# **Survey: Tougher** rules needed

**Crime and punishment:** Nationwide, most say they're in favor of higher alcohol taxes, restrictions on ads

The overwhelming majority of Americans support tougher restrictions to reduce underage drinking, a new national survey has found.

The survey, commissioned by the Robert Wood Johnson Foundation and released last week, showed that 96 percent of survey respondents were concerned about underage drinking.

It indicated that Americans favor tougher policies, such as restrictions on public drinking and advertising, stricter controls on alcohol sales and higher alcohol taxes to pay for alcohol prevention and reatment programs.

"Underage drinking is a vast problem with grave consequences," said Nancy "Underage drinking is a vast problem that the survey demonstrates that the American public is concerned and wants to see policies put in place that will help prevent our teen-agers from drinking."

Not everyone sees a picture so bleak. "I think there are just as many young people who don't drink as there are who do," said B.J. Williams, a family resource management and consumer studies senior. "I know it's out there, but it's always the bad kids who get the press."

The survey was based on the responses of 7,021 people between April and October of 1997. The sampling error is plus or minus two percentage points.

# Wheels turning on UK's capital campaign

Raised on research: Gift from a 1954 alumnus marks the second the University has received; campaign expected to last for five years

The College of Engineering The College of Engineering a 1954 alumnus and renamed the civil engineering building in his name Friday.

The gift is the second in UK's first Universitywide capital fund-raising campaign. Ashland Foundation announced a \$1 million gift on Oet. That will fund an endowed professorship in biopharmaceutical engineering.

Oliver Raymond, the founder of a Louisville construction equipment company and a civil engineering graduate, donated \$2 million that will be matched with another \$2\$ million from Kentucky's Research Challenge Trust Fund. The money will endow four professorships and up

Over the next five years, UK hopes to raise funds and endowments from private donations for colleges across the campus. UK will emphasize raising funds for the 40 academic and research programs that have already attained national prominence or could do so soon, said Terry Mobley, the chief development officer at UK. "We have been challenged (by the General Assembly) to become a top-20 public research institution," Mobley said. The campaign "is the beginning of our effort to reach this goal."

Almost §87 million is available from the state to match gifts donated to UK before June 30, 2000, he said.

The administration has not yet set a goal for the overall campaign, but instead will wait until

the third year of the campaign to establish a goal. Although some money will go toward facilities and new buildings, the focus of the campaign will be on people. It is "a multi-year, major-gifts campaign that will focus on enhancing our faculty and student scholarship," Mobley said. Friday's donation, added to previous gifts, makes Raymond the most generous donor to the College of Engineering.

The Raymond-Blythe Professorships and the Raymond-Terrell Graduate Fellowships, funded by his most recent gift, were also named in honor of one of Raymond's mentors, UK Professor Emeritus David Blythe and the late Dean Emeritus Daniel Terrell.

## Pope canonizes Jewish-born nun

Pope canonizes Jewish-born nun

VATICAN CITY — Jewish leaders reacted
with outrage yesterday after Pope John Paul canonized Edith Stein, a nun gassed at Auschwitz
who became what the Vatican believes is the first
Jewish-born Catholic saint since the time of the
Apostles.

Although the Pope twinned the canonization with one of his strongest appeals to the
world to guarantee that a "bestial plan" like
the Holocaust was never repeated, Jews said
the move offended the memory of the Holocaust's Jewish victims.

"It's outrageous. This is a very public slap in
he face to the Jewish community," said Efraim
Zuroff, head of the Simon Wiesenthal Centre's
Jerusalem office.

"The Pope is sending an extremely negative
message to the Jewish community that in the
eyes of the Catholic Church the best Jews are
those that convert to Catholicism," he said.

Israel cabinet may oppose pullback

summit in Washington, Prime Minister Benjamin Netanyahu's Cabinet is reportedly balking
at a U.S.-written plan for an Israeli pullback in
the West Bank.

# German death row case is sent to Iranian supreme court

TEHRAN, Iran — The case of a German husinessman sentenced to death in Iran for illicit sexual relations with an Iranian Moslem woman has been sent to Iran's Supreme Court, the official Iranian news agency IRNA reported yesterday. It quoted a judiciary spokesman as saying the court would make the "final decision on the case."

# All the excitement of a circus

'Pippin's' upbeat, lively style and carefree choreography make it a must-see musical

Pippin, which opened last
Thursday night to a large and
appreciative crowd, is full of
fun and surprises. Director
Nancy C. Jones even throws in
an occasional explosion to delight the audience.

But One thing comes as no
surprise — the production is remarkably well done.

Pippin is set in 780 A.D. and
tells the story of Charlemagne's
son. Hardly a history lesson,
this story is about self-discovery and finding satisfaction in
life's simple pleasures.

Jones' ensemble cast is
more than a chorus line. They
practically invade the action as
it ensues. The choreography is
carefree, inventive and for the
most part, cleanly performed.

Michael Denhardt's costume design combines with
John Holloway's scenery design to set the mood at the outset, Vibrant colors are rampant.

strips the stage. The flashy
backdrops are gone, the cartoonish ensemble absent. Soft
down stage lighting and Comb's
angelic vocals are all that remain, and the result is magic.

Miles Meehan is another
bright star, one of a long line of
outstanding child actors to
grace the Guignol. This kid is
awesome. More than just talent
and bravery, Meehan shows remarkable stage presence.

Jones' keen direction is evident here as well. Her use of
Meehan is well-timed and precisely staged, often surprising
the audience with the lad's appearance and vocals. David
Cross is too young and sprightya Scharles. Whether the fault
lies with Emily Corman's
make-up design or Cross' characterization. Charlemagne
looks as young or younger than
Pippin. Jan Hooker is adequately aged as Berthe, but Hooker
seems a little out of breath in
an otherwise excellent number.

The lively supporting enseemble and some engaging

choreography make up for these lapses. There's almost always something enjoyable on stage. Musical Director Martha Wrenn and the four musicians who accompany her don't miss a beat. The music is hot and heavy, doing credit to Stephen Schwartz's memorable score. Excellent vocalists, a talented ensemble and strong direction make Pippin much more than a treat. This production is a whole plate of goodies. Pippin will be performed at 8 p.m. on Oct. 15, 16 and 17, and at 2 p.m. Oct. 17 and 18 in the Guignol Theatre of the Fine Arts Building.

The questions were answered Saturday, when White led a Wildcat revival at
Commonwealth Stadium and UK beat
South Carolina 33-28.

White's 117 yards receiving and 108
yards rushing led UK to its most balanced
offensive day since last September, when
the Wildcats torched Indiana 49-7.

The Wildcat ground game accounted
for more than 40 percent of UK's 526 yards
of total offense, and the 211-yard rush to
tal was the highest of the Hal Mumme era.
White became the first UK player to pass
the 100-yard plateau in both rushing and
receiving.



The nation's premier passing offense attempted just four passes in the first quarter. UK finished the quarter with 92 yards rushing and 13 yards by air.

"It wasn't necessar'ily that we wanted to run the ball more," Mumme said.

# **Defense** overcomes adversity, survives

The Cats survived a on-again, off-again
effort long enough to defeat the visiting
South Carolina Gamecocks 39:28 on Saturday
The victory, UK's fourth of the 1998

Overall, we played well but we were disappointed with the effort in the last series (of the game)." The key to UK's defensive effort came from the pressure of defensive linemen Marvin Major, Mark Jacobs, Gordon Crowe and Dennis Johnson, who camped out in the Gamecock backfield for most of the game. The pressure forced Carolina throw the ball, and eventually led to starting quarterback Anthony Wright leaving the game.

Some of us have been at UK long enough to remember the old days of Bill Curry's football team. You know, the "three lost yards and a cloud of dust" offensive philosophy?

Those days are long gone, and the new Commonwealth Stadium finds itself buried in offensive records and sold-out crowds.

A problem with sold-out games is, every seat in the stadium has been sold on a ticket to somebody. That means people cannot move freely from section to section and sit with their friends whenever they want.

Zurcher finished his second game starting for Gary with a




