Few manage to get Final Four tickets after wait

A cooler full of snacks

And a UK cap with a furry wild-

cat on it.

That's all Lexington resident
David Richardson needed to survive the 36-hour wait for NCAA
Final Four tickets, which went on
sale to the public yesterday mornine.

He was a lucky one.
Hundreds of Wildcat fans were turned away yesterday morning after the Memorial Coliseum ticket office distributed the last of 200 Final Four ticket sets. Some, like Richardson, arrived at the ticket office doors during the weekend to ensure a place at the front of the line.

"I'm just a good Kentucky fan," ichardson said Monday.

Other loyal blue bloods, however, were denied an opportunity to buy tickets, even though they had reserved a place in line. To make the hoard of Wildcat fans more manageable, the UK Police issued numbered control cards Monday to

those gathered outside the Coli-seum. The cards supposedly would guarantee each person a spot in line for yesterday's 9 a.m. public distri-

for yesterday's 9 a.m. public distribution.

The only problem was that there were more cards handed out than ticket sets available.

Barbara Donnelly, ticket office manager at Memorial Coliseum, asid 200 ticket to Saturday's semifinal games and a ticket to Monday's championship.

Adding to the confusion, some control card holders who had numbers below 200 also were denied a chance to buy tickets.

Connie Dale and her nephew, Shawn Ray, both of Lawrenceburg, Ky., came to campus Sunday to wait in line for yesterday's distribution. Ray got control card 96. But by the time he got to the ticket window, he was told that all tickets had been sold, Dale said.

"It's just not right," she said mitus after confronting Donnelly about the mix-up. "If they cannot get it controlled and do it right, then they ought not sell them at all.

They came, and they waited. But half of the UK students who attended Monday's Flant Four ticket lottery left empty-handed.
Yesterday, upon bearing that a total of 700 tickets had been distributed as of that morning, students begain to wonder why more tickets weren't reserved for them.

SGA VP candidates speak at forum Voting places and times

On election eve last night, the Student Government Association presidential tickets got one last chance to get their message out dur-ing a vice-presidential forum held in the Kirwan-Blanding Complex Commons

The four candidates answered student questions in a debate format and answered a wide range of questions, most of them relating to the senate and how they will handle the responsibilities of chairing the SGA Senate.

Other students felt that the candidates focused enough on the issues to give students an idea of what they will do in SGA.

"I feel like they answered the questions to the best of their ability,

All the vice presidential candidates had given specifics in their platforms about senate relations, and they reinforced their plans throughout the debate.

Michael Eaves, who is Scott Ma-son's running mate, said he would try to coordinate meetings with the new senate before members leave for the summer, so they could know each other a little better before sessions convene in the fall.

Ellen Hamilton, Jeremy Bates' running mate, said she and Bates will work together with the senate to "create a more positive image" and would have each senator write Kirwan Tower Residence Hall Government,

Amber Leigh, who is running with Lance Dowdy, said the Dow-dy/Leigh administration would use "positive reinforcement" to help make sure that the senators live up to their obligation to represent students.

The current policy on purging members of the senate is not the most effective way of making sure senators do their job, vice presidential candidate Andrew Shveda said. He is running with T.A. Jones.

He said that students should be allowed to sign petitions to have certain senators purged if they are not representing the students.

For 16 years, the ban, which originated in Congress, has been written into the budget. It bars federally paid Medicaid abortions except when there is a threat to the woman's life.

"It simply goes too far," Stephan-opoulos said of the so-called Hyde amendment, named for its sponsor, Rep. Henry Hyde, R-III. "... The President believes that this is the right thing to do, ... and that's why

women.

"The issue here is fairness and equity," said NARAL President Kate Michelman. "It's one of ensuring that we do not have a two-tiered health care system — one for poor, low-income women and one for those of us with means."

According to NARAL, 9 percent of women of reproductive age get their medical care though Medicaid.

aid. Douglas Johnson, legislative di-rector for the National Right to Life Committee, predicted that dropping the ban would require taxpayers to pay for hundreds of thousands of elective abortions each year.

The government paid for 300,000 elective Medicaid abortions a year before the ban was adopted, Johnson said, and 13 states now voluntarily pick up the tab for poor women.





Film hears no evil, no applause

Alfred Hitchcock must be spin-ning in his casket by now. The lat-est trend in Hollywood is the "schlock thriller," which claims the Master of Suspense as its origin. But, there is nothing Hitchcockian in this latest batch of low-budget

But, there is nouning frittencockain in this latest batch of low-budget snoozers.

Recent so-called thrillers like "The Temp" and Madonna's unintentionally funny "Body of Evidence" have set record time for disappearing from local betaers. "Hear No Evil" is no doubt destined to join them in that great video store in the sky.

The story opens with a wise-cracking reporter's investigation of a museum break-in. He begs his buddy, played by D. B. Sweeney ("Cutting Edge"), to lend him his car so he can interview the thief. How he tracked down the culprit is never addressed.

The next thing we know, the robber is singing like a bird. He tells he reporter that police Lieutenant Brock, played by acting great Martin Sheen, hired him to commit the crime. Inexplicably, he hands over the coin to the reporter and runs away.

Continuing the films illogical progression, we are then introduced to the reporter's personal trainer. As Jillian, Academy Award-winner Marlee Matlin ("Children of a Lesser God") looks unconfortable. She seems unsure of whether she's la thillian Academy Award-winner Marlee Matlin ("Children of a lessers God") looks unconfortable.

Lesser God") looks uncomfortable. She seems unsure of whether she's in a thriller or a romantic comedy. The result is the most uneven performance of her career.

D. B. Sweeney fares a little better. His casual style of acting serves him well as the likable love interest. The situations in which he

finds himself are completely unbe-lievable, but Sweeney doesn't seem to care. He looks like he's just hav-ing a good time.

Martin Sheen, however, has fal-len from great heights. Having achieved critical acclaim and per-manent cult status through films like "Apocalypse Now," "Catch 22" and "The Dead Zone," one wonders what could have possessed him to get involved in a movie this bad.
