UK Budget Calls For \$5 Million For Equipment

Expenditure of \$5,240,217 was called for in the 1953-54 UK budget approved Tuesday by the University Board of Trustees. The budget contains requests for the Division of College (instruction, research, and related activities) and plant and restricted funds.

Other budgets to be presented to the Board of Trustees for approval as soon as the University is notified by the U. S. Department of Education are for the Division of Agriculture as to federal grants available for Kentucky.

The 1953-54 budget approved Tuesday is practically the same as this year's except that it takes into consideration a \$249,600 appropriation made by the General Assembly for the second year of the biennium which was not included the first year, and an estimated increase of \$141,778 from student fees and collections from the Federal government for veteran's tuition now in arrears.

\$94,000 Goes For Equipment
Increased expenditures of \$94,000 are earmarked for equipment for various campus buildings, including new dormitories. A \$44,000 increase will go for maintenance and operation of the physical plant of the University. Other increases are primarily for instruction, research and related activities.

Self-sustaining auxiliary enterprises and gift funds remain about the same as for the current year.

Governors' Woblesby this week ordered state departments and agencies to cut next year's spending by \$5,000,000 because of declining State tax collections. According to Finance Commissioner Clifford Barnes, no special consideration would be shown to the UK budget.

\$662,156 Contract Granted Local Firm For Building Dorms

Residences Are Offered To Campus Fraternities To House Men Students

A \$662,156 contract for the construction of six small dormitories for men on the University campus was given to a local construction firm Tuesday by the UK Board of Trustees.

The contract marks the end of several years of planning for a "fraternity row" on the campus. Under provisions of board action, the buildings will be offered to fraternities on a rental basis.

Authorization for the construction was given last September with the cost of the project to be defrayed by 30 years to be amortized over a period of 30 years. The board today said the estimated cost was \$1,010,000 to \$1,020,000.

Work To Begin Immediately
Work on the six buildings will be begun immediately, and completion of the project is scheduled within eight months, Board members said. The buildings will have 12 bedrooms, a bathroom, a living room, a kitchen, a dining room, and a living room.

According to plans, each building will house 48 students. Each of the buildings will be of modern design with flat roofs and strip windows.

Location of the buildings will be on the Blue Grass Room of the Student Union, between Woodland and Hilltop avenues.

The program began with an open house in the Rathskeller of the Seelbach Hotel, followed by the banquet, Judge Bert Combs, 37, of the Kentucky Court of Appeal and president of the Law School alumni, presided at the dinner.

Main speaker for the event was Marion W. Moore, 27, Covington. He is vice president of the Kentucky State Bar Association, a member of the University Board of Trustees, and a member of the alumni executive committee.

Lt. and Mrs. Boggs are now residing at 964 Chorro St., San Luis Obispo, Calif.

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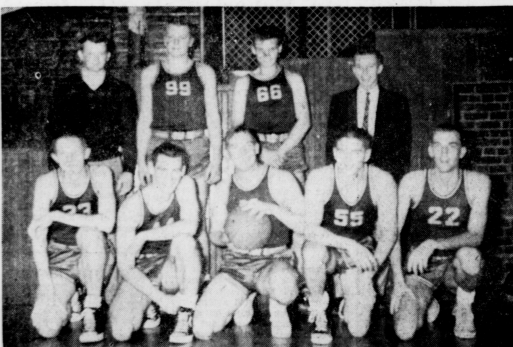

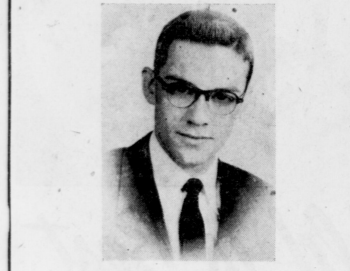

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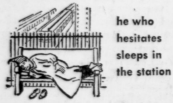

Dr. McFarlan Will Deliver A and S Talk

Dr. Arthur C. McFarlan, head of the Department of Geology, will deliver the College of Arts and Sciences annual distinguished professorship lecture at 8 p.m. Tuesday in the Guignol Theatre. Topic of his address will be "The General Pattern of Kentucky Geology."

Selection of the geologist for the honor was announced last September after his colleagues in the Arts and Sciences College elected him. A secret vote of the college faculty each year determines the winner of the award.

This award is the highest honor for scholarly achievement that the arts and sciences faculty can accord its members. The chosen professor customarily is granted a term free from teaching duties in order that he may conduct or continue some research project and to prepare the annual lecture.

A native of Mansfield, Ohio, Dr. McFarlan was graduated from the University of Cincinnati in 1919 with the bachelor of arts degree. He received the doctor of philosophy degree from the University of Chicago in 1924.

During 1922 and 1923, Dr. McFarlan served as geologist in Texas and Kentucky for the South Penn Oil Co. and in the latter years he joined the UK faculty as associate professor of geology.

19 Schools Attend UK Chemistry Clinic

An 80 per cent increase in attendance was recorded at the Chemistry Guidance Clinic held recently on the UK campus.

Nineteen high schools were represented at the clinic. Delegates included 21 teachers, four principals and 50 students. Two separate programs, one for the teachers which met in the Laboratory Arts Theater and the other for the students in Kastle Hall, were carried out.

Purposes of the meetings were to give teachers a true picture of what

chemistry is doing at the University and in industry, help the teachers in planning their classes, and to give the students some idea of what the chemist does.

Alpha Chi Sigma, professional chemistry fraternity, and the Student Affiliate of American Chemical Society participated in the student clinic. Highlights of the student program were demonstrations of crime detection, glass blowing, and UK's new spectrophotometer.

Guest speakers for the program were J. C. Weyrich, of the Louisville DuPont Works; Dr. H. W. Fleming, of the Louisville Glister Corp.; and James A. Fraser, of the Wescon Metal Corp. Dr. D. P. Ames, of the UK chemistry department, spoke on the "Use of Radio Active Isotopes."
