PFLAG Revival

Mary Lou Wallner will be the keynote speaker at the "revival" of PFLAG chapter in Lexington. This initial meeting will be on Thursday, November 8, at 7 p.m. at Chapel Hill Presbyterian Church, 3534 Tates Creek Road in Lexington.

PFLAG is a national organization that supports family and friends of gay, lesbian, bisexual, and transgender individuals. A local chapter was active in the early 1990's and is now being revitalized. The PFLAG mission states: "We believe homophobia, not homosexuality, threatens our families and society. Through support, education, and advocacy PFLAG acts to create a society that is health and respectul fo human diversity."

At this first meeting, Mrs. Wallner will share her struggle to come to terms with the suicide of her lesbian daughter Anna, in February 1997. Mary Lou Wallner was trapped by her own judgmental and homophobic religious beliefs. In her grief, she was willing to confront the spiritual implications of her refusal to accept Anna's homosexuality. David and his sister, Amy Sedaris, have collaborated under the name The Talent Family and written several plays which have been produced in New York City. His most recent book is Me Talk Pretty One Day. A film version is currently being made by director Wavne Wang.







Recovering Our History: Vice Versa by David Williams

Lisa Ben's "Vice Versa," was the world's very first lesbian periodical (1947). Lisa Ben (a pseudonym: acronym for "lesbian") typed the newsletter at work in great secrecy. She would make three or four carbon copies at a time, and then would have to re-type the entire newsletter, make more carbon copies, etc. (if you don't know what carbon paper is, hooray!) As a result, no issues of "Vice Versa" had more than nine or ten copies and they're extremely rare and very valuable today.

"Vice Versa" had some news but was mainly designed to connect one lesbian with another through personal ads. At the time, gay and lesbian bars in Los Angeles, as throughout the nation, were routinely raided by the police and shut down. It was illegal to serve homosexuals alcoholic beverages in many states. So it was difficult for lesbians to meet one another. "Vice Versa" served that purpose adequately for a short time. Each copy was passed around to numerous individuals. So while there were only a few copies of any issue, they got read

by hundreds of women.

Unfortunately, because it took a lot of work and Lisa Ben (who is still alive) had to type it in secret, she typed out only nine issues of the publication before she gave it up. But it was a very valiant effort on the part of just one person and it helped lesbians in Los Angeles through a very trying time: the early years of what has since come to be called the McCarthy Era.



GSA Emergency Fund

Statistics show that queer youth make up a large percentage of homeless youth. There are also many living on the edge of homelessness whether that means living at home with parents who aren't supportive (or even abusive) or being pushed out of their homes as soon as they turn 18 with little help to get started.

The GLSO GSA was not meeting for many months before young people with minimal family support found their way to us. The Bookworm has made a generous donation that has enabled GLSO to set up a program that offers emergency help to GSA members who are in financial crisis. We are not offering ongoing support, but crisis intervention.

Youth can fill out a form to apply for support from the GLSO Emergency Fund. The GSA advisors will approve or disapprove the request and pass it on to a sub-committee of the GLSO for final approval. GLSO can also refer people to GOD's pantry for emergency food. The support will be kept confidential and youth will be asked to do some volunteer work at the Pride Center in exchange for the support.

The fund can also be used to assist youth who are in financial need to help pay for some of our field trips. They will have to give reasons why they can not come up with the funds at home or by working. GLSO also has some money for field trips and other GSA expenses.

We appreciated the donation from The Bookworm and know that it is appreciated by the youth who have already received help and those that will benefit from it in the future. If anyone else would like to contribute to this Emergency Fund or to help cover the general expenses of the GSA, your donations would be most welcomed.

YOUR PRIDE CENTER: A LETTER FROM GINGER MOORE



Hello Everyone! This is Ginger, your new Office Manager for GLSO and the Pride Center. I'd like to talk to you about some of the things I have seen,

and how the Center has grown since it opened in June of this year.

The Pride Center is visited everyday by from one to five people. They come in for many different reasons, all important to their wellbeing. Teenager Paul* brought his mother and younger brother to show his Mom that the Center was a good place for him to spend his time. His Mom checked out a book about having a gay teenage son. Carter*, a local business man that had just moved into the area, wanted to look at the library and ask about events that are happening during the month. He got a subscription to the GLSO News and a copy of the Pink Pages. He was delighted to know there were things happening in the gay community in addition to the bar scene.

The most poignant visitors are the ones that come in, make a quick circle of the room, cannot be engaged in conversation, and have difficulty making eye contact. For some people, it is very frightening even to enter the Center. I have to give them credit for just trying. I hope they will come back when it is less scary for them.

Calls have increased from a few a month to 12-15 a day; a man wanting to know the name of a gay male therapist, a lesbian couple needing legal counseling, a public library wanting copies of the GLSO News. There are calls about the Discussion Group and Movie Nights, and from transgender persons inquiring about how to begin the long hormone and therapy process. They are all referred to the appropriate source and given support and encouragement. At least once a day, people just call, listen to my greeting and hang up.

The Center is being used more and more by the general public. The UK Anthropology Department is sending students to one of our events to learn about diversity. Recently, a graduate social work class, made up of mainly straight students, came to the Center to hear a presentation by classmates concerning our community and issues in working with GLBT clients. For some, it was the first time they would have the

opportunity to speak to gays and lesbians openly and candidly about what it is like to be gay. Members of the GLSO Speakers Bureau and others participated. They had so many questions, they wanted to meet again.

People are coming in just to talk. It is not unusual for 2-5 people to sit in the foyer, have a cup of coffee or a Coke and discuss topics important to them. Each one comes in for their own reasons and makes new friends in the process. Sometimes they exchange numbers or make arrangements to meet at another time. At the very least they have found someone to talk to.

The Pride Center Library is popular, probably because it has books that cannot be found at any bookstore around here. People have donated as many non-fiction as fiction. It has grown from 200 books in June when we opened, to now almost a thousand. They are coming in faster than we can process them. And we are aching for more bookcases. It is not unusual to have 30-50 books out at a time. Our video, audio and CD collection is growing, too. The community has been very generous in donating all materials and the volunteers have done a wonderful job of getting it together.

Groups from our community, Fairness, the Imperial Court, the Men's Chorus, Sistah's in the Life, C.O.L.T.S., the Discussion Group and the Gay Straight Alliance, all find a home in the Center. They have been most generous in their financial and moral support of the Center. We, in turn, want them to feel welcome and that the Center is trying to meet their needs. There are nearly 30 different meetings a month at the Center and the groups are very accommodating about sharing the facility when necessary.

I hope that you feel that all these uses of the Pride Center are worthwhile. I do. If the Center can help make even one person's journey more joyful or less difficult, then it is important indeed. The Center needs your financial and volunteer help. Give me a call.


