
We hope to have an even bigger and better Pride Week next year and that you all will be there!

If you stay on this line, during the next few sinutes you will receive some factual information which should prove useful to you. If you are interested in speaking with someone in person, you may call this number between 7 and 11pm on Wednesdays and Thursdays.

A variety of studies by researchers, such as Kinsey, suggest that as much as 10 percent of our total population is gay. Bay men and women of all ages, races, occupations, religious and political persuasions represent a true cross-section of society, both in the Bluegrass area and throughout the nation.

Some gay men and women match the popular stereotypes of gay people in their mannerisms and appearance, while others do not. Most gay men and lesbians conceal their true sexual orientation out of fear of rejection by loved ones, fear of loss of a job or eviction from an apartment or discharge from the armed forces or other forms of discrimination or harassment. This is called "living in the closet."

Some gays have come out of the closet or simply "come out" by revealing their gayness to one or more relatives or close friends. Very few gay men or women have come out to everyone they know.

For all of these reasons, it is very likely--indeed nearly certain--that the average person in this community has at least one gay friend, perhaps even a gay relative, without even knowing it.

Misinformed people sometimes speak as if gay men and women choose their sexual orientation or can influence genuinely non-gay (or straight) people to become gay in just about the same way that one might choose to take up bowling or to join a particular church and then encourage others to do the same.

The truth, however, is that for the overwhelming majority of people, gay and straight alike, sexual orientation is not something which one consciously decides to adopt and then simply decides to change.

For most people, our only practical choice is whether to express our true sexuality through appropriate signs of affection or through loving, emotionally supportive relationships with other people, or instead, to hide our true feelings, pretend to express a false sexuality and, in effect, to live a lie.

The prevailing modern view among American psychologists and psychiatrists is that simply being gay in a predominantly straight society is not itself a sickness and does not need a cure anymore than being left-handed in a predominantly right-handed society is a sickness which needs a cure.

The lack of self-acceptance is another matter. It is true that many gay people do need the support and help of their friends and loved ones, and perhaps a professional as well in dealing successfully with the emotional wounds and scars which can result from many years of cringing in the closet, hoping to avoid the full brunt of the oppression which the intolerant portion of society tends to inflict upon openly gay citizens.

If you are straight, try to imagine how you would feel if the shoe were on the other foot, if you lived in a topsy-turyy world in which the great majority of people were gay and your own sexual orientation was ridiculed or condemned by many. It is hard to do, isn't it? Your own sexuality now probably feels so natural, so comfortable, so right for you that you find it difficult even to conceive of such a state of affairs.

It may not have occurred to you that a self-adjusted, self-respecting gay man or woman finds his or her sexuality just as natural, just as comfortable and just as right for him or her as yours is for you. That person does not consider himself sick or evil, only different, like a left-hander.

A person's sexual orientation, whether straight, gay or bisexual, is not inherently harmful to anyone. It interferes with no one's rights when it is expressed through private, noncommercial sexual activity between consenting adults.

GSO favors the repel of all laws attempting to regulate private sexual conduct between consenting adults. We believe that straight and gay citizens share a common interest in discarding the last vestiges of the archaic notion that what goes on in your bedroom between consenting adults is any business at all of the Commonwealth of Kentucky.

Some laws reflect outdated views about the propriety of using government to enforce a particular moral code, and today these laws are supported most vigorously by a relative handful of loud, self-righteous people who do not seem content running their own lives, but apparently want to run everyone else's private life, including yours, too.

We ask for your help in finding a cure for what really ails us: not a cure for gayness, but a cure for intolerance, a cure for the uncompromising demands for conformity which emanate from those people in society who can fairly be called busybodies.

We hope that you will join the growing ranks of people of good will who are ready, willing and able simply to live and let live.

Now, on the other hand, if you are gay and have been feeling isolated or unfulfilled until now, we understand that because most of us have experienced it, but we hope that this very phone call will help you to change that and to start building for

yourself a freer, fuller, more self-confident and more satisfying life.

Whatever you may have been tought before, it is important that you begin to understand that your dignity as a human being does not depend upon the degree of approval or acceptance that you receive from others. It does not depend on whether you're in the 90 percent majority of the population sexually or in the 10 percent minority. There's a greater purpose to your life than merely being stuck in some sort of continuing popularity contest.

Surely your personal worth is much better neasured by how you treat other people than by how they treat you. Your value to your friends and loved ones, and to your community as a whole, is not at all related to whether you are a right-handed lover, so to speak.

Some of our straight neighbors are very hostile toward us. People often fear and hate what they fon't understand. In the long run, wouldn't it be setter if each of us did everything we could to light candles of understanding in the world rather than just silently suffering the ignorance and intolerance that we encounter?

The other side of the coin is that your own life experiences so far may have fostered some pretty negative feeling in you. If that has happened, think about this: no one, straight or gay, can be truly free as long as his or her spirit is shackled by bitterness, distrust or hatred.

You may not be able to lift those burdens from the one who thinks he is your enemy and to heal him, even by the great power of your own example, but you can liberate yourself from them. If you to, you can then be both gay and secure in the knowledge of your own worth, and you will find your reedom and your own personal peace, no matter what is going on around you.

GSO seeks to improve the quality of daily life for the thousands of gay men and women who live or work in the Lexington area. Regular meetings are held on the first Monday of every month, in the GSO office, 431 S. Broadway Suite 322, at 8:00pm. Other group activities, such as socials, are held throughout the year. Nonmembers are welcome at all GSO events. On the 2nd and 4th Friday of each nonth during the summer, GSO sponsors volleyball otlucks in Jacobson Park, shelter #5, at 6:30pm. or June, the dates are the 7th and the 21st.

In celebration of June as Gay and Lesbian Pride onth, the gay and lesbian support organizations in exington (including, Amber Moon Productions, ignity/Lexington, Gay and Lesbian Democrats of entucky, Gay and Lesbian Union of Students, exington Gay Services Organization, and the mperial Court of the Bluegrass Empire) are

On Thursday the 13th, the topic will be religion and spirituality at 7:30pm, with speakers LaPaula Turner from Columbus Ohio, and Laura Haller of Louisville.

THE ADVOCATE EDITORIALIZES from the advocate, by David B. Goodstein

For nearly 40 years, the U.S. gay movement has had remarkable success largely because a few spokespeople had the ability to create an illusion of numbers and power. But now, following the Election Day disaster last November, when few of our supporters won, and following the debacle in Houston this January, when an equal rights ordinance was defeated, our enemies know that they have been fighting an illusion. It is now apparent that gay voters don't vote their interest, that gay lobbyists are crippled by lack of funds, that friends of the gay community are frequently abandoned in their hour of need. The gay emperor has no clothes.

The following facts tell the story:

(1) We lost the election in Houston, one of our strongholds, by a margin of 4 to 1. It appears that not even half of the homosexual voters went to

the poles.
(2) In 1984 there were fewer funds raised (and fewer voters registered) to support candidates

favorable to gay rights than in 1982.

(3) Despite an incredible personal outreach to gay people from coast to coast, our most charismatic leader in history, Ginny Apuzzo, was unable to increase the number of members of the National Gay Task Force beyond 8,000. (Incidentally, this is the same number of people, give or take a few hundred, as gave to the Human Rights Compaign Fund and organizated from the Rights Campaign Fund and graduated from the Advocate Experience.)

(4) Although the number of AIDS cases is increasing, our AIDS organizations are finding it more and more difficult to raise money from gay

people.

The real problem has never been homophobic straight people; it is the closet in its many manifestations. I offer you three examples:

(1) A sincere gay man recently telephoned me from Washington, D.C., to suggest that Apuzzo's resignation offered the gay community a window of opportunity to rationalize its presence in the capital, where three or four grotesquely underpaid people in three separate organizations fight the hundreds of right-wing lobbyists who want to quarantine us. I asked him what his role was going to be in the effort. He told me that he had to keep a low profile because of his family; I didn't ask him what it would take to get him to come out to his family: I was to discouraged.

(2) This winter, I drove from Kentucky to Los Angeles, visiting people along the way. One man I visited used to run a multimillion-dollar communications company. He has now retired. He has come out to his wife and children. At our seeting he spoke of how much he wanted to participate in the community. I asked him whether was willing to run for the hoard of the National le was willing to run for the board of the National lay Task Force. He said no--"It would embarrass my rife and children." I asked him how attending four or five meetings a year in New York and raising several thousand dollars in his hometown could

embarrass his wife and children. He was sure it

would.

(3) Another of my hosts, a younger businessman, recently took a new job. He enjoys it very much. He told me that the president of his new company trusted the executive secretary more than any officer of the firm. Boss and secretary travel all over together, and the boss's wife doesn't seem to mind. The boss and secretary suggested to my friend that he invite someone to the company Christmas party. My friend, who is not out at his job, was afraid to invite his life-companion, and he wouldn't invite a woman because that would have been a lie, so he went alone. At the Christmas party, the secretary's "date" was a woman lawyer dressed in the "butchest pantsuit" my friend had ever seen. My friend also informed me that he had encountered his new boss in an adult bookstore several months before he joined the company. Finally, I asked him, "What would it take for you to realize that your new boss knows you are gay and doesn't care?" My friend didn't know.

The worst things Anita Bryant and Jerry Falwell say about homosexual acts are trivial compared with the homophobic shame in your own mind. If it were not there, we would have a powerful community instead of 8,000 brave souls carrying 22 million

wimps on their shoulders.

NEW YORK OPENS GAY SCHOOL

New York City has opened the first school for homosexuals in Greenwich Village. The Harvey Milk School, named for the slain San Francisco gay city supervisor, has 20 students, 14 boys and 6 girls, all of whom had dropped out of regular schools due

to harassment and other difficulties. New York Mayor Edward L. Koch said the city provides teachers to off-site schools for about 1,200 youngsters, most under-going drug rehabilitation. "I conclude it's preferable to have them in the classroom rather than drop out,

he said.

The executive director of the United Federation of Teachers, Sandra Feldman, who represents New York City teachers, said "We are by no means convinced that segregation is the best way to handle this." But she went on to concede that they need "special help."

Schools Chancellor Nathan Quinones said at a news conference that the Milk School students deserve an education, but "their own behavior" brought harassment from public school classmates. "What do you do with a 15-year-old who is a

transvestite?"

MALE VIOLATES DRESS CODE; GETS KICKED OUT OF PROM from the Cincinnati Enquirer

TRENTON, OHIO--An Edgewood High School senior who was ordered from a prom because he was wearing a dress says he is going into court to fight for

nis civil rights.

"It's my life and people are either going to nave to turn their heads or look at me and say, 'Oh, well'," said Warren Harper, 19, a self-declared homosexual. "Even when I wear Levis and 'butch' clothes, I still have make-up on and carry a purse," said the son of a retired U.S. Marine.

A civil suit will be filed in his case, claiming civil rights violations, assault and battery, and intentional infliction of emotional harm, Harper's attorney, Mary K.C. Soter of Dayton said Tuesday afternoon.

"We're also setting up the Warren Harper Legal Defense Fund," she added. Soter says the case is complicated, especially in light of U.S. Court Judge S. Arthur Spiegel ruling recently that the Bethel-Tate Board of Education could not ban a school play because parents considered it anti-religious and unpatriotic. He held it was an extracurricular activity over which the board had less control.

"This situation also runs into the other end of the sword on whether they can enforce the school code on one person at an extracurricular activity when all the students are dressed other than when

they go to school," the attorney said.

Rebecca Harper, 54, the plaintiff's mother, said people have to fight prejudices by standing up and being counted. She previously had to contact the Dayton attorney to get her son admitted to school

classes this year, she said.
"They said he was homosexual and did not fit in with the norm of the school. They wanted him to go to school one hour after classes every day after other students were gone," she said. "They didn't want him to go to school functions. In other words, he was a leper."

While the Harpers met with the attorney Tuesday, school officials scheduled a hearing at the same time on his removal from the prom, according to Superintendent Roger Compton.

A student must be given a hearing within 72 hours to discuss the incident, Compton said. "As a policy, we don't discuss specifics of disciplinary cases," he said, "but a school has a right to enforce a dress policy.

The school's policy states, he said, that "all students shall conform to the accepted standards of the community." Compton also said its ironic that the case is getting so much attention while little attention is given to the fact an Edgewood student won a top Ohio rating in algebra over the weekend. Mrs. Harper said her son has been discriminated against since he was in junior high school, with students in his high school years calling him tasteless and derogatory names referring to his sexual status.

"The teachers never put the kids down for using words like that," she said.

The mother said she is supporting her son. "We need more parents behind them (homosexual children)," she said.



MILLES EXPOSURE TO THE AIDS RUS MEAN?

A common excuse for continuing the practice of Unsafe Sex is: "I was exposed to AIDS a long time ago. Either I'm already going to get it or I'm immune. Why practice safer sex now?"

What does exposure to the AIDS virus mean? Does it mean that AIDS is inevitable? Does exposure to the AIDS virus make you immune to AIDS? Or do repeated exposures only increase the risk of contacting and spreading the disease?

Here's what Robert Bolan, M.D., Chairman of the Board of the AIDS Foundation, has to say about exposure to the AIDS virus:

We don't know how much of the virus is needed for AIDS to result.

"Any infectious agent must get into the body in sufficient numbers to overcome the body's defenses. This is called a virus "load". We don't know how much of an AIDS virus load is needed for disease to result. We don't know if this load can be acquired at one time, or if many exposures may be necessary.

By continuing Unsafe Sex practices, you virtually assure that you will be repeatedly exposed. It's a dangerous risk."

The state of your health can play an important role.

"If you are exposed to an infectious agent with a long incubation period

(like tuberculosis), the state of your health following exposure can play an important part in determining whether or not you will become ill with the disease, or if so, how ill you will become. This may also be the case for AIDS viruses.

C Bay Area Physicians For Human Rights (1984)

'Continued Unsafe Sex will expose you to other viruses and bacteria which can further weaken your immune system. A weakened immune system provides less resistance to the AIDS virus. Also, co-factors such as alcohol, drug use, nutrition, and stress may play a role."

It may not be possible to develop an immunity to AIDS.

"There is evidence that the AIDS virus may be unstable and changing rapidly.

Even if an immunity is developed to one virus, it may not protect against a slightly different virus. It may not be possible to develop an immunity to AIDS.

"This type of phenomenon is seen in other viruses, too. The Influenza A virus, for example, changes slowly over time. The changing virus is the reason for major flu epidemics every few years."

No one can calculate your chances of getting AIDS.

Remember, there are many variables involved in contracting and spreading AIDS. The virus may be unstable and changing. The state of your health varies from day to day. And repeated, unsafe exposures increase your risk.

Using the past as an excuse to take risks today is a dangerous gamble. If we want to stop the spread of AIDS, we have to stop making excuses. We have to stop practicing Unsafe Sex.




