

Two regular members of the 1936 University of Kentucky football team also are members of the Wildcat basketball squad. They're guards in basketball and both are ends in football. They are Joe "Red" Hagan and Russell Ellington. Both live at Louisville.

The first touchdown scored this season by the University of Kentucky football team was made by Dameron Davis, sophomore halfback, who returned a punt 40 yards to score on Maryville. Dameron has an older brother on the team. He is Bob Davis, a junior, a regular right halfback. Dameron, whom he calls "Honey," is Bob's understudy. Inspired by Dameron's touchdown against Maryville, Bob, who replaced him, scored five markers during the half that he played.

The University of Kentucky football team will play an eastern team this season for the first time. The Wildcats will meet Manhattan College, coached by the great Chick Meehan, November 7 at Brooklyn, N. Y. Meehan, who developed great teams at New York University, has a fine team at Manhattan. His team conditioned itself by scrimmaging against the professional New York Giants early this fall.

A fine looking crop of freshman football players reported to the University of Kentucky this fall. Included in the group are several promising linemen. As Kentucky will lose such line stars as Capt. Stanley Nevers, Joe Huddleston and Gene Myers by graduation next June, these youngsters will come in handy next fall as sophomores.





Greetings to a Fighting Team

Head Coach Chester Allen Wynne

Star fullback and world's champion high hurdler at Notre Dame, maker of championship football teams at Creighton and later at Auburn, native of Kansas but adopted Kentuckian, attorney-at-law, close friend and favorite pupil of the late Knute Rockne, the man all Kentucky is banking on to lead the Wildcats eventually to Southern football supremacy.

That is Chet Wynne.
This mild mannered,
cultured gentleman who
once shared the National
football limelight with
George Gipp in Rockne's
backfield of the early
1920's, is entering on his
third season at Kentucky
with ambitions of turning out a team that will
make Kentuckians everywhere glow with
pride.

When Wynne came to the Blue Grass he found football in a deplorable state. Hope had all but died. Victories had been scarce. Friends had turned away. There was muttering by fans whose enthusiasm had curdled. Alumni turned their heads.

But there were still loyal friends of the Blue and White. These stretched out their arms toward the South, where Chet Wynne had performed the miracle of creating a great football machine on the deep Alabama plains. He heard their call and left Auburn and his successes there to start building all over again at Kentucky.

It was a dreary struggle for the Chetter. Material was scarce. Spirit on the campus was at a low ebb. He was faced with the toughest assignment of his career. But the Chetter was undaunted.

With a disspirited squad, Wynne turned out a fighting team his first season at Kentucky. Teams that had been defeating the Wildcats handily found the going hard. Kentucky was beginning to win back its self-respect. The Wildcats showed improvement in breaking even in a ten-game schedule.

When the second Wynne season started last fall at Lexington hope had been born again. The material

was better but there was lack of reserves. The Wildcats were faced with a back-breaking schedule but, with Wynne at the helm they came through to win six of their ten games, showing gradual improvement. They were magnificent in defeat when they lost to Ohio State's great team by 19 to 6 at Columbus, and they

won a world of respect in that game.


With two great stars, Bert Johnson, halfback, and Stanley Nevers, tackle, out because of injuries, the Kentuckians slumped after mid-season, but they came back to end the season in a blaze of glory in handing Tennessee a 27 to 0 defeat, the first Kentucky victory over the Volunteers in a decade and the worst beating taken by Tennessee in years. That victory did more to arouse enthusiasm at Kentucky than anything that had happened in a generation. It proved that those who believed in Wynne were not mistaken.

Wynne had given Kentucky the team it had hoped for — a team that fought from the first kick-off to the last whistle. It drove on the offense; it fought for every inch on defense. It was a TEAM.

Another year is at hand, and a new Kentucky spirit has been born to give encouragement to a Kentucky's own team. The dissatisfaction of the old days is gone; a new confi-

dence and a new esteem rule in its place. Win, lose or draw — Kentucky has done its best. That all-pervading spirit is the stuff from which tradition is built and is the foundation stone for greater and more glorious years to come.

Now the dark-eyed Wynne is facing another season with a high-spirited crew of hard-fighting Wildcats who believe they are as good as the best. They are eager for action, fearless, self-confident, superbly coached, capable. They are a tribute to the ability of Chet Wynne.

Howdy, Alligators, Howdy

Nineteen years ago when S. A. "Daddy" Boles, now graduate manager of athletics, was head football coach of the Wildcats, the University of Florida 'Gators appeared on the Kentucky schedule for the first time. It was a sad day for the Floridians but a great afternoon for the 'Cats, who surprised the fans, and themselves as well, by shellacking the invaders by 52 to 0.

The two elevens did not meet again until 1926, when the Wildcats went to Jacksonville and defeated the Alligators by 18 to 13. The following year Florida reached a high peak in Southern football circles. Kentucky fell before Florida that year by 27 to 6 at Jacksonville.

The next Kentucky-Florida engagement on the gridiron was in 1931 when the Wildcats took a close 7 to 2 victory at Jacksonville. Florida came to Lexington last year to be special guests at Kentucky's home-coming. It was a great game, a hard-fought battle that was not decided until the final minutes when Bob Davis raced half the length of the field to score Kentucky's second touchdown and make the victory certain. Kentucky won that game by 15 to 6.

Florida, in defeating Stetson by five touchdowns last Saturday, served notice on the Wildcats that another battle royal is in the offing.

Florida this year is being coached by an old friend of Kentucky. He is genial Josh Cody, who can smile broader and frown deeper than any coach in the country. Josh, as an All-America tackle years ago at Vanderbilt, played against and helped defeat Kentucky three times. He coached at Clemson in 1929 when the Wildcats won by 40 to 6. After a tour of duty at Clemson, Josh returned to his alma mater as line coach. He has been in Lexington many times as coach of the Vanderbilt basketball team.

Kentucky is linked closely to Florida because of Florida's president, Dr. John J. Tigert, who was on the Kentucky faculty for years before going to Florida. Dr. Tigert who left here to become United States Commissioner of Education, was head of the Department of Philosophy and Psychology here and in 1915 and 1916 was head football coach of the Wildcats.

WILDCAT TRACK TEAM HAS GOOD SEASON



The University of Kentucky track team, working its last year under the coaching of Bernie Shively, who will devote all his time in the future to physical education classes in the University and the University Training School, won two dual meets and lost one by a close score last spring.

The Kentucky track team was forced to train without a track. The athletes were forced to run on the grass of the football practice field, and on at least one occasion, went to Georgetown to work out on the track there. This condition was caused by the reconstruction of the cinder track around Stoll Field. This track has been completed and now is one of the finest in the country. It is a quarter-mile track with a 220-yard straightway. In the future you may expect the Kentucky track teams of rank with the best in the South.

The Wildcats won their first dual meet, with Vanderbilt at Nashville, by 61 1-2 to 55 1-2. They lost their next encounter, with Tennessee at Knoxville, by 66 to 51, and came back to trounce Berea by 94 to 37 at Berea.

Coach Shively took a few of his boys to the conference meet at Birmingham and they picked up quite a few points and made a very respectable showing. Dave Rogan won the half-mile and the mile runs there, establishing a new conference record in the mile at 4 minutes 22 seconds.

The freshman track team won both its dual meets, defeating Tennessee 70 to 47, and Berea 91 to 40.







One of the two "brother acts" on the University of Kentucky football squad was broken up, temporarily, when Randall Phillips suffered an attack of appendicitis. Randall is an end. His brother, Earl, is a quarterback. They hail from Montgomery, Ala. The other brothers on the squad are Bob and Dameron Davis, halfbacks. Another set of brothers, Sam and Lexie Potter, both guards, played for Kentucky last year. Sam was graduated last June. Several years ago there were three brothers on the squad and all played fulback. They were Frank, Tom and Jack Phipps.

The University of Kentucky at last apparently has a consistent place-kicker in Elmore Simpson, 195-pound quarterback. Against Xavier he kicked three goals after touchdowns, bringing his total to seven in a row. Simpson, a junior, played fullback on the Kentucky team last fall but, because of his blocking ability and his smartness in calling plays, was shifted to quarterback by Coach Chet Wynne. He also is a good punter. He booted one for 68 yards against Xavier this fall.

Chet Wynne, head football coach and athletic director, as well as golf coach at the University of Kentucky, toured Europe in 1928 with Knute Rockne, the great Notre Dame coach. Wynne played fullback for Rockne at South Bend. After graduation, Wynne aided Rockne in his coaching schools. Wynne, besides being a football star, aso was a great track man at Notre Dame. He established a world's record in the 60-yard indoor hurdles. The only non-Catholic on the Notre Dame track squad, Wynne was elected captain by acclamation.

Two former University of Kentucky football and basketball players took over the coaching duties at Morehead State Teachers' College this fall. They are Ellis Johnson, head coach, and Len Miller, assistant. While at Kentucky, Johnson was a four-letter man. The only other athlete to earn four letters in major sports at Kentucky was Charles T. Hughes. Johnson, an Ashland boy, is not related to Bert Johnson, now a star halfback at Kentucky. Ellis Johnson twice was named on the all-southern basketball team while at Kentucky.



UNIVERSITY OF KENTUCKY BASKETBALL TEAM IN 1935-36



For the first time in years, the University of Kentucky had absolutely no claim on the South-eastern Conference basketball title at the close of the 1935-36 season last spring. But still the season was considered quite successful as the Wildcats won 14 of their scheduled games and lost only four.

Coach Adolph Rupp had planned to build his team around a sophomore, the all-American center, Leroy Edwards, but had to change his plans when Edwards turned professional and remained at Indianapolis instead of continuing his education and his basketball at Kentucky.

Without Edwards, Coach Rupp was under a terrific handicap but he made the most of the material at hand and once more turned out a team that was a credit to the University.


Possibly one of the most surprised basketball teams ever to trod a hardwood floor was the University of Pittsburgh Panthers here last January 8. Pitt took a Southern tour and dropped off in Lexington with the idea of giving the Wildcats a lesson in basketball. Imagine how those Panthers felt when, at the end of the half, Kentucky was leading by 22 to 2. The Panthers picked up a bit in the last half but the damage was done and Kentucky won by 35 to 17.

Once more the Wildcat basketball team displayed its strength against Alabama, which has been unable to whip Kentucky in basketball since Coach Rupp took over the reins here. Coach Hank Crisp's lanky lads fell by the close score of 32 to 30 at Tuscaloosa, and by 40 to 34 at Lexington.

Other high lights of the season were the Wildcat victories over the powerful Michigan State and Butler University quintets. The worst defeat suffered by a Wildcat basketball team in years was its loss to Notre Dame by 41 to 20. They will meet again at Louisville next spring and the Wildcats hope to achieve their revenge.

Southern basketball fans outside of Kentucky thought that the millenium was at hand during the past season when the Wildcats bowed to two Southern teams, Vanderbilt and Tennessee. The 'Cats, however, evened the count with these two opponents by also beating them.
