



Who Loves Ya By Karen Taylor

I'm assuming there are others out there like myself who have pondered the question from time to time, "Is God really ok with my being gay?" This is the first in a series of articles on that topic. I've wanted for some time now to start this dialogue and am looking forward to hearing from many of you.

Let me start by sharing a little about myself. I am 54, divorced, with 2 grown sons, and have been with my life partner, Lisa, for over 5 years now.

I was married to the father of my sons for 24 years. I didn't believe you could be gay and Christian. Plus, marriage was forever. I became a Christian at age 15, and have participated in several churches including Baptist, Methodist, and Assembly of God, as well as non-denominational churches.

Then, through a series of events, I realized my marriage was never meant to be and that there are times when divorce is not only the best thing but the right thing for all people involved. During that time period when I was becoming aware of this, I was attending an "ex-gay ministry" for help and support. Ironically, that is where I met the woman I plan on spending the rest of my life with.

Back to the question, "Is God really ok with my being gay?" Lisa and I struggled with that for about a year before we came to the conclusion that He was. Starting with the next issue, I plan to discuss some of the "key" verses used

I'm Coming Out Lexington Fairness

The moments when you told your family, friends, co-workers or strangers that you were a member of the LGBT community are still vivid in your mind.

You were sitting in a living room, around a kitchen table or standing against a wall.

It was the holidays, a cruel summer, a dark and stormy night or a crisp fall evening.

There was laughter, tears, shock or awkward silence.

They were supportive, confused, empathetic, apathetic, hurt, or glad you finally figured it out.

Sharing these stories with anyone, whether they were happy or sad, can be therapeutic, entertaining and - most importantly - empowering.

Carrying the burden of the secret, you feel as if the weight of the world rests solely on your shoulders. But the first time you tell someone you're gay or transgender, it's freeing. You lose the fear and accept yourself a little more each time the words leave your lips.

But coming out is not just about making yourself feel better. It is part of something bigger. The riots at the Stonewall Inn in New York City were the start of the modern gay rights movement but the LGBT battle for acceptance spans centuries. When a person decides to no longer hide a part of himself from the world, it defies conventional wisdom and takes every LGBT person one step closer to equality.

For a long time, people hated gays because that's what they were taught. Then, they got to know one of us and their attitudes changed. It's probably agreed that the late Harvey Milk said it best:

"I ask my gay sisters and brothers to make the commitment to fight. For themselves, for their freedom, for their country ... We will not win our rights by staying quietly in our closets ... We are coming out to fight the lies, the myths, the distortions. We are coming out to tell the truths about gays, for I am tired of the conspiracy of silence, so I'm going to talk about it. And I want you to talk about it. You must come out. Come out to your parents, your relatives."

It's easier to be who you are in the 21st century because there were millions of men and women who had the courage to stand up for themselves and their rights. In a time when being gay was illegal, one-by-one they left the proverbial closet, challenging the status quo alone and on their terms.

They weren't all like Harvey Milk. Most of them are not the subject of books or documentaries, but all are heroes. Their awe-inspiring strength is the reason our nation is having an open debate about gay marriage, domestic partner benefits, and adoption policies.

The legacy they left behind is the motivation behind National Coming Out Day, which is on October 11th every year. The day calls attention to and creates a public dialogue about - LGBT issues. It also encourages those who are still "in the closet" to take a step outside... and it challenges all of us to stand up and be counted for who we are and not for what others want us to be.

October 11th will no doubt stir up memories of telling people a little something personal about yourself. If you don't have any stories to share, consider this



Terry Mullins Retires

After over sixteen years of service to GLSO, Terry Mullins has retired from our Board of Directors. We are tremendously thankful for his work with GLSO and the community. Terry joined the board in 1993. At that time, we met in the homes of board members. Terry introduced the idea of finding a more public place.

In 1995, Terry suggested sharing space with the Metropolitan Christian Church (MCC). Since he was also on their board, we were able to negotiate a deal and shared space upstairs from where the Pride Center is now located at 389 Waller Ave.

Terry became President of GLSO in 1997. When MCC moved downstairs, the Stonewall Networking Group gave us the money they had collected to open a Pride Center. So, we opened the first Pride Center in the upstairs space.

During his presidency, Terry also started ActOut, which has brought many great productions to our community. When MCC moved at the end of 2000, GLSO took over the downstairs office and constructed the Pride Center we now have. We hired our first employee, Ginger Moore-Minder. Terry stepped down from the Presidency in 2003.

Terry has worked for the GLBT community in other capacities. He started with Moveable Feast in Aug., 1998. That was two months before they served their first meals on Oct 3rd 1998. Terry became Executive Director of Moveable Feast in 2003. In those 11 years, they prepared and delivered over 250,000 meals and 90,000 grocery bags.

Terry served as president of the Tri-State Gay Rodeo Assoc., both the local chapter and the three state organizations, as Vice Moderator of the MCC board, Vice President of Ebony Male, Chaired the Pride Committee for several years, and sat on the state Community Planning Group for AIDS Prevention for a number of years.

Terry won the Wasson Award in 1998, a community award given at the GLSO Awards Banquet. He also was awarded the James Herndon Lifetime Achievement Award from the Imperial Court of KY in 2006. This year he was given the Jennifer Crossen Out for Fairness Award, at the Fairness Awards Banquet.

We would say that we are going to miss him but with this record, it is clear that he will be working within the community for years to come. THANK YOU TERRY!

Shambhala Vision, Meditation and Community in Lexington

The vision of Shambhala begins with the understanding that all humans at the very ground of their being have basic goodness and wisdom. This vision, along with meditation practice and community, began to form in Lexington in the early seventies when a small group of five people begin meeting to practice meditation and to study the buddhist teachings that had only very recently been introduced into the United States.

The Shambhala teachings were America by Chogyam brought Trungpa Rinpoche, who had been trained as a leader and a teacher in his native Tibet until the time the Chinese invaded that country and some fortunate few escaped to India. He first studied at Oxford, in England, started a monastery in Scotland, and then married a young English woman before moving to America. When he started teaching in Vermont at Tail of the Tiger, he attracted a group of shaggy hippies who were interested in learning about Buddhism and meditation.

From that humble beginning, Shambhala has grown and now introduces programs in more than 170 centers around the world, welcoming anyone who is interested in learning how to meditate. These trainings are free of charge and people have free access to fully trained meditation instructors.

Meditation is a natural state of the human mind - at rest, open, and alert. The basic technique predates all religious traditions though used by each of them in one way or another. Meditation encourages our inherent qualities of stability, clarity, and mental strength to emerge. There is increasing evidence from research in a wide range of scientific methods of the advantages and health benefits of practicing meditation. Many introductory programs are offered in addition to basic training in meditation in different regions of the world and different nationalities, to different religions and spiritual traditions, cultures, languages, ethnicities and races, as well as different ages, genders, sexual orientations, and differing physical, perceptual, and mental abilities. As much as Shambhala values diversity, what we all share is a desire to lead sane, dignified, confident lives. As a community, we are not perfect but it is the stated intention - and policy - to welcome everyone who enters. Of specific interest to readers of this newsletter is an international program called Queer Dharma which provides a safe place for our LGBTQ community to gather, listen, discuss, and encourage study, meditation and spiritual growth. www..queerdharma.org

Study of Transsexuality Looking for Participants

Stephanie Budge, a doctoral student at the Univ. of Wisconsin-Madison, is working on a research project to study the psychological process of transitioning for transgender-identified people (e.g., MTF transsexuals, FTM transsexuals, gender queer/gender variant, etc.).

The study consists of an online survey and will take approximately 20-30 minutes to complete. To qualify for the study, participants need to identify as transgender, be 18 or older, and live in the US. This study has been approved by the University of Wisconsin-Madison IRB #SE-2009-0403.

A Census policy has changed. In the past, if a LGBT person marked that they were married to a same sex partner, their answer was actually changed by census workers. There is no question that asks for our sexual orientation, just our relationship to the person or people we live with. This time, however we choose to identify our relationship, our answers will remain as written.

The census worker I spoke to at the Roots and Heritage Festival told me that President Obama made this policy change. We are being given the opportunity to be officially counted. I realize that many LGBT people may not feel safe to mark their forms in a way that indicates a same sex partnership. But I hope that many of us will take this opportunity to be counted.

The census has been one of the issues brought up by right wing radio and TV "personalities" as they talk about our government becoming socialist and increasingly invasive in our lives. It will be interesting to see if the fact that same sex partners will be counted as couples will become part of the right wing talking points.

A U.S. Census worker was found dead in Clay County with the word "fed" on his chest. No charges have been filed. People are fearful and angry.

I do not want GLBT people to become more fearful in response to such violence or to the negative and hateful comments that we hear too frequently. In fact, I want us to be less fearful, to be as out as we can be, to dispel fear in our families, communities, and work places.

GLSO will invite a Census educator to the Pride Center before the April census date. Having accurate information can help us make our individual decisions about how to identify ourselves on the census.


