SEEING SPORT STUFF

AFTER several weeks of diligent study, Chet Wynne's football class will take its first quiz tonight.

So much interest has been manifested in the progress of Dr. Wynne's class that several thousand spectators have promised to come out to look on, under the powerful Masdus of Corcoran Field.

Notwithstanding the fact that Kentucky has already played one game, the Xavier melee is expected to be the first time that the 'Cats will be under any sustaining firing.

When it comes to battling with the Musketeers up at Xavier, however, there is always plenty of competition, which although it may not be quite on a par with that furnished by some of Kentucky's

tougher conference opponents, yet is keen enough for an early season collision.

Some of the harder members of the student body, with an aptitude for reminiscence, will be able to think back a year and recall that we didn't shellback the Muskies last season.

One of the peculiar angles of that contest was the fact that while four scores were carried over the goal line, none of them was made by the team in possession of the ball at the start of the play.

A slippery field, caused by the light rain which fell through the scuffle, may have been responsible for the slowing up of the Kentucky offensive or it may have been that the 'Cats, acting under orders from Coach Wynne, were deliberately operating under a camouflage for the benefit of Francis Schmidt, Ohio State mentor, whose team was met the following Saturday.

Whatever the cause, our club did not do anything spectacular from offensive formations against the Muskies.

As far as the relative merits of this year's teams are concerned, we expect that the Wildcats should be far superior to the Musketeers. That's merely our observation. A lot of the other observers don't seem to think so.

Here's what the rival directors say about it. Wednesday afternoon Coach Wynne informed us that the game would be a tough one. When we appeared slightly sceptical of that statement, Chester added, "Well, I'm going to start the first team and take no chances."

A few weeks ago, while still in Cincinnati, we had an opportunity to watch Xavier's squad go through a drill and while the candidates were toiling under a scorching sun, talk to Coach Crowe, who, by the way, is a swell guy.

Jimmy Miner, who covers Xavier for the Cincinnati Post, introduced us to Crowe and told him we were from Kentucky. Of course he asked us a few questions about the Wildcats and we got back by asking a few about the X's.

Although appearing fairly optimistic, in general, about his rather tough schedule, Coach Crowe was downright pessimistic about his outfit's chances against Kentucky. "We should win every other game, but I don't think we can take Chet's team," said Crowe, "they're supposed to have a powerhouse and while we expect to have a strong squad here later in the season, the Kentucky game comes too early for us to do any good."

The workout that Xavier went through the day we saw them wouldn't warrant our making any authoritative statements about their ability but it was enough to convince us, personally, that the Wildcats should win tonight.

Ordinarily, as most of you know, we are not given to any undue jubilation over the chances of the Wildcats on any given day, but for this once we want to make a prediction. After the game tonight, Kentucky will have chalked up its second victory, and to go farther, they will have won by three touchdowns.

We don't expect that our forecast will keep any of the customers from looking in on the contest themselves to see if the Wildcats can pass their first examination.

ENEMY CAMPS

With the smoothest spot passed viciously and as they get bigger and rougher as they travel on, the University of Kentucky football team faces the long road to an undefeated season with grim determination.

Only three of the Wildcat's future foes played games on Saturday. These teams, Xavier, Clemson, and V. M. I., were forced to show very little of their real strength.

All but one of the rest of Kentucky's foes play their first games this week-end with Tennessee, Manhattan, Alabama, and Washington and Lee tangling with foes on Saturday and Georgia Tech opening its schedule on Friday.

Georgia Tech's experienced squad believed by many sports writers and coaches to be the best in the south, brought last week's work to a close with a scrimmage. With "Dutch" Konemann, Appleby, and Tharpe doing much of the ball carrying, the Yellow Jackets showed a great deftness for handling forward and lateral passes.

Tennessee and Alabama are reputed as being has beans. One cannot overlook the fact, however, that Coach Frank Thomas took the Tide to the Rose Bowl in 1935 and it is rumored that he has like ambitions this season.

Manhattan has been improving steadily in the past few years and is just about ripe for a successful season. In the East there are many who say that the Jaspers are the best bet in the New York area, which includes such schools as Columbia and N. Y. U. Chick Meehan has had a couple of years to install his system and his reputation indicates that he will probably have more tricks than a magician to pull on his opponents.

No prediction that your writer could make would be of any importance and would probably be as cock-eyed as the Demon Dopester's, but since it is customary for all sports writers to predict, I will try. The Wildcats are due for a very successful season with nine victories and only one defeat. The big blue team's nemesis will be either Alabama or Georgia Tech.

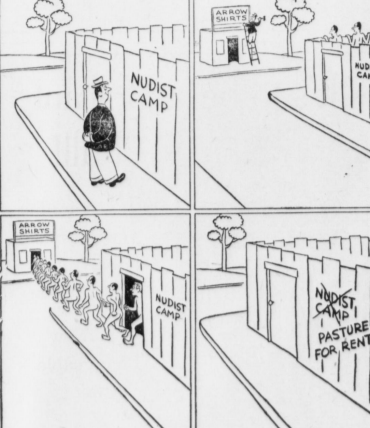
