# Jury finds Camara guilty for DUI

## Losing two: Coach Felton resigns to scout for Pacers

The UK basketball team suffered two losses Tuesday with the verdict of Jules Camara's DUI offense coming out guilty and the resignation of associate head coach George Felton.

Tony Neely, the media relations director for the Athletics Department, said Felton's resignation has nothing to do with Camara's verdict.

Camara, a junior forward, was found guilty

Tuesday in the Fayette District Court by a jury of five women and one man on charges of driving while under the influence on Sept. 3. Camara pleaded innocent to the charges.

Under UK's zero tolerance alcohol policy, Neely said the guilty verdict means Camara will lose his basketball scholarship indefinitely.

The alcohol policy does not state when the termination of Camara's scholarship will go into effect.

Neely said it will be up to the athletics administration to decide upon a

possible time of return for Camara in the future. Neely also said Camara would no longer be allowed to practice with the team or take part in any team activities.

UK students said Camara's conviction hurts not only the basketball team, but UK's reputation. "It's going to hurt them as a team because he is a good player," said Joe Miller, a history and economics junior.

"It's going to hurt their image even more than that because they have had several instances like that (in the past),"

Miller said. UK's alcohol policy is one of the strictest in the nation, and has come under question recently because it typically results in a student-athlete being forced to transfer.

Even though some students question the policy, others do not because they say it puts student-athletes on the same level as the rest of the student body.

"He got treated like anybody else would have," said Makessa Stickley, an elementary education freshman. "He's a college student just like the rest of us."

While many UK students are concerned with the performance of this

year's team, Felton, despite his resignation, said Tuesday that UK basketball was "the finest program in the country."

Felton has been with the UK basketball team since 1997. He's spent the last three seasons assisting head coach Tubby Smith in recruiting and coaching. UK has won one national championship, two Southeastern Conference Tournament titles and two SEC Championships during his tenure.

He will be leaving to become a scout for the Indiana Pacers, a job he describes as a "lifelong goal."

"I am excited about my new challenge and

look forward to a new career," Felton said.

Neely said Felton made tremendous contributions to the team.

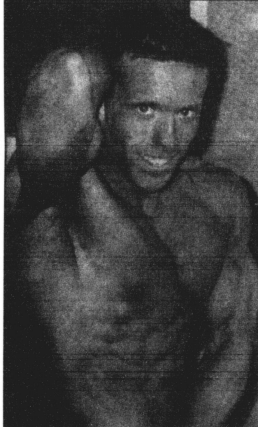
"He played an instrumental role in coaching the last three years, and was part of the national championship effort in 1998," Neely said.

Brooks Downing, the associate director of media relations for the Athletics Department, said it didn't surprise him that the Pacers wanted to add Felton to their staff.

"I am sure that's why the Indiana Pacers wanted to hire him as a scout — because he knows basketball talent," Downing said.

Most students come to UK to build up their minds with knowledge. Eric Browning did more than that: He came to UK and built up his body too.

Browning, a first-year dentistry student, is featured in the November issue of *Flex Magazine* for his achievements in bodybuilding and academics.

The current copy of *Flex* went out on store shelves Oct. 3. "I had no clue that I would be in it," Browning said.

He said his first reaction when he received an advance copy in the mail was shock. He said he thought he was going to have a heart attack.

Browning said he knew he might be in the issue, but nothing was for sure.

The article contains a biography of Browning and a picture from a bodybuilding competition last year. Last November, Browning placed sixth in the Kentucky Body Building Championships. He was the youngest of the 60 competitors. He said he was surprised with the outcome of the competition, because it was his first bodybuilding competition.

"I started working out as a (college) freshman just to keep in shape. I had always been active in high school with football and baseball," Browning said.

Browning competes in the middleweight class. He's 5'9" and weighs 195 pounds. He

gained 90 pounds of muscle in the past four years through his weight lifting efforts.

Over the years, he said that friends encouraged him to compete in bodybuilding competitions for fun. His friends were more serious and wanted him to get involved in competitions with them, he said.

Browning is preparing for another competition, The Bluegrass Muscle Classic, in June. This will be his second competition.

Browning enjoys working out and also hopes that he can continue to compete. He's optimistic about the outcome of his next competition.

Besides going to dentistry school and bodybuilding, Browning is also a certified personal trainer.

"I am not a personal trainer right now because I am too busy with (dentistry) school, but I really enjoyed it when I was doing that," said Browning.

Browning hopes to open an athletic center and dentistry practice after he graduates from dental school.

Browning said that he is receiving calls about the article from fitness model agents that are interested in signing him for advertisements. He said the calls have been flattering, and although he does not plan to pursue the endeavors he said he is keeping his options open.

"I am not sure that I want to be a fitness model or a competitive body builder, but I am going to keep my options open."

# A body for the new millennium

Health technology: New strides in medicine involve cells, genes and robots

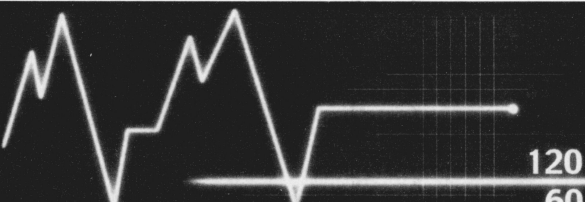
Students who had the chance to celebrate the onset of the new millennium may be around long enough to see the start of the next millennium.

Not only will we live longer, doctors say, but the quality of our lives will be better as technology advances surgery, medicine and even birth.

"People don't know how close we are to realizing all of these 'science fiction' medical advances," said Dr. William Mers, a Cincinnati epidemiologist.

ologist. "Most people who are under 40 years old will be utilizing these advances in their lifetimes."

Until just a few years ago, making a baby boy or a baby girl was pretty much a hit-or-miss affair. Traits such as height, attractiveness and intelligence were fairly unforeseeable.

Today, entrepreneurs on the Internet advertise beautiful model's eggs to prospective parents for a steep price. According to the American Society for Reproductive Medicine's web site, before the new millennium is many years old, parents may be going to fertility clinics and picking from a list of options the way car buyers order options for a new car.

"In the future, parents will be able to select their unborn child's traits such as eye color, hair color, height, IQ and how long they will live," said Winston Morrissey, a Lexington reproductive technologist.

In addition to customizing your baby's physical traits, genetic engineers will be able to insert genes that will provide the child with natural resistance to heart disease, cancer and possibly HIV, Morrissey said.

## UN chief appeals for Mideast talks

JERUSALEM — Amid scattered new outbreaks of violence in the West Bank and Gaza Strip, U.N. Secretary-General Kofi Annan appealed Monday to Israel and the Palestinians to get back to the bargaining table and end the cycle of killing. Tuesday was a day of intense diplomatic activity, including talks with both Israelis and Palestinians by Annan, Russian Foreign Minister Igor Ivanov, and European Union security chief Javier Solana. Israeli Prime Minister Ehud Barak also spoke Monday night with President Clinton and French President Jacques Chirac, the prime minister's office said.

## Top U.S. official visits Belgrade

WASHINGTON — In a show of support for newly installed President Vojislav Kostunica, the Clinton administration will soon reopen the U.S. Embassy in Belgrade and also hopes to re-establish diplomatic relations with Yugoslavia. The State Department also announced Monday that James C. O'Brien, the senior U.S. official for Balkans development, was flying to Belgrade to meet with Kostunica, a further reversal of the icy distance that marked Slobodan Milosevic's rule.

## Gore-Bush II: Expect nice guys

WASHINGTON — The presidential candidates are going after each other off camera — Is Al Gore trustworthy enough to be president? Is George W. Bush qualified? — but when the lights go on Tuesday for their second debate, voters can look for both men to turn on the charm. Neither candidate wants to risk any further voter backlash by openly going on the attack, whatever their negative ads and quote-slipping surrogates are saying elsewhere.

## The pill and breast cancer linked

CHICAGO — Birth control pills may raise the already heightened risk of breast cancer faced by women with a family history of the disease, a study suggests. Among sisters and daughters of women with breast cancer, users of the pill were three times more likely than nonusers to get the disease. If at least five family members had breast or ovarian cancer, pill users faced an 11-fold risk, the researchers report in today's edition of *Journal of the American Medical Association*.

## Bloomberg may run for N.Y. mayor

NEW YORK — Financial media titan Michael Bloomberg transformed his start-up company from pipsqueak to powerhouse in less than two decades, and along the way amassed a personal fortune estimated at \$2.5 billion ... but can he be

Bloomberg, 58, has said nothing publicly about entering the mayor's race, but has hired a well-connected advisor, met with political leaders to discuss his chances and has changed his registration from Democrat to Republican during the past several days — a move that would help distinguish himself from a crowded Democratic field.

## Nasdaq ends down 115, Dow falls 44

NEW YORK — Stocks fell sharply Monday as investors girded themselves for earnings reports amid persistent worries about technology shares. The tech-heavy Nasdaq closed down 115.00 at 3,240.56, according to preliminary calculations. The Dow Jones industrial average tumbled 44.03 to 10,524.40. On the NYSE, losers led gainers by a 6-to-5 margin.

## Yankees, Mariners set for ALCS

NEW YORK — The New York Yankees fought off the pesky Oakland Athletics to face the Seattle Mariners starting Monday night in the American League Championship Series. While the Mariners enter the series well-rested following three days off, the Yankees are drained following back-to-back cross-country flights. Freddy Garcia (9-5) starts for the Mariners against Denny Neagle (15-9), who didn't even pitch in the first-round against Oakland.

has the instructions to make a complete human. Most of those instructions are inactive, and with good reason: The last thing you want is for your brain cells to start churning out stomach acid.

The only time cells have the potential to turn into a specific body part is very early in a pregnancy, when our first few cells, or stem cells, haven't begun to specialize yet. Scientists are now discovering how to harness the power in these cells.

"Most diseases involve the death of healthy cells: Brain cells in Alzheimer's; cardiac cells in heart disease; pancreatic cells in diabetes; to name a few," said Dr. Andy McNeil, a Louisville surgeon. "In the future doctors will be able to isolate these stem cells, direct their growth and furnish patients with healthy replacement tissues and organs."

And what if you don't need a new liver just yet? Organ

banks will be available for you to store healthy organs for when you do need them. For those who can't afford to store their own organs, science has an army of new surgical robots on the horizon.

Brian Haggady, a graduate student in robotics at the Massachusetts Institute of Technology, talked about how robots of the future will replace a majority of human surgeon's duties.

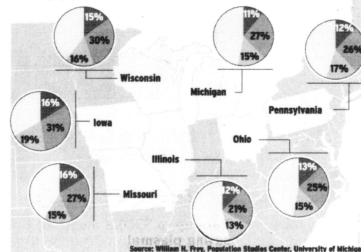
"The patient will be laid on the operating table with any number of robots hanging from the ceiling," he said. "Most likely human anesthetologists will still put the patient out, but then the robots will run the rest of the surgery. Humans will be needed only for maintenance of the robots and supervision of the procedure."

Haggady goes on to say that the precision of the robots will minimize the time it takes to perform a surgery and reduce recovery time.

The future of medicine may seem distant and far-fetched, but it's closer than one might think.

Katie Marks, a finance and marketing senior, attended the program because of her curiosity and interest in the company.

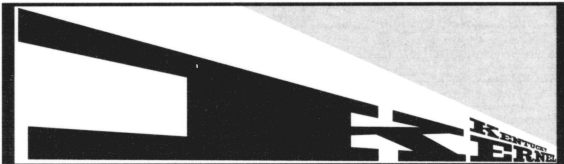

## The tobacco war: George W. Bush surrogates fear that a Gore administration could mean more taxation, legal attacks on tobacco

MIDWAY, Ky. — Republican presidential candidate George W. Bush was back in Texas cramming for his next debate. His surrogates were standing in front of William Mitchell's tobacco barn.

A gathering of many of Kentucky's GOP leading lights Monday was part of a coordinated national effort to keep voter attention focused on the top of the ticket in the Nov. 7 election and to try to put some spin on local news coverage about Bush's "real plans for real people" campaign.

"We're not here by any accident," said U.S. Sen. Mitch McConnell, R-Ky.

McConnell and the rest of the speakers accused Vice Pres-

ident Al Gore of conducting an eight-year holy war against tobacco. McConnell dismissed the idea, put together by the White House and Kentucky Gov. Paul Patton, to form a panel to look into a buyout of tobacco quotas.

"It's been amusing to watch the governor trying to get Al Gore to say something on tobacco," McConnell said.

Other speakers were 6th district U.S. Rep. Ernie Fletcher, who is locked in his own election battle against Democrat Scotty Baesler, a former congressman; Jefferson County Judge-Executive Rebecca Jackson, whose own aspirations find her traveling across the state; Senate President David Williams of Burkesville; and

Mary Bunning, the wife of U.S. Sen. Jim Bunning, who arrived late from attending a bridge dedication in Maysville.

McConnell warned that a Gore administration would mean more taxation and legal attacks on tobacco. Bush, McConnell said, is against any taxes and does not plan to continue the quest to regulate the nicotine in tobacco as a drug.

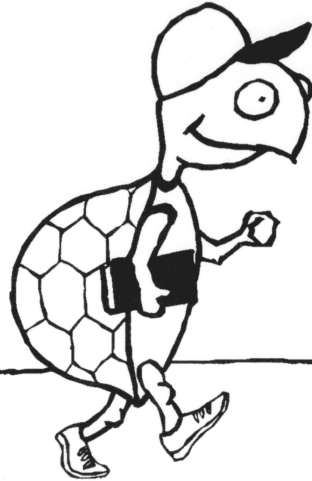
The prize is Kentucky's eight electoral votes, a potentially critical amount as the campaigns try to put together enough pieces of a puzzle to win.

Gov. Paul Patton argued last week that a Gore victory would give him great sway on tobacco in a Democrat White House.

# Violence continues in Gaza

**Inquiry possible:  
World leaders step up  
efforts to put an end  
to the crisis**

JERUSALEM — Israeli Prime Minister Ehud Barak said Tuesday it was too soon to tell if the violence in the West Bank and Gaza Strip was coming to an end, but he said if it was, Israel would act accordingly.

His statement came hours after he announced he was giving his Palestinian counterpart more time to quell raging violence that has killed 88 people in the region over 12 days.

Violence continued in some spots Tuesday: Hospital officials in Gaza said a 12-year-old Palestinian boy was critically wounded by a live bullet to the head in the town of Rafah, and about 200 Palestinians threw stones and firebombs at Israeli troops near the West Bank town of Ramallah. The soldiers responded with rubber-coated steel bullets and tear gas.

While the day's incidents represented a falling-off from the most intense of the clashes last week, Barak said after meeting U.N. Secretary-General Kofi Annan that it was still too early to say whether the violence was significantly ebbing.

"If this is the start of a change, we will act accordingly," he said.

Annan, who is trying to reconcile Palestinian demands for an international inquiry with Israel's reluctance to accept one, called it a period of "delicate and acute diplomacy."

Barak's decision to push back a deadline for ending the violence, and his stated willingness to attend a U.S.-sponsored peace summit if one is arranged, came after two phone calls from President Clinton. Israel's army radio reported.

The Israeli leader said he made the decision after weighing the possibility of a prolonged armed conflict.

"It is right to hear up for a few more days ... and not find ourselves in a few more weeks or months bogged down in a difficult conflict knowing that we may have been able to prevent it," he told army radio.

The sides were discussing a Palestinian demand that Israel agree to allow an international commission to investigate the events.

Senior Palestinian negotiator Saeb Erekat said it was up

to Israel to take steps to end the clashes.

"We want to stop the Israeli army from shooting Palestinians. We want to stop (Jewish) settler terrorism against Palestinians, and we also want to see the Israeli government stop killing its own (Arab) citizens," he told The Associated Press.

The shooting of the Palestinian boy in Gaza occurred in the southern town of Rafah, on the border with Egypt, where

witnesses said about a dozen young Palestinian boys pelted Israeli troops with stones. The army said it was checking the incident.

Much of the violence overnight was centered in Israel itself.

In the seaside community of Bat Yam, just south of Tel Aviv, two Israeli Arabs were stabbed, according to Israel TV. In nearby Jaffa, three Arab-owned apartments were burned

while some Jews, chanting "Death to the Arabs," descended to the streets to smash car windows and throw stones at police. There were Jewish-Arab clashes from the Sea of Galilee in the north to the Negev Desert in the south.

Israel's army radio said the scenes looked like "civil war," and described relations between the country's Jewish majority and Arab minority as the worst in decades.

**Woman gets Herpes from CPR training dummy**

HAMMOND, Ind. — A woman who took a CPR class is suing the American Red Cross, saying she caught herpes from practicing mouth-to-mouth techniques on a dirty dummy. Brenda Nelson needed a CPR class to get a day-care center operator license. She enrolled at the Red Cross in September 1999.



Nelson said that shortly after completing the two-day course, during which she tried out CPR techniques on a mannequin, she noticed a tingling sensation in her mouth. She went to her doctor, who diagnosed oral herpes. According to the American Social Health Association, the chance of contracting herpes from an inanimate object "is vanishingly small." The herpes virus is killed by chlorine or soap and water with a clean cloth. The lawsuit cites lax cleaning of mannequins at the CPR center. Red Cross officials had no immediate comment on the suit, saying they wanted to discuss it with attorneys.

**Presidential pumpkins, a winning combination**

WISCONSIN RAPIDS, Wis. — The great pumpkin poll is on in Wisconsin. Two 500-pound gourds carved with the likenesses of presidential candidates Al Gore and George W. Bush rest atop an antique manure spreader at Altenburg's Country Gardens.



People who buy a pumpkin from the 7-acre patch can pitch poker chips into plastic jack-o'-lantern pails beside the face they like best. "I think the Al Gore one looks more like Al Gore, more recognizable, than the George Bush one," said farmer Harold Altenburg. "You have to use your imagination somewhat." Voting started Saturday when Chicago sculptor Steven Dahike carved the 4-foot tall pumpkins, grown from Atlantic giant seeds, for a weekend harvest festival. The winner will be announced Oct. 31 — Halloween.

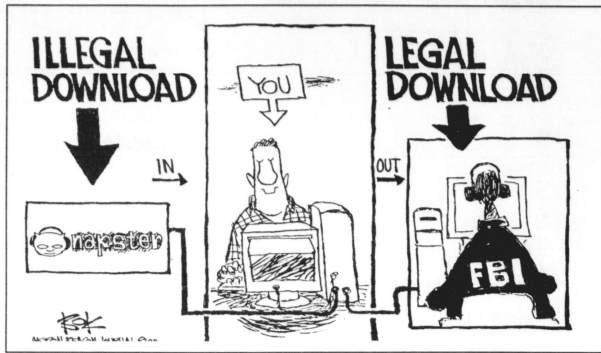

## A new era, a Gnutella era

*Revolutionary computer program soon to surf the wild ways of the Net*

Warning: Gnutella is not edible. Gnutella is a computer program that's about to revolutionize the moving of files on the Internet — perhaps forever.

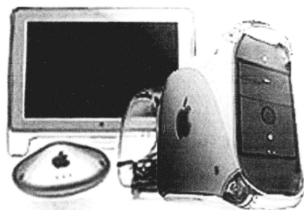
While everyone seems to be wrapped up in the hoopla of Napster's legal battles over the exchanging of copyrighted music files, those with their fingers on the pulse of the World Wide Web have found their free, no-frills alternative to Napster. Gnutella is growing fast among the MP3-trading community, for reasons bigger and scarier than Metallica and Dre's legal teams.

First, Gnutella is anonymous. This is not a program that uses exchangeable screen-names to hide your real name — there are no names. No one can trace what you search for. Second, there are no centralized "servers" — that is, there's nothing anywhere keeping track of where everyone is and who's online. The idea of these "servers" is the main downfall that keeps Napster in court — with Gnutella, this isn't so.

Third, Gnutella isn't a corporation, business or organization. Gnutella isn't out to make money, and it can't be controlled by lawsuits. Gnutella is a technology advance, just like the creation of a new programming language or a new way to network computers. Businesses are free to use this technology (provided they have the correct legal paperwork) just like it was a light bulb or a procedure for manufacturing a product.

The final, and perhaps scariest, perk of Gnutella is that it isn't limited just to music files — it encompasses all music files. That's right — if you wanted to send an illegal, unregistered version of Adobe Photoshop to the world, you could. On the same note, you could also put a file of your recipe for jerk chicken on there too — it's all the same to Gnutella. Everyone, everywhere, at any speed, can have access to any type of information someone somewhere decides to make available.

We think that the decentralization of information is always a good thing, and Gnutella does nothing but help that. However, Gnutella can be used for illegal purposes. We don't condone the usage of anything for illegal purposes — so know what you're doing, and if you should be doing it.

However, I am certain that most of you rely on the most basic form of food for sustenance: The sandwich.

I am a seasoned sandwich maker and have never met a sandwich I didn't like. Therefore, I am more than highly qualified to instruct you in the art of the perfect sandwich.

The first and most basic type of sandwich is the old standard peanut butter and jelly.

Although I try to eat healthy and thus eat wheat bread, I must confess that the best bread for this sandwich is good old white bread, the kind that you ate as a kid when your mom made your lunches.

Some bread activists try to claim that this bread has no taste and is horrible for you. They just don't know how to make sandwiches properly, so

don't listen to them.

Now, only crunchy peanut butter will do because your mouth needs a variety of textures to be truly pleased; also, I think that crunchy peanut butter is a nice contrast to the smoothness of the jelly, which leads me to my next point.

I like jam, I like preserves, and I like honey. But everyone knows that regular old jelly works best for this sandwich because it is nothing but sugar, and you need the sugar to combat the saltiness of the peanut butter.

After you construct this sandwich, be sure to put it in a baggie and throw it into your backpack with some of your heaviest books.

Your *Complete Works of Shakespeare* will do a perfect job of squashing your sandwich so that the jelly seeps through one side of the bread and the sandwich itself is only about a centimeter in height.

I am a big fan of the squashed sandwich, which also

Sometimes I ask my muscular boyfriend to do the pressing to ensure proper squashing. This not only makes the cheese melt better, it also brings your sandwich to regulatory height of one centimeter.

These directions can be applied to most sandwiches you wish to make.

I am not in support of those crazy infomercial sandwich griller things. They are sent from Satan himself to try to ruin your sandwiches. Do it the old-fashioned way.

One last word of advice: With the exception of peanut butter and jelly, don't try to mix condiments. Mayonnaise and mustard are simply not happy together and will wage war in your stomach.

If you follow these instructions, you will have tasty, fast, cheap meals in a jiffy. Enjoy!

**Surgery gives hurlers new life**

The injury is indiscriminate in scope. The old, overworked ones. The young, green ones. All are vulnerable.

Until the mid-1970s, all were done. For generations of baseball pitchers, the ghastly truth of a ruptured elbow ligament was that their time on the game's stage was over.

Thanks to the advances in sports medicine over the last quarter-century, however, the injury today is more accurately termed as a setback rather than a death knell for a career.

In 1974, a Los Angeles Dodgers hurler was the first to undergo the procedure that today bears his name. The "Tommy John surgery" involves the transplant of a ligament from another part of the body — usually the wrist, foot, forearm or calf — to replace the damaged elbow ligament. Small holes are drilled in the bones of the elbow. The new ligament is weaved through

the holes, and tied tightly.

John went on to win 164 games after returning to the mound in 1976. His fruitful post-surgery career, which ended in 1989, is the standard by which all others are judged.

Toronto ace David Wells and Oakland closer Jason Istringhausen are contemporary examples of pitchers who have come all the way back from the surgery to prosper, while the futures of Cub fireballer Kerry Wood and the Cardinals' Matt Morris, while promising, are still very much an enigma.

Wells won 20 games for the Blue Jays and Istringhausen led the American League with 33 saves in 2000. Wood — at 23 years old — flashed equal portions of brilliance and ineptitude in going 8-7, while Morris, who will have a shot at the Cardinal rotation next season, went 3-3 out of the bullpen.

The procedure is not successful in every case; consider the Reds' 1990 World Series MVP Jose Rijo, who finally retired in 1998 after four years' worth of comeback attempts.

Rijo's final stats: 111-87, with a 3.16 ERA and a host of unfulfilled dreams.

Atlanta fans are hoping that John Smoltz, the Braves' best money pitcher, will have results resembling Wells' example after having the surgery. One of the 2001 season's biggest stories will be the comeback attempt of the 32 year old.

To date, the careers of more than 100 players — mostly pitchers — have been salvaged with the procedure, with varying levels of success.

The surgery's prevalence was especially evident at Cinergy Field on Sept. 12, when both the game's winner and loser — Chicago's Wood and Cincinnati's Osvaldo Fernandez, respectively — had undergone the procedure.

Wood was the winner in a pitcher's duel, 2-1.

Tommy John surgery is by no means a guarantee of success; it does, however, give hurlers young and old another shot.

TAMPA, Fla. — Jim Fregosi was fired Tuesday as manager of the Toronto Blue Jays after two seasons of third-place finishes.

The Blue Jays confirmed the decision on Tuesday following a season in which Toronto finished 83-79 this season in the AL East.

General manager Gord Ash was in Florida to meet with Fregosi, who said earlier in the day his gut feeling was that he would be told his two-year stint with the club was over.

Before the Blue Jays' announcement, Fregosi said he felt he would not be back but would not elaborate on why he felt his contract, which expired at the end of the season, would not be renewed.

"I don't know," Fregosi said by telephone from his home in Tarpon Springs, Fla. "I guess they just don't want me to manage them any more."

He is the sixth manager to be fired since the season ended, following Terry Francona (Philadelphia), Buck Showalter (Arizona), Gene Lamont (Pittsburgh), Jack McKeon (Reds) and Davey Johnson (Los Angeles).

Fregosi said he would not be interested in another position within the Toronto organization, but that he would like to remain in the game.

"Yes, I would like to continue to manage," said Fregosi, who also expected at least two members of his coaching staff, Bobby Knopp and Lee Elia, to be fired, too.

The other coaches are believed to be safe. Fregosi took over the Blue Jays with 13 games

remaining in the 1999 spring training schedule after Tim Johnson was fired for lying about serving in Vietnam. The Jays finished 84-78 that season.

Top candidates to replace Fregosi reportedly include former Blue Jays star Paul Molitor, TSN broadcaster Buck Martinez and one-time Toronto catcher Ernie Whitt.

**Cats fall in polls**

The UK women's soccer team fell out of the top 10 in both the National Soccer Coaches Association of America and Soccer Buzz polls.

Soccer Buzz ranked the Cats 15th, while the NCSAA ranked Kentucky 16th.

The Wildcats remained second in the Great Lakes Region. UK remains the highest-ranked Southeastern Conference team. Florida, whose win over the Cats on Friday, Oct. 6 dropped UK in the polls, moved into the top-25 in both polls.
