of Kentucky, will help stamp out venereal diseases in this state...

This resolution advocates the passage of a law requiring that both men and women, in applying for a marriage license, must present certificates proving they are free from venereal diseases before the license will be issued...

Dr. Caudill pointed out that a few of the states, notably Connecticut and Illinois, already have such legislation on their statute books. He suggested that the two objections, probably to be raised, will be based on these two points: "The infringement on personal liberty" and "Unnecessary expense to the individual and the state..."

Dr. Caudill stated that there are at least twenty thousand potential mothers in state who have the disease. One thousand syphilitic babies were born in Kentucky last year...
