Soviet teacher finds new home at UK

Raymond Krishchyunas is a man without a country, so to speak. Born in Soviet Georgia, but technically a Lithuanian, he attended college in Moscow and spent 15 years teaching in Georgia.

But Krishchyunas claims he is a citizen of the Soviet Union, although it now exists only as a part of history.

While the Western world cheers the breakup of the Soviet Union, the laments the loss of stability and sees his country headed ominously in the same direction in which it was going in autumn of 1917.

Krishchyunas, who left the Soviet Union two weeks before the aborted coup against Mikhail Gorbachev, now teaches geography at UK, But his thoughts often return to his country.

It is a country that is unprepared

to his country.

It is a country that is unprepared for the transition to capitalism, a process that is doomed to fail, he said.

said: "The cultural and psychological obstacles are just as important, if no obstacles are just as important, if no more important, than the physical obstacles," he said.

The people living in the former Soviet states lack many of the tools to make the capitalistic economy un, Krischcymas said, including a lack of innovators, who were sup-

pressed under the rule of Joseph Stalin.
"There are no entrepreneurs," he said. "Where do you get them?"
When Gorbachev made it easier to travel outside of the country, many intellectuals, like Krish-thyunas, hit he road. In a sense; it was a Soviet "brain drain."
Krishchyunas also faults the leaders of the new states, many of whom, like Russian president Bornist" in his judgment. Such leaders are unwilling to discuss needer feoforms like taxes, he said.
"They have been taking reform for five years, Krishchyunas said."



A 1983 graduate of Berea Col-lege, Seavers helped create the Ber-ea College Students United Against Apartheid.
In 1985, Seavers co-founded the Bishop Tutu Refugee Fund, a non-

profit agency dedicated to helping South African refugees and other victims of apartheid.

As project director for the refugee fund, he traveled extensively throughout southern Africa gaining firsthand knowledge on the region's refugee crisis and South Africa's anti-apartheid movement.

Seavers currently lives and works in Kentucky. He is working on a second book about the Pan Africanist Congress in an effort to broaden knowledge and understanding of the group, as it is till relatively unknown by the general public in the United States.

Voice-mail computer source for student loans

"We build bridges for students to cross" is one of the philosophies of Future Communications Network, a voice-mail computer service getting students in touch with possible money sources to help pay for coilege. Unlike other money sources such as UK and the Army, which also claim they will turn no one away, the Student Capital Endowment Fund will provide any student, regardless of their financial situation, with at least six money sources that require no repayment.

"There are literally millions of dollars in untapped resources," said Connie Godfrey, a computer specialist who networks with data banks across the country.
However, students must pay a 540 to \$75 fee to get a list of available funds and contact those sources themselves.

available funds and contact those sources themselves.
Unlike other fund groups, the FC Network guarantees the student will receive a \$200 savings bond, if the sources refuse to give the student funding.
Students with specific areas of study in mind are likely to receive more sources, and often get chances to work within the company that is providing the

money.

Rhonda McElhaney, a student from Georgia, received more money than she thought possible. McElhaney, whose father is in the Air Force, was awarded a \$1500 grant by the Air Force with no military service requirement.

The FC Network provides many other services through voice-mail software, including personal Valentine's Day messages delivered in the sender's voice. The message can be sent across the country at any time of the day and will reach the desired recipient, no matter how many phone calls it takes.

Imagine the reaction of your girlfriend or boyfriend if you walk in the door, rose in hand, as the phone rings, carrying a message in your own voice.

The FC Network also files insurance claims for a speedier, electronic refund.





Another myth propagated by Wilkinson is that some or many full professors do not regularly teach undergraduates. Rank may have privilege, but at this University the highest-ranked faculty in virtually all departments and colleges retain responsibility for teaching in the undergraduate classroom, as well as the graduate seminar. Personally, I know of no full professor who is not involved in teaching one or more undergraduate courses each semester or year.

As for the issue of teaching loads, any discerning student of today's colleges and universities knows that the amount of contact hours in the classroom by faculty is a poor measure of our actual work. Course preparation, new course development, lecture preparation, departmental college and university commental college and university com-

mittee and administrative responsi-bilities, as well as supervision of undergraduate papers, graduate the-ses, and student projects do more than fill up our daily and weekly schedules. No doubt, we are fortu-nate in being able to shape our work schedules as many others are not. But, as our families will tell everyone, most of us put in long hours distributed over the entire seven-day week. It is precisely be-cause Wilkinson is so distant from cademic life that he narrows his sights on course load and contact hours as targets for criticism.

Obviously, there is a basis for discussion and debate over future directions in the restructuring of this University. Few of us believe the '90s will permit academics as usual. Indeed, some of the most important issues facing the University of Kentucky — the 'bricks and mortar' priorities in the budget of this University, the lack of any real collective faculty clout in higher level budget and policy decision-making, the swelling of administration to respond to "bread-and-tive ranks via-wis stagnarts student enrollment and declining faculty outer." Issues like the erosion of faculty salaries within and between ranks by a variety of factors—have yet to be raised in this debate.

But myths like those span by Cit-

But myths like those spun by Cit-izen Wilkinson will do little to ad-vance the dialogue about making UK a better, stronger, and national-ly more competitive and recognized institution, its faculty a more inteinstitution, its faculty a more inte-gral element in shaping the policies of this University and its student body better clourated and more pre-pared for the challenges of the dawning millennium. They just keep us mired in the old politics of anti-politicians like Wilkinson who cannot distinguish their own self-interest from the larger interests of the Commonwealth and succeeding generations of students who will pass through the classrooms of this flagship institution. On the other hand, maybe Wil-

Itagship institution.
On the other hand, maybe Wilkinson's latest egoistic grab for power and Peffley's confrontation will have one salutary effect: Perhaps they will convince more faculty that it is time to raise more hell and write fewer articles!

Lawyers join Ford in quest for JFK files

WASHINGTON — A dozen law-yers from the Warren Commission joined former President Ford yester-day in calling for disclosure of CIA files and all other government records on the assassination of John F. Kennedy.

The lawyers, plus a former commission staff member, urged "the broadest possible accessibility" in evidence in the probe of Kennedy's death, which has been the focus of renewed attention since the release in December of the movie "IFK." The film suggests that elements of the government, particularly the Pentagon and the CIA, conspired to murder the president.

"I would like to devul to our critics that we are part and parcel of some kind of coverup," said former

Ingion.

Ford made a similar request in a letter last week to Rep. Louis Stokes (D-Ohio) who headed the House Assassinations Committee in the late 1970s. Ford's letter also went to House Speaker Thomas Foley (D-Wash).
