My dear friends:

It was so wenderful to be remembered by you with so many cards, letters and gifts again this Christmas season. Thanks for your thought-fulness and remembrance of me at this time. Truly I can say it is wonderful to have "friends". I was much aware of that Great Friend -- the Friend who gave us Christmas. Neither was I forgotten of Him. Nothing that I could see or touch did He give, but within He gave me peace and joy.

This year our Christmas program was given in a large cemented patio, as our small chapel was inadequate for the number of people who attend our Christmas programs. It was held on the traditional night -- Christmas Eve. We had no real Christmas tree for the occasion, but Mr. Finstrom cut branches from our myytle tree and tied them together making a bushlike tree. In addition to all of the tinsel, balls and lights, it had unwrapped toys for the children. You can imagine the array of toys for almost 40 children. Each child who took part in the program not only received a toy but also a box of candy and peanuts. The other children and grown-ups received white, net bags of candy and peanuts also.

Our simple decoration was the little town of Bethlehem silhouetted in blue against a white wall with the star above shedding its rays of light upon the sleeping town.

We had mimeographed programs, using last year's Christmas cards as the covers. The people thought the pictures were beautiful and truly they were.

What is more interesting than working with chil ren and especially Venezuelan children? They are extremely dramatic and love to recite and sing. It's a joy to work with them. They did their parts well and it was a joy both to hear and see them. So much for our Christmas program in La Victoria.

Maracay had their program the same night that we did so we weren't able to attend. Cagua had their program Christmas night and it was a very good one. Palo Negro had their program on Sunday night, the 26th. A heavy rain during the afternoon and evening caused them to wonder if they could have a program, but about an hour before the program was to begin the rain stopped. A rain this time of year is very rare. It would have been impossible to have the program had it continued, because people just do not go out in the rain. They have not the umbrellas, rain coats, rubbers that we in the States have, and they are afraid of getting wet. As it was, children came in their alpargatas (a sort of sandal) carrying their sh oes and stockings to which they changed for the program. We enjoyed this program also.



Dear Miss Berg:

This is in response to your letter of February 16, 1955 pertaining to your sister, Gladys Berg. We wish to inform you that she is on a semi-industrial ward and is causing no serious trouble. She denies delusions and hallucinations. The diagnosis of her difficulty is schizophrenic reaction, paranoid type. Her insight is rather superficial and complains considerably. She thinks she should not be in the state hospital. Her physical condition is comparatively good.

We know of nothing you could do for her except when she is in a state of remission you might take her home for a visit. We suggest that you continue writing to her and in all probability her mood will change. Periodically she is unhappy. If her mental condition improves you might take her out on conditional release.

We try to keep our patients classified as to what duties they are capable of doing and those that might have a tendency to bring about mental relief. Will state that she is periodically confused and in poor contact.

Please feel free to inquire about her at any time.

She is withdrawn and would sit for hours in one place staring into space. Her physical examination is essentially negative. Blood pressure is 120/90. Urine and blood Kahn tests are negative. She is well oriented in all spheres with memory intact. Delusions and hallucinations denied. Often laughed and giggled during I.Q. examination, which rated 118. The prognosis is guarded.
