Get The Facts. Think Them Through

Guest Editorial
Forty-nine percent of the University's students oppose compulsory ROTC training, but they are doing nothing about making it optional. Periodically, the more vociferous opponens pen vitrolic philippics to the student paper. Then the die-hard supporters of the present program answer with equally passionate and equally unconvincing cessays. Argument flourishes for a week or so and then dies to be exhumed months later when the cycle starts over. Name-calling and souls-carching are not.

Name-calling and soul-searching are not the solution to a problem which demands sound reasoning backed by factual evidence.

At the University of California, as Oswald Garrison Villard points out in last week's Na-tion, the Associated Students peace committee has prepared a comprehensive report on military training there.

A brief summary of the 71-page report gives an idea of its scope and nature:

(1) No federal legislation requires ROTC

(1) No federal legislation requires ROTC enrollment.

(2) The University of California would suffer no financial loss by making drill voluntary.

(3) The California Board of Regents (roughly analogous to the Board of Trustees here) has the power to make ROTC voluntary.

(4) Compulsory military training has little or no value as physical education.

(5) It does not provide good citizenship training or create good citizens.

(6) It does not develop character.

(7) The ROTC develops a mind which accepts war as "inevitable."

(8) Compulsory training is of little value for national defense. For example:

Basic ROTC students are not potential Reserve Officers and would not be commissioned in wartime.

Turning out Reserve Officers is less expensive

Turning out Reserve Officers is less expensive under the voluntary plan. Training given in the two-year basic course could be given in one week of intensive training. These contentions are developed with quotations from War Department officials and educational authorities and other indisputable evi-

dence.

Advocates of voluntary ROTC will have to work along the lines of the California peace committee and forget the senseless sound and fury. A point by point study of the report to discover how closely the situation here parallels that at California might serve as a springboard for positive action.—George T. Lamason.


