the money & property real & personal I may die possessed of  
to be appropriated as far as it will go, the purchase and  
emancipation of my children Elizabeth, Elenor, Thomas,  
and Richard now the property of Mr. John True of  
Levington, and should it be insufficient to purchase

commencing with the eldest.

Fourth. Whatever property remains after the purchase and  
emancipation of my said children, I desire to be equally  
divided among my said children or such of them as  
may be so emancipated. But if it be impossible to carry  
into effect my will in regard to my children, then  
my Executor shall have the use and benefit of  
my estate, injoining upon him to use all proper effort  
to carry it into effect.

Fifth. It is my desire that my place in Dayton shall  
be reserved as a home for my children when emancipated  
until it becomes absolutely necessary to sell it for the  
purpose of their emancipation.

Sixth. I desire that my slave Julian be free on  
her paying me or my Executor three hundred dollars  
and should she pay said sum or any part of it  
to me in my lifetime, I will leave a memorandum

of such payment among my papers or on this will, which shall be sufficient evidence of the fact. It is also my desire that my slaves Cannon and Mary Eliza be free, at the respective ages of twenty five years for Cannon, and twenty for Mary Eliza.

Seventh. Reposing especial confidence in the integrity of my friend Samuel Oldham, I do hereby appoint him my sole Executor, without giving any security required by law. And should my said Executor be at any time in difficulty as to the proper manner of executing this my will, I do hereby authorize him to apply for written advice to some learned counsellor at Law in Lexington, and do authorize him to be governed by such advice.

Eighth. I desire my Executor as soon after my death as may be, to make a true & perfect inventory of my whole estate real and personal, and return the same to Court.

and Testament.

First. It is my will that all my just debts be paid.  
Second. That all my debts be collected, of them owing me  
of which a list will be left among my papers.

Third. I desire to my Executor hereafter to be named, all  
the money & property real & personal I may die possessed of  
to be appropriated as far as it will go, the purchase and  
emancipation of my children Elizabeth, Elenor, Thomas,  
and Richard now the property of Mr. John True of  
Levington, and should it be insufficient to purchase  
& emancipate all of them, then as many as can be  
commencing with the eldest.

Fourth. Whatever property remains after the purchase and  
emancipation of my said children, I desire to be equally  
divided among my said children or such of them as  
may be so emancipated. But if it be impossible to carry  
into effect my will in regard to my children, then  
my Executor shall have the use and benefit of  
my estate, injoining upon him to use all proper effort  
to carry it into effect.

Fifth. It is my desire that my place in Dayton shall  
be reserved as a home for my children when emancipated  
until it becomes absolutely necessary to sell it for the  
purpose of their emancipation.

Sixth. I desire that my slave Julian be free on  
her paying me or my Executor three hundred dollars  
and should she pay said sum or any part of it  
to me in my lifetime, I will leave a memorandum

of such payment among my papers or on this will, which shall be sufficient evidence of the fact. It is also my desire that my slaves Cannon and Mary Eliza be free, at the respective ages of twenty five years for Cannon, and twenty for Mary Eliza.

Seventh. Reposing especial confidence in the integrity of my friend Samuel Oldham, I do hereby appoint him my sole Executor, without giving any security required by law. And should my said Executor be at any time in difficulty as to the proper manner of executing this my will, I do hereby authorize him to apply for written advice to some learned counsellor at Law in Lexington, and do authorize him to be governed by such advice.

Eighth. I desire my Executor as soon after my death as may be, to make a true & perfect inventory of my whole estate real and personal, and return the same to Court.
