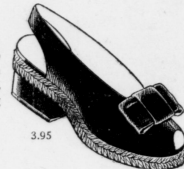

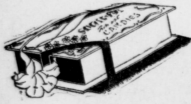

Senior grades are due in the Registrar's office at 9 a. m. Thursday, May 25. Students making a quarter average of B may, at the discretion of the instructor, be excused from a final examination. There are approximately 250 students, including graduate students, who have filed for degrees.

Eleven Good Courts

In the years from then, Powers has nurtured that plot of land into 11 good courts. Even now he endeavors to keep them uniform so players won't complain that one court is better than another.

Opened this year on April 23, they will remain in operation all summer until cold weather drives players off them. The daily operation schedule is from 9 a. m. to 5 p. m., and the University charges 10 cents hourly or \$1.00 quarterly. The courts are owned by the University physical education department and are supervised by Powers who has the power to assign courts and abolish players from the field. He's particular about those rules—especially the ones concerning proper shoes. He also likes to have people claim their courts on the hour.

The following rules for the operation of the courts are simple but rigidly enforced.

Rules
Courts are for use by staff members and students only.

All players must first sign for only one hour during heavy playing hours.

All players must first sign the caretaker's schedule before using any court.

Players are required to play doubles when courts are crowded.

All players must wear regulation tennis shoes with smooth soles and without heels.

Violations of these rules will result in loss of use of the courts.

Coach H. H. Downing of the tennis squad adds a reminder that students dress properly because the courts, as University property, are subject to surveillance and criticism.

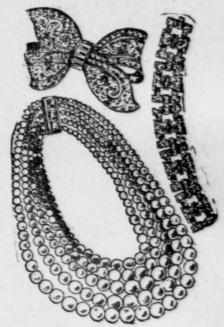
