Even though the students and faculty who use Barker Hall's dance studio have suffered various disruptions during the project, the end result promises a safer fire escape for this longtime fixture on UK's campus.

However, UK administration says that they have done what they can to consider students' interests. "What we will try to do and have done in terms of the next two years is to keep the tuition increase at some reasonable rate in trying to deal with the market place," said Ed Carter, vice president or Monagement and Budget. 51 percent tuition increase is to catch up with designated benchmark" universities, which offer similar size, profile and degrees of study similar to UK. To calculate student tuition. UK officials looked at the tuition of 19 similar universities, such as the University of Michigan and North Carolina State, then set tuition as close to the average tuition as close to the average studies as possible. Carter said. "When you look at that array of institutions you get an array of tuition levels from Florida, which is about \$700 dollars a semester." Carter said. Said Carter Instead, tuition goes into a general fund, similar to a checking account for the University from which UK pays its bills. President Charles Wethington echoed Carter's remarks and said efforts were designed to keep tuition increases at a reasonable level. "I've always been a strong believer in low tuition and trying to keep tuition low for students." Wethington said. "One of the things I think we can do now is try to keep tuition increases."

NEW YORK — South Korean civilian
refugees were killed by the U.S. military in an unwritten chapter of the Korean War, according to
an Associated Press investigation that cites villagers and veterans who witnessed or participated
in the incident in the early days of the war. Many

who died underneath a bridge at No Gun Ri. a
hamlet about 100 miles southeast of the South Korean capital of Seoul. American soldiers, in their
third day at the warfront, believed that North Korean infiltrators were among the refugees. Onceclassified documents show U.S. commanders issued orders to treat civilians as "enemy."

Gore raises \$24 million, trails Bush

WASHINGTON — Vice President Al Gore's presidential campaign reported yesterday that it had raised an estimated \$6.5 million during the last three months, bringing its total to \$24 million since the first of the year. Senior Gore advisers, speaking on condition of anonymity, said the campaign would enter October with between \$9.5 million and \$10 million in the bank. Republican front-runner George W. Bush, governor of Texas, raised another \$1 million this week, bringing his total to more than \$53 million.

Gore challenges Bradley to debate

WASHINGTON — Vice President AI Gore, the front-runner in the campaign for the Democratic presidential nomination, has challenged rival Bill Bradley to debate. Gore and Bradley have several joint appearances scheduled, the first on Oct. 27. But Bradley has yet to accept Gore's offer to debate. Gore is also changing his own political address from Washington to Nashville.

Pay rises for president, Congress

WASHINGTON — President Clinton signed legislation yesterday that will double future presidents' amual salaries to \$400,000 beginning after he leaves office in 2001. House and Senate members' salaries will increase by \$4,600 to \$141,300 a year beginning in January.

Crashes with older drivers rise

WASHINGTON — While overall traffic deaths are declining, the number of older Americans involved in fatal crashes has jumped by a percent over the past decade, according to a new analysis of government data.In 1998, Florida, home to many retirees, had the most drivers aged 70 and above who were involved in accidents with at least one fatality — 474 such drivers, up 41 percent from the 1988 total of 337.

The emotional crowd had belgrade's downtown boulevards, waving their firsts and shouting 'Slobo, you betrayed Kosovo,' against the backdrop of the ruined and charred government buildings destroyed during NATO's bombing campaign.

As the protesters reached ascend police cordon, three water cannos drew up behind the line of officers, apparently intimidating the demonstrators, who were threatening to march some two miles to Milosevic's lush neighborhood of Dedinje.

After a few minutes, police swept into the crowd from the side and beat back the group using batons and sticks, creating panic.
