

ights, cameras, action! Well, forget the lights, but the University of Kentucky welcomes Turner Broadcasting System to Commonwealth Stadium for this afternoon's Southeastern

Conference matchup between the Wildcats and the LSU Tigers.

Turner Broadcasting has been televising Southeastern Conference football for the past eight years, live via national cable. The superstation reaches approximately 57.5 million homes and is contracted to air 12 games involving league teams during the 1991 season.

Bob Neal and Tim Foley will again call the action for TBS Sports with Rohan Backfisch as the producer. Neal, the recipient of numerous awards, is in his eighth season as the play-by-play voice of SEC football. Foley, who was a member of the Miami Dolphins from 1970 to 1980, is also in his eighth season as color analyst. Backfisch, who replaced Skip Ellison last year, is in his second year as producer.

With the ever-changing face of intercollegiate football, the SEC and TBS Sports are in their last year of the current contract. Negotiations are still underway about the future of SEC football on TBS, but the

final decision will likely not be made until the spring.

During the pregame segment of today's game, Kentucky coach Bill Curry will present plaques to both Neal and Foley on behalf of the SEC Football Coaches. The plaques read, "The SEC Football Coaches" commend Bob Neal and Tim Foley for excellence in broadcasting SEC Football."

(For the record, Kentucky is 2-6 on TBS) in games played at Lexington. Several of those games are memorable for various rea-

Looking back to 1984 when the Wildcats posted a 9-3 record, an illegal procedure penalty wiped out a potential tying touchdown in 25-17 loss to Florida at Commonwealth Stadium before the TBS cameras. The penalty gave Florida's Galen Hall an on-the-field league title, though the Gators were stripped of the crown due to NCAA sanctions.

In 1986, tailback Ivy Joe Hunter rushed for a modern-day school record 238 yards as the Wildcats turned back Vanderbilt by a score of 34-22 on TBS. Hunter carried the pigskin 30 times and scored four touchdowns. His most productive quarter was the fourth, when he churned for 88 yards on 12 carries.

TBS came to Lexington twice in 1988 and captured a pair of heartstopping decisions. It was Bill Curry's first visit to Commonwealth but as head coach of the Alabama Crimson Tide. His Alabama squad rallied from a 20-7 deficit to win, 31-27, on a short pass play with 10 seconds left. But a couple of weeks later, Kentucky turned the trick on 11th-ranked Georgia as tailback Alfred Rawls rushed for 128 yards in the Wildcats' 16-10 upset victory.

The University of Kentucky will pay special tribute to the 1952 Cotton Bowl champion team, with defeated Texas Christian, 20-7, at Dallas. Under the direction of Paul Bryant, the Wildcats finished the season with an 8-4 record and recorded four shutouts.

Captains of the 1951 squad were quarterback Babe Parilli and lineman Doug Moseley. Parilli finished the season with 1,643 yards passing and 19 touchdowns.

As usual on game days at Commonwealth, the UK Marching Band will perform in both the pregame and halftime segments. The UK Marching Band, under the direction of Tom Brawner and Brad Ethington, will present the traditional Kentucky Fite, the spelling of C-A-T-S, and "My Old Kentucky Home" before the game. Also look for an "Armed Forces Medley" in the pregame segments.


At halftime, the UK Marching Band will present a salute to the 1952 Cotton Bowl team with its all-jazz tribute. "Birdland" and a Big Band Medley consisting of tunes such as "Boogie Woogie Bugle Boy," "Pennsylvania 6-5000," "Moonlight Serenade" and "Take the A-Train" will make up the halftime show.

After a major confidence builder, LSU takes on UK in the Wildcats' den

Against Ole Miss, Jones strode in during the first quarter amid a chorus of cheers, and slew-footed his way to 77 yards rushing and 152 yards passing, most of it in spectacular fashion under hot pursuit.

He followed with a solid first collegiate start last week at Mississippi State, gunning for 196 yards on 16 of 30 pass attempts, and scrambling for 20 yards despite being sacked four times.



Or how about the defensive heroics of Brad Armstead, whose twin interceptions against Ole Miss helped keep Kentucky alive. Or the slobber-knocking, fumble-jarring hits by nose guard Joey Couch.

Until LSU's 70-14 undressing of a struggling Arkansas State team a week ago, the most excitement in Baton Rouge occurred in the film room and on the practice field, where first-year coach Curley Hallman and staff spent countless hours assessing the play of LSU's here-todaygone-tomorrow lineups. In the second stanza quarterback Brad Smith drove Kentucky to within 24-20 on an 80-yard scoring drive. But it wasn't enough as LSU hit two field goals to finish the game ahead 30-20.

shown more faces than a contortionist; today's starting corps barely resembles the one that took the field in the season's first game at Georgia. The shuffle is a natural step in the growth of a first-year coach and his recently struggling team.

Last week's performance may have been a breakthrough for the groping Tigers. Tailback Vincent Fuller and the LSU front forces finally jumpstarted a previously anemic rushing game; Fuller barrelled for two touchdowns on the ground and another via a pass from onagain quarterback Chad Loup.

Loup has shared time at QB with Jesse

Daigle, who has started four of six games this year. No matter who calls the signals, LSU is still a long way from returning to its great flying circuses of the late '80s.

While the LSU offense showed a whisper of life last week, its defense is still struggling. Even with the lopsided win, the Tigers are still giving up an average of 220 yards rushing and 191 yards passing per



n the Kentucky football media guide and game program, Greg Lahr is listed as an offensive right tackle. First string. Six-five, 290 pounds. Senior.

Actually, he's that — and more. A lot more.

Football player. Offensive team captain. Academic All-SEC. UK Leadership Committee member. UK Student Advisory Committee member. Finance major. High school champion wrestler. Potential bungee cord jumper.

Huh?

Yep, that's right. Bungee cord jumping. As in, free fall hundreds of feet to the earth, stop in mid-flight courtesy of gravity and a King Kong-sized rubber band, then bounce up and down until coming to a complete and dizzying stop.

Not an ordinary activity for anybody. Especially for somebody the size of Lahr.

Of course, the key word here is potential. "I'd like to try bungee jumping sometime, if there's a rope big enough to hold someone my size," said Lahr. "Along those

experience. For Lahr, all the diversions he has away from football have been a good escape and supplement to his life as a major-college football player.

"I realize that in a few weeks it'll be my last college football game," he said. "It seems like I just got here a little while ago. Some of the practices seem like they've lasted a long time, but...

"I've been very pleased with my career so far," he admitted. "I know there's no single game in my career where I played perfectly. But I've made a lot of good friends here. The one thing I really want to do is go to a bowl game."

For Lahr and his Wildcat teammates, that elusive goal is one that's still within reach

"Our ultimate goal, as always, is to win the SEC. We didn't start the conference season very well (with the home loss to Ole Miss), but we have the rest of the season to get it together."

A couple of Lahr's outside interests involve support services with the UK football team and athletic department.

Lahr was elected by his teammates as the permanent 1991 Kentucky offensive team captain. Being a captain is praise in itself. But being elected by your teammates makes it a little sweeter.

"Any award a person can receive that's voted on by the team is the most important. It means you earned it," Lahr said. "I try to lead by example, by encouraging people in practice and by doing what the coaches expect of me."

Lahr's rapport with the coaching staff also landed him a spot on the UK Leadership Committee, which is a panel chosen by the players to have other players act as liaisons with head coach Bill Curry. He's also a member of the Student Advisory Committee.

"We're a group of student-athletes who have regular meetings and report to C.M. Newton and discuss athletics legislation," said Lahr. "We talk about the other teams on campus and find out what's going on with them. It also gives us a chance to meet with (UK associate directors of athletics) Larry Ivy and Gene DeFilippo."

Being on both committees has given Lahr a chance to see things differently.

"As athletes, we're not really mixed in with the regular student body," he said. "That will change due to the NCAA's recent legislation. But I know a lot of people from my classes and from the Student Advisory Committee. It's a lot of fun to be around the other athletes from the different sports.'

The adjustment Lahr has made in dealing with the legislative aspects of UK athletics is symbolic of certain areas in his

During his UK career, Lahr has been faced with the coaching change from Jerry Claiborne to Bill Curry, the switch from offensive left tackle to right tackle

and, to a lesser extent, the quarterback shuffling from Freddie Maggard to Brad Smith to Pookie

"Switching from left tackle to right tackle is a little different, but not a whole lot,' said Lahr, who moved from left tackle before this season began. "Basically, you take what you learned and you just reverse every-

"I played right tackle two years ago, so I've got two years' experience. It is a switch, but not that much of one."

And now that the Curry era is in year two, Lahr said he thinks the team has adapted to the transforma-

"We've all adjusted pretty well to the new staff," said Lahr.

> One adjustment that

> > hasn't been as big a factor in Lahr's life as a Wildcat is the quarterback position.

> > "Blocking for different quarterbacks is not really a huge change," admitted Lahr. "You basically block the same way, no matter who is in there. Pookie runs a little more than the others. But until he starts to run, you don't always know what he's going to do.'

Regarded as one of the SEC's best blockers, Lahr relies on his experience as a high school champion wrestler to live up to that billing. He was the Ohio Capital Conference heavyweight champion for three-consecutive years at Pickerington (Ohio) High School.

"Wrestling helps you work hard and do the necessary footwork to be a good lineman," said Lahr. "We did a lot of long distance running and that makes you work hard. The footwork in wrestling is a lot like the

A Renaissance man, Lahr has taken on extra duties on and off the field.

footwork in pass blocking.


"I like run blocking better than pass blocking," he said. "In run blocking you can hit someone and I especially like blocking the linebackers because they don't see you coming.'

What Lahr has seen is a wide scope of activities during his college days.

And he wouldn't want it any other way.

"I realized that when it came time to go to college, even though I grew up as an Ohio State fan, I was going to school for a reason and not going to school just because I rooted for the team. And Kentucky has been great to me.'







Frog Gigging In '52

The 1951 Wildcats wrestled the Cotton Bowl from the TCU Horned Frog

t's no coincidence that the years Babe Parilli directed the Kentucky attack were also the years UK football bandied about the pinnacle of the college game. The man who, according to

one of the day's pundits, could "take an elephant out on the field and, told that it was a football, hide it," was the head zookeeper of Kentucky's big game ward for a brilliant three-year span in the late 1940s and 1950s.

Parilli's 1951 team, celebrating its 40thyear reunion, will be honored prior to the kickoff of today's game.

That great squad's navigator was a quarterback without peer. The swashbuckling Parilli astounded fans and foes alike during his final season, earning consensus All-American honors and finishing third in Heisman Trophy balloting. Even Bear Bryant, then coach of the Wildcats, joined the chorus that warbled Parilli's praise. "While I do not like to emphasize the performance of individual players," Bryant admitted at the time, "I must say that Parilli is the greatest T-quarterback ever to put on a pair of football shoes, and that includes the pros.'

Strong praise from Bryant — they didn't call him "The Bear" for his warm compliments.

But the Wildcat mentor slipped twice, openly professing his affection for the 1951 team. That squad, minus most of the guns that quieted the No. 1 Oklahoma Sooners in the '51 Sugar Bowl, opened the ensuing fall to a painful 1-3 ledger, with consecutive losses to Texas, Ole Miss and Georgia Tech. Bryant's charges tumbled from a Sugar Bowl high to a vinegar jar low.

'We were criticized some by fans and others after that third whipping in a row," Parilli said. "But Bryant, on his television show the next day, said: 'It's my team now. Before, when we were winning, it was everybody else's team. Well, now it's my team, and I'm proud to have it.' "


The Cats gave him ample cause for pride from that day forward. The wins mounted weekly, including a 32-0 skunking of previously undefeated Miami. The Hurricanes blew into Lexington on a cold November afternoon and were met by icy winds and fiery Wildcats. Three Parilli touchdown strikes did the trick, as well as a snow plow of a defense that pushed Miami around like light powder, allowing the visitors a meager 15 yards passing and seven rushing.

"The Wildcat gridders turned Miami's Hurricanes into a gentle breeze," wrote the Lexington Herald-Leader's Ed Ashford.

Kentucky was lethal on offense, with Parilli, fullback Tom Fillion, explosive wideout Emery Clark, bulldozing Steve "Horse" Meilinger and spindly back Bill Leskovar rumbling for 314 points over the course of the season. More telling, however, may be the low 121 total points that Kentucky surrendered, despite losing four games. Ray Correll, Jim MacKenzie, Doug Moseley and Tommy Adkins were the big wheels in UK's wrecking machine; Parilli was the prime benefactor.

Sure enough, in the 1952 Cotton Bowl, the third straight New Year's Day classic the Wildcats attended, it was the spectacular play of Correll, a heretofore unknown member of Kentucky's stable of future immortals, and the rest of UK's potent defense that drove visions of Cotton Bowls out of TCU heads. Correll would later be voted to the All-Time Cotton Bowl team for his heroics in turning back persistent Texas Christian thrusts.

The attacks began immediately. The Horned Frogs took the opening kickoff and promptly marched to the Kentucky four-yard line. But the Wildcat defense mended its early game openings and held the goal line, the first of three such stands inside the five-yard line.



Meanwhile, Kentucky scored a touchdown in each of the first two quarters. Parilli's connections with Meilinger

buckling Babe Parilli drove the Kentucky attack in '51.


and Harry Jones' bursts from the backfield set up two Parilli-to-Clark paydirt parcels. The Cats led, 13-0, at the half.

The Horned Frogs struck back in the third quarter, tallying a touchdown on a 43-yard sweep. But the Kentucky defense held again, thwarting drive after drive before the offense could put an insurance touchdown on board late in the game. The Wildcats were the Cotton Bowl victors, celebrating a 20-7 victory and a bad season turned good.

"I don't think we had a great team, but I think it was one that was loaded with courage, desire to play the game as well as it could, and competitiveness," Parilli said.

"All this, I've been told, is part of good character, and Bryant certainly did a lot to instill that in us."

ay back in November of last season when Curley Hallman was anointed as LSU's 28th head coach, Baton Rouge rippled with optimism.

The Tigers had hired a young, capable head coach with a trail of victories dragging behind him. Someone who could reverse the losing trend of the past two seasons, LSU's first back-to-back losing years since 1956, and make the Tigers a winner. LSU had further reason for optimism, because all 11 starters on defense and nine on offense were back in Tiger uniforms. All signs were pointed toward respectability for the men of Tiger Town. Right? Wrong.

Unfortunately, while the Tigers do possess a wealth of returning starters, youth still dominates the lineup, and because of it, the Tigers and Hallman have been chasing their own tail all year. The offense has put up numbers only a Major League Baseball team would love, and the defense has bent and broke far too often.

OFFENSE


Problems on the offensive side of the ball have stemmed heavily from the quarterback slot. Hallman has been forced to introduce his own version of the "Curley Shuffle," changing quarterbacks as easily as chameleon changes colors. At the moment, Jesse Daigle is the Tigers' signal caller, but Chad Loup and Brad Strohm have also seen sufficient time behind center.

pounded by its failure to move the ball on the ground. The Tigers on the run appear more like housecats, averaging less than three yards per carry and well under 100 yards per game as a team. Converted defensive back Vincent Fuller is the team's most reliable ball carrier.

DEFENSE

The Tigers' defense against the run has been far from stellar, allowing well over 200 yards per game rushing and also withstanding more than 400 yards per game in total offense.

The strength of the defensive unit lies in the secondary as it did last year when the LSU defensive backfield led the SEC in pass defense.

Strong safety Derriel McCorvey, a second-team All-SEC performer last season, and sophomore free safety Anthon Marshall, the team's leading tackler in 1990, give the D-backs strength in the middle. The corners are manned by pair of seasoned veterans, senior Wayne Williams and Corey Raymond

Junior Reggie Williams roams the interior of the Tigers' defense as the strong side 'backer and is among the team's leading tacklers. After a year a tight end, sophomore Ricardo Washington will return to his roots by occupying the other inside linebacker spot. Washington was a district defensive MVP while in high school. A pair of sophomores — Roovelroe Swan and Mike Hewitt — flank Washington and Williams on the outside.

Senior Marc Boutte (6-4,260), two-time All-SEC selection, is the cornerstone of the defensive front at left tackle, and he has to be because both of his two partners on the line are experiencing their first year of Division I football

Noseguard William Crowell is a freshman and left tackle Bryan Madden is a junior college transfer.

The Tigers' kicking game may be the team's greatest weapon. Placekicker Pedro Suarez has enjoyed a fine season and punter Brian Griffith averages more than 40 yards per punt.


Cawood Ledford interviews former Wildcat All-American Sam Ball

We were loaded on offense and pretty mediocre on defense, tell people probably the reason that we couldn't have been better is because (Coad Charlie) Bradshaw ran off some phenome nal talent, guys like Maurice Mooreman Dale Lindsey. Because of that, our numbers were down."



LEDFORD: Sam earned consensus All-America honors as a tackle in 1965. He then went on to spend the next five year with the Colts. Along the way, he played in two Super Bowls, including the 1971 game in which the Colts beat Dallas 16-13 for the title. Sam says playing in the Super Bowl is an awesome experience.

BALL: "When you play in the Super Bowl, the night before, the night you la your head down to go to bed and the next day when you get up and you're playing for the world championship, that's when it really, really dawns on you."

LEDFORD: Probably no person in Kentucky knows Bill Curry better than Sam Ball. The two were teammates on the Colts for four years. In fact, Ball says, they were more than just teammates.

BALL: "Not only were we teammates, we were on the same line of scrimmage. I tell people when the Fearsome Foursome came to town, there was five guys charged with stopping that business. And the same when the Purple People Eaters came to town, or the Doomsday Defense of the Dallas Cowboys. Not only did I play with Bill Curry, but on the same line of scrimmage. I've got a great admiration and love for Bill Curry. He's my friend, he's my brother."

Limbaugh Helps Kentucky Land Successful Back-To-Back Recruiting Classes



In just two short years, University of Kentucky Recruiting Coordinator Tommy Limbaugh has worked wonders for the Wildcats football program.

Limbaugh, a 1967 graduate of the University of Alabama, has worked his magic to assist Kentucky in putting together a pair of outstanding recruiting classes in 1990 and 1991. In fact, UK's 1991 freshman signee class ranked 13th nationally by the *National High School Football Magazine* (Max Emfinger).


According to UK head coach Bill Curry, a school must string together outstanding recruiting classes not just for two years, but for five or six consecutive years to build a solid base or foundation for a program. Under Limbaugh's guidance, the Wildcats are on their way to doing just that.

For the first time since the inception of the "Mr. Kentucky Football" award, Limbaugh helped the Wildcats program ink the award's winner, quarterback Pookie Jones in 1990. Then in 1991, UK signed tailback Damon Hood, last year's Mr. Football.

Overall, Limbaugh is in his 17th season in intercollegiate athletics and spent over half of those doubling as an on-the-field coach. Last season, Limbaugh coached the Wildcats tight ends and helped senior Rodney Jackson achieve All-Southeastern Conference second-team honors.

Following a seven-year stint as a coach in the prep ranks, Limbaugh joined Steve Sloan's staff as an assistant coach at Texas Tech (1975-77), Ole Miss (1978-82) and Duke (1983-86). He served as an administrative assistant and recruiting coordinator at both Ole Miss and Duke, with several of his signing classes being named to the nation's top 10.

He returned to his alma mater in 1987 as assistant athletics director and was promoted to associate athletics director in 1988. Limbaugh was the first person to join Curry's staff at Kentucky, becoming official Jan. 11, 1990.



In Pursuit of Championship Performance

ill Curry's initial Kentucky squad finished the 1990 season with a 4-7 record. But the Wildcats' mentor has big things in store for Kentucky fans. His first campaign in the Bluegrass

showed sparks of future greatness. The Wildcats posted a 3-4 record in the mighty Southeastern Conference, the most wins for a UK team since 1984. Academically, the Wildcats tied for the SEC lead in Academic All-SEC Honor Roll selections, with 13. So the optimist looked at the positives.

"I'll always be disappointed if we're not 12-0, and I mean that," Curry said. "But we're on the right track and we're moving in the right direction. The speed will vary. But there's no question where this program

is going.

The quest for "championship performance" has been the first order of business since Curry came to Lexington in January of 1990 to become the 32nd head football coach at Kentucky.

"I told our squad I'm interested in championship performance, championship people, championship academics and championship football," Curry said. "I'm not interested in anything less than that. That's what we are about. A championship performance in everything."

Curry's football pedigree weighs heavily in his expectations of championship performance. After all, he did play and work under three of the most successful coaches the game of football has ever known -Bobby Dodd, Vince Lombardi and Don

Curry, 47, lettered three years (1962-64) as a collegian at Georgia Tech under Dodd and served as team captain his senior campaign. Dodd compiled an impressive 22-year record of 165-64-8, including Southeastern Conference titles in 1951 and '52, at Georgia Tech.

After earning his bachelor's degree in industrial management from Georgia Tech in 1965, Curry began his professional career under Lombardi with the Green Bay

teams which won the National Football League title (1965-66), including the first Super Bowl Jan. 15, 1967. The legendary Lombardi guided Green Bay to five NFL championships in seven years during the 1960s. Following the 1967 season, Curry was traded to the Baltimore Colts and eventually became All-Pro in 1971. His mentor for two seasons at Baltimore was Don Shula, who today is the winningest active coach in NFL the and has appeared in more Super Bowls (6)

Those credentials alone have made Curry the type of coach who really understands what demands must be met in order to succeed.

Indeed, those qualities opened the eyes of UK Athletics Director C.M. Newton when he began his search in December of 1989 to replace Jerry Claiborne, who stepped down after eight seasons with the Wildcats. But Newton took an interest in another side of Curry.

Before his professional career was over 10 seasons later, Curry played at Green Bay (1965-66), Baltimore (1967-72), Houston (1973) and with the Los Angeles Rams (1974). Curry was a member of three Super Bowl teams, two National Football League Championship teams and was selected to the 1971 and '72 Pro Bowls. A knee injury forced him to retire in 1975.


A year later, Curry was back at his alma mater as an assistant coach under Pepper Rodgers. Then in 1977, Curry returned to the pro ranks as an offensive line coach with the Green Bay Packers under former teammate Bart Starr. Curry answered Georgia Tech's call once again in 1980, this time as head football coach.

Facing a pair of daunting schedules, Curry and Tech turned in 1-9-1 and 1-10 records in 1980 and '81, before things began to change in 1982. During his final five years at Tech, Curry produced a 29-24-3 ledger which included a sparkling 9-2-1 season in 1985. The successful '85 campaign earned Tech an All-American Bowl bid and victory over Michigan State, 17-14. It was Georgia Tech's first bowl appearance since 1978.

The success of Curry's teams has not dropped off. In his last seven years as a head coach, he owns an impressive 50-28-3 (.679) record. In 1987, Curry moved to Alabama and replaced Ray Perkins.

Curry was named the 1985 Atlantic Coast Conference Coach of the Year by the Associated Press and ACC sportswriters, the 1987 SEC Coach of the Year by United Press International and the 1989 SEC Coach of the Year by AP and the Nashville Banner. Curry received a special honor after the 1989 season when he was named the Bobby Dodd Coach of the Year, in honor of his former collegiate mentor.

Curry is married to the former Carolyn Newton of College Park, Ga. Carolyn has a Ph.D. in history and teaches in the history department at UK during the spring semester. They have two children -Kristin, 23, and Billy, 20.

rom its modest beginnings in 1865, when it was known as State College, the University of Kentucky has grown into one of the nation's most outstanding institutions of higher learn-

ing. As a comprehensive land-grant university, UK offers an educational experience that cannot be matched anywhere in the Commonwealth. In fact, only a small number of institutions across the nation can offer the wealth of opportunities that awaits students at UK. At Kentucky, there is a tradition of value.

University History

UK was founded in 1865 as a landgrant institution, and the present name dates to 1916. The Lexington campus has 673 acres. Dr. Charles T. Wethington, Jr., is UK's 10th president.

Students

The University of Kentucky now has more than 63,000 students with 23,000 on

the Lexington campus and 40,000 at the 14 community colleges across the state. UK now educates 37 percent of all students in Ken-

tucky attending a public or private college or university. There are 4,600 students enrolled in graduate school with 86 master's and 58 doctoral programs offered.

Faculty

There are 1,566 full-time faculty on the Lexington campus and another 1,050 faculty in the community colleges. Faculty brought in more than \$70 million in grants, contracts and gifts to the University



during the last academic year, a 17 percent increase over the previous year.

Academic Programs

Currently, there are 17 academic colleges and a graduate school. Students have a choice of 108 undergraduate majors from which to choose. The University is recommended in five books or publications for its value in providing higher education.

Research

UK ranks among the Top 100 research institutions in the nation, and is one of only 45 public universities in the United States — the only one in Kentucky — to be classified as a Research University of the First Class.

Medical Center


The Albert B. Chandler Medical Center, including a 461-bed hospital, is located on the Lexington campus. More than 2,700 students are enrolled in its five colleges — medicine, dentistry, nursing, pharmacy, and allied health professions.

Library

The UK Library System contains more than two million volumes and is interconnected by computer with each of the 14 community colleges. The Library is ranked 55th among all university research libraries in North America and the University has announced a fund-raising campaign to build a new \$40 million library in future years.

Sports

With the addition of men's soccer last year, the current number of UK sports on the varsity level is 18 — nine men's sports, eight women's sports and one coed sport. The men's sports consist of football, basketball, baseball, cross country, indoor/outdoor track, tennis, swimming, golf and soccer. For the women, UK sponsors basketball, volleyball, swimming, golf, tennis, gymnastics, cross country and indoor/outdoor track on the varsity level. The one coed sport is rifle.

r. Charles T. Wethington, Jr., was named President of the University of Kentucky in September, 1990. He served as Chancellor of the UK Community College System since 1982.

Wethington began his career in higher education in 1965 as an educational psychology instructor at UK and entered administration two years later when he was named director of Maysville Community College. In 1971 he moved to the system office in Lexington as assistant vice president, before becoming vice president of the Community College System in 1981.

In the University reorganization of 1982, he was named chancellor of the UK system, one of the three major sections of UK. Under his leadership, the Community College System has set enrollment records and added an entirely new college at Owensboro. Wethington earned his master's and doctorate degrees at UK.

The Casey County native has been active on the national higher education scene, serving as legislation committee chairman of the National Council of State Directors of Community and Junior Colleges before moving to the chairmanship in 1985.

He has been vice chairman of the

Executive Council of the Southern Association of College and Schools' Commission on Colleges.

Dr. Robert Hemenway Chancellor — Lexington Campus

Dr. Robert Hemenway served his first year as chancellor of the Lexington Campus in 1989.

Hemenway began teaching English at UK in 1966 and moved on to the Univer-



sity of Wyoming in 1969. He returned to Kentucky in 1973 as an associate, and later, full professor of English.

From 1981 to 1986, Hemenway chaired UK's Department of English before serving as dean of Arts and Sciences at the University of Oklahoma.

Dr. Peter Bosomworth Chancellor — A.B. Chandler Medical Center

Dr. Peter Bosomworth is in his 29th year with the University of Kentucky, having served as chancellor since 1982.

Bosomworth came to UK in 1962, just weeks before University Hospital opened At age 32, he became the youngest chairman of a department of anesthesiology in the country. Bosomworth held that post until 1970, when he was named vice president of the UK Medical Center.

Under his leadership, UK's Albert B. Chandler Medical Center has experienced a high patient occupancy rate and significant increases in outside research funding. In 1969, Bosomworth received the faculty scientific achievement award of the Kentucky Medical Association.

Dr. Ben W. Carr, Jr. Chancellor — Community College System

Dr. Ben W. Carr, Jr., became chancellor of the UK Community College System in March, 1991.

Carr had served as vice chancellor for academic affairs of the Community College System since 1982 and acting chancellor from December, 1989. For a six-month period in 1986, he was also acting director of Lexington Community College.

In 1972, Carr began his teaching career at Lexington Technical Institute, later named Lexington Community College. He was an assistant professor, 1974-77, and an associate professor, 1977-78.

He was named associate director for academic affairs at Lexington Community College, 1978-81. And he served as assistant president of the Community College System, 1981-82.

C.M. Newton

Director of Athletics



hen Charles Martin (C.M.) Newton became the University of Kentucky's seventh director of athletics April 1, 1989, he hit the ground running.


Newton's first order of business was to bring respectability back to a basketball program hit hard by an NCAA investigation. He did so by hiring New York Knickerbockers head man Rick Pitino to coach the Wildcats. A few months later, Newton was faced with the task of hiring a football coach to replace the retiring Jerry Claiborne. Newton again rose to the occasion, luring Southeastern Conference Coach of the Year Bill Curry from the University of Alabama to lead the UK program.

Newton has scored with UK fans again and again. He announced that UK's football and basketball games would once again be carried on Louisville's clear-channel, 50,000-watt WHAS Radio, for the first time since 1986. He kicked off a fundraising campaign to build a new indoor practice facility adjacent to Commonwealth Stadium. And he announced the addition of varsity soccer to the UK Athletics program.

After little more than two years on the job, Newton has become one of the most popular public figures in the Commonwealth of Kentucky. In addition to a lengthy, impressive list of credentials, Newton brought to Kentucky a sparkling reputation of integrity at a crucial time in the history of UK Athletics.

He capped an illustrious basketball coaching career by leading his 1988-89 Vanderbilt University squad to a 19-14 record, a second-place SEC finish and its second consecutive NCAA tournament appearance. He was named SEC Coach of the Year by the Associated Press and received the Kodak NABC District IV Coach-of-the-Year award.

Newton served as head basketball coach and associate athletics director at Vanderbilt after 1982, compiling a 129-115 hoops record. In 32 years of coaching at Transylvania, Alabama and Vanderbilt, Newton compiled a 509-375 overall record, ranking



him among the top 10 active coaches in the game in terms of total victories at the close of the 1988-89 season. Newton's Alabama

teams won three consecutive Southeastern Conference championships and more games than any other coach in Crimson Tide history. He ranks second in career victories in Southeastern Conference games behind his mentor, Adolph Rupp.

Perhaps more impressive, however, was Newton's ability to produce winning teams that also possessed exceptional academic credentials. During Newton's tenure at Vanderbilt, 18 Commodores were named to the Academic All-SEC team - over 50 percent more than any other league school. And including his last graduating class, all 21 seniors received their diplomas.

Newton is highly regarded on the national level. He has served on the board of directors of the National Association of Basketball Coaches. He worked six years on the NCAA Basketball Rules Committee, serving as chairman for five years. He currently serves as vice president of USA Basketball, the nation's governing body for international basketball, and as chairman of of its Games Committee, which is responsible for all international competition, including the Olympic Games.

Newton has literally circled the globe to promote basketball. He served as team manager — a combination coaching and administrative position — on the 1984 U.S. Olympic team that won the gold medal.

In 1983 and 1987, Newton took his Van derbilt squads to the Republic of China (Taiwan) to represent the United States in the R. William Jones Cup International Tournament, winning the gold medal in 1983 and the silver in 1987. He has conducted coaching clinics in numerous countries.

After playing on the 1951 national champion Kentucky Wildcat squad and pitching in the New York Yankees' minor league system, Newton began coaching at Transylvania College (now Transylvania University) in Lexington.

In 1969, once again with the backing of Rupp, Newton took on the challenge of building the downtrodden Alabama bas ketball program. During his 12-year tenure, Newton orchestrated a turnaround in the Crimson Tide's basketball fortunes, compiling a 211-123 record.

With few horizons left to conquer at Alabama, Newton resigned at the end of the 1980 season to accept a job as assistant commissioner of the Southeastern Conference. A year later, he began his stint at Vandy.





ohn Cropp is in his first season at UK and his 14th campaign as a collegiate assistant coach.

Cropp, a 1961 graduate of Vanderbilt University, comes to Kentucky after spending the last three years as Assistant Athletics Director for Compliance at his alma mater.

Cropp began coaching football while serving in the Army in Germany (1965-66). After fulfilling his service requirements, Cropp began a highly successful high school coaching career.

Cropp returned to his alma mater in 1973 as an assistant coach under Steve Sloan. He followed Sloan to Texas Tech (1975-77) as tight ends and receivers coach, Ole Miss (1978-82) and Duke (1983). At Ole Miss, Cropp was offensive coordinator and running backs coach. He continued his role as offensive coordinator/running backs coach at Duke for one season.

In 1984, Cropp returned to Vanderbilt again as an assistant coach, this time under George MacIntyre. He coached the running backs in '84 and served as offensive coordinator in 1985.

He entered private business for two years (1986-87) before returning to Vanderbilt in June of 1988.

aryl Dickey is in his second season at UK. His responsibilities include coaching the UK quarterbacks and coordinating film exchange with opponents.

Dickey, 30, is in his third year as a collegiate assistant coach.

Most Kentuckians remember Dickey from his collegiate days as quarterback of the Tennessee Volunteers. In 1985, Dickey helped lead the Vols to a 9-1-2 record and the Southeastern Conference title. He was named most valuable player in the 1986 USF&G Sugar Bowl after engineering Tennessee's 35-7 victory over Miami (Fla.).

Following a brief stint with the San Diego Chargers of the National Football League, Dickey returned to his alma mater as a graduate assistant coach for two years (1987-88).

He then moved to Florida State, where he coached quarterback Peter Tom Willis during the 1989 season. Dickey helped Willis earn a No. 7 ranking nationally in total offense and passing efficiency while Florida State went 10-2.

Last season, UK's quarterbacks completed over 55 percent of their passes while throwing for the second highest total of passing yards (2,152) in UK history.

ill Glaser is in his 15th season Bas an assistant football coach at the University of Kentucky and his 16th as a collegiate coach. His responsibilities include coaching defensive tackles and nose guards and coordinating the annual Bill Curry Football Camp during the

Glaser, 48, came to Kentucky in 1977 from Morehead State. He has worked for three head coaches at UK — Fran Curci, Jerry Claiborne and Curry. Glaser was the only full-time UK assistant retained by both Claiborne and

After graduating in 1965 from Bellarmine College, Glaser began coaching at St. Xavier High School, his alma mater, as an assistant football and baseball coach. He was named head football coach in 1974 and led St. Xavier to consecutive state titles and a two-year slate of 25-0.


Glaser was named defensive coordinator at Morehead State in 1976, where he completed work on a master's degree. A year later, he moved to UK as defensive line coach under Curci. In the Claiborne era, Glaser coached the UK defensive guards.

ohn Guy is in his second season as assistant head coach for football operations and outside linebackers coach at Kentucky, and his first season as special teams coordinator for the Wildcats. This is his 19th season in the college ranks.

Guy coaches the strike and defensive end positions as well as the UK placekickers. As assistant head coach, his responsibilities include the maintenance of all UK football facilities and assumption of head coaching duties in the absence of Bill Curry.

After graduating from North Carolina A&T in 1973, where he had a successful four years as defensive back and placekicker, Guy served as defensive line coach at North Carolina in 1974. Guy remained at UNC for five seasons after earning his master's degree in psychology in '74.

In 1978, Guy moved to Virginia Tech as assistant coach, and then to Duke as outside linebackers coach in the same year. He remained there for three years, before joining Curry's staff at Georgia Tech in 1981. Guy followed Curry to Alabama and then Kentucky.



alter Lewis is in his second year at Kentucky, third as a college assistant coach. He is responsible for coaching the running backs.

Lewis, 29, came to Kentucky from Alabama after spending one season as running backs coach under Bill Curry. Before that, he was a standout quarterback for the Crimson Tide in the early 1980s.

During his career at Alabama, Lewis completed 286 of 504 passes for 4,257 yards and 29 touchdowns, and rushed for 1,433 yards and 13 touchdowns in four years. He was named All-SEC in 1983.

Professionally, Lewis played for Memphis of the USFL, Montreal of the Canadian Football League and New England of the NFL.

Lewis coached junior Siran Stacy at Alabama in 1989. The senior running back finished fourth in the SEC with 1,079 yards rushing and 17 touchdowns in 1989.

The follow-up was Lewis' efforts in helping Al Baker explode for an outstanding senior campaign a year ago, nailing down a No. 5 ranking in the SEC rushing charts (70.9 ypg) and hauling in 35 passes.

arry New is in his second season as defensive coordinator and inside linebackers coach at Kentucky, his 27th coaching the college game.

New, 47, came to UK from Alabama, where he was a defensive line coach for three years under Bill Curry.

New lettered two seasons (1962-63) as nose guard at Illinois. He helped the Illini to a 17-7 victory over Washington in the 1964 Rose Bowl.

New began coaching at Wheaton College as a defensive coordinator in 1965. After three years at Wheaton, New moved to the Division I level and joined Dan Devine's staff as defensive line coach at Missouri (1968-70), then worked with Frank Broyles in the same capacity at Arkansas (1971-74).

In 1975, New began a sevenyear stint under Jim Carlen at South Carolina. New served as defensive line coach during his first five years under Carlen then was promoted to defensive coordinator in 1980.

New joined Curry at Georgia Tech in 1982 as defensive line coach. He remained on Curry's staff through 1986 at Georgia Tech and for three years at Alabama.

oker Phillips begins his first season as an assistant coach at Kentucky. His responsibilities include coaching flankers and split ends.

Phillips, a 1986 graduate of Kentucky, was a four-year letterman as a wide receiver. During his career (1981-84), Kentucky appeared in the 1983 and '84 Hall of Fame Bowls. Phillips' best season was 1984, when he grabbed 28 receptions for 305 yards and five touchdowns. Entering the 1991 season, Phillips ranked sixth on the UK career reception list with 75 catches for 935 yards and nine touchdowns.

He played briefly in the National Football League and the Canadian Football League and was a member of the 1987 Washington Redskins team which won Super Bowl XXII.

Phillips began his coaching career as a graduate assistant coach at Kentucky (1988-89) under Jerry Claiborne and was responsible for the receivers. In 1990, he was named assistant recruiting coordinator under Bill Curry. He also worked with UK recruiting coordinator Tommy Limbaugh last year and coordinated the Wildcats' walk-on program.

R ick Rhoades is in ins more and son as offensive coordinator ick Rhoades is in his first seaand his second year coaching the offensive line at Kentucky. This is his 11th season in collegiate coaching.

After lettering four years in football and baseball at Central Missouri State, Rhoades, 44, embarked on a high school coaching career at Mountain Brook in Birmingham, Ala. His 1976 squad captured the state title with a 14-0 record.


In 1981, Rhoades moved to th collegiate level as offensive coordinator at North Alabama.

He moved to Troy State as defensive coordinator in 1983, before being named head coach at that school. His three-year head coaching stint produced an NCAA Division II national championship in 1987, earning Rhoades National Coach of the Year honors as chosen by the American Footbal Coaches Association and The Sporting News.

In 1988, Rhoades moved on to Division I-AA Southern Illinois at Carbondale as its head coach. A year later, he joined Bill Curry at Alabama as the offensive tackles and ends coach. The following year, he moved to Kentucky.



R ick Smith is in his second season at UK, his 12th overall as a collegiate assistant coach. He is responsible for coaching the defensive backs.

He comes to Kentucky from Baylor, where he was defensive backfield coach for three years.

Smith, 43, began coaching football at Godbey High School in Tallahassee, Fla., in 1970, a year before he graduated from Florida State University. After three years at Godbey, Smith was named athletics director/head football coach at Wakulla (Fla.) High School in 1973.

Four years later, Smith served a year as head junior varsity football coach at Georgia Tech in 1977. The following year, he served as an assistant coach at East Tennessee State.

His final high school job began in 1979 at Marianna (Fla.) High. Smith again doubled as AD/head football coach at Marianna through the spring of 1982, when he left for Georgia Tech to become Bill Curry's defensive backfield coach. In 1986, Smith moved to Alabama under Ray Perkins for one year.

Smith moved to Baylor in 1987 and the Baylor secondary quickly became one of the most respected units in the nation.

odd Fugett is in his second season coaching the Wildcat bandits and rovers, his fifth as an assistant. He is a volunteer assis-

Fugett comes to Kentucky from Missouri Western State where he served as both strength coach and defensive backfield coach in

The 1985 graduate of East Central (Okla.) University began his coaching career in the fall of '85 as an assistant coach at Blanchard (Okla.) High School.

He served as graduate assistant at Tennessee (1986) and Baylor (1987-88), working with defensive backs.

Several of his players at UK have received accolades during Fugett's first season. Senior bandit Jeff Brady was a 12th-round selection of Pittsburgh in the National Football League Draft. Sophomore bandit Duce Williams earned Most Improved Linebacker honors during the '91 spring drills and sophomore rover Bill Campbell earned Most Improved Defensive Back honors also that spring.







Commonwealth Stadium

Home of the Kentucky Wildcats



hen it comes to football, Kentucky-style, there is certainly no better place than home - Commonwealth Stadium.

Built in 1973, Commonwealth is one of the

nation's best showcases for collegiate football. The stadium is located on the southwest corner of the University of Kentucky campus, convenient to both Cooper and Alumni Drives.

Commonwealth Stadium was built at a cost of \$12 million by the firm of Huber, Hunt and Nichols, Inc. The stadium, including parking areas, rests on an 86-acre plot of what was once the UK Experimental Station Farm grounds.

The stadium took on a new look last fall with the addition of a \$600,000 scoreboard and message center located in the north end zone. The scoreboard is 19 by 78 feet in size, almost 3.5 times the size of the original scoreboards which have been in place since 1973.

The stadium was officially opened September 15, 1973. The Wildcats moved into their new home after spending 48 years at Stoll Field/McLean Stadium across from Memorial Coliseum. Kentucky defeated Virginia Tech in the stadiumopener, 31-26, behind three touchdowns by quarterback Ernie Lewis.

Since its opening, Kentucky has played 113 games within the friendly confines of Commonwealth Stadium. And indeed, the 65-44-4 record and .593 winning percentage is proof positive of the Wildcats' homefield advantage.

Large crowds have followed Kentucky football at Commonwealth Stadium. The Wildcats have averaged 55,217 spectators for contests at Commonwealth since its

inception. In total, 6,239,539 spectators have witnessed Kentucky football at Commonwealth Stadium - that's about 1.7 times the

population of Kentucky.

Commonwealth Stadium can officially seat 57,800 fans, though standing-room only crowds exceed that figure. Most sat but many of the stadium-record 58,345 spectators stood to watch the Wildcats defeat Mississippi State, 33-19, Oct. 12, 1985. The second-largest crowd, 58,230, gathered a week earlier to watch Kentucky defeat Clemson, 26-7. The third-largest crowd (58,216) watched Kentucky defeat Indiana, 17-14, in 1989.

An enclosed press box, which comfortably seats 120 members of the media, is located underneath the upper deck on the stadium's west side. The press box area has eight private booths (four VIPs), a photography deck and two dining areas. Two elevators link the box to the stadium ground.

The University of Kentucky plans to eventually enclose the south end (Tates Creek Road) of Commonwealth Stadium to bring its capacity to 72,000. The addition of luxury suites and boxes is also in the plans.



Indoor Practice Facility



he University of Kentucky's new indoor practice facility, available to all UK athletic teams for poor-weather practice, is now under construction. Some details:

GENERAL FACTS

Location:

Southeast section of the University of Kentucky campus, adjacent to Commonwealth Stadium...Site is current game-day Yellow parking lot which is behind the South (Tates Creek Road) end zone.

Cost:

\$7,000,000

Size:

Approximately 133,500 square feet (current Nutter Center structure is 48,000 square feet)...Height will be 65 feet at apex. Features:

- Actual playing field area of 115,000 square feet (450 x 225).
- Full-size artificial turf football field.
- Six-lane, 340-yard track (360 meters).
- · Areas for track and field events (high jump, pole vault, shot put).
- · Computerized Net System which forms baseball batting cages and golf driving ranges.

- Gymnastics room of 10,000 square feet.
- · Men's and Women's transient locker rooms (50 x 25 each).

- · Gymnastics, track, and building operator's offices and lobby of 2,000 square feet. Notes:

The height (65 feet) and netting system will allow punting and placement kicks for football practice...The average indoor track size across the country is 200 meters while the UK indoor track will be approximately 360 meters...The unique netting system will also allow a full infield and outfield baseball practice...Commonwealth Stadium's football playing field will run perpendicular to the playing field inside the indoor facility.







E.J. Nutter Training Facility





ne of the nation's showcase football facilities rests on the southeast corner of the University of Kentucky campus.

Indeed, the ultra-modern E.J. Nutter Football Training Facility ranks

among the best in the nation. Built at a cost of \$5.7 million, the facility officially became the home of Kentucky Wildcat football in September 1987.

The Nutter Center, as it is called on the UK campus, encompasses more than 48,000 square feet and is built adjacent to the Shively Sports Complex. It is located on Sports Center Drive, just a rock's throw away from Commonwealth Stadium.

"I have not seen everyone's new facilities, but the Nutter Center is the finest that I have seen," UK coach Bill Curry said. "It is the best planned and the most spacious facility I know of. Combined with our spacious practice area, the Nutter Center gives us the most beautiful football complex that I have ever been associated with."

The new Wildcat facility is named after Ervin J. Nutter, a UK alumnus who contributed \$1 million to get the fund-raising campaign started for the construction to

begin. The Nutter gift to the UK Athletics Association is the largest single grant ever received by the Association.

The University has been a great inspiration (to me)," Nutter said. "I don't feel as if I've given anything away. I'm just paying what the University has done for me.

Now, just three years after the facility was completed, it is beginning to repay dividends to the Kentucky football program, especially in recruiting.

Aside from new dressing facilities, which feature large, personal lockers for every Kentucky football player, the Nutter Center is highlighted by a 9,000-square foot weight room with over 100,000 pounds of equipment. The center also houses 11 meeting rooms, a state-of-theart video and editing room for coaches' film, equipment and training rooms, staff and player lounges, an interview area, a 60-yard sprint track, sauna and jacuzzi, an aerobic exercise room and three racquetball courts. A touch of Kentucky football tradition and history is on display in the

'This is a facility built with the players in mind,' said former UK

coach Jerry Claiborne, who helped spearhead the financial drive to make the Nutter Center possible. "It does not have coaches' offices like other facilities. Instead, we had the student-athlete in mind in the design and planning and that's how we wanted it to be."

Curry plans to make no changes. "It is a privilege to get to work in a facility such as this every day," the second-year coach said. 'The planning and design with the studentathletes at heart is what we're about today.

"Jerry Claiborne's most important accomplishments during his eight years at Kentucky were in the human arena. But his picture, which hangs in the Nutter Center, is a reminder to us just how much he loved this University. For Jerry and Mr. Nutter and the other contributers who helped make this facility possible, they have left a legacy that will surely be exciting to build on."

Center For Academic And Tutorial Services



he University of Kentucky keeps the term "studentathlete" in the proper perspective - student first, athlete second.

For that reason, the University of Kentucky

Athletics Association opened the nation's first academic center for student-athletes in 1981. The academic center is simply known as CATS — Center for Academic & Tutorial Services.

CATS is located inside Memorial Coliseum. The center, designed with the student-athlete in mind, contains a large general study area, along with several smaller rooms used for tutoring.

CATS expanded during the past academic year and added a language library, additional tutoring rooms, a media center and a new computer facility.

"Our CATS is one of the best academic services in the land and that's based on results," UK coach Bill Curry said. "For Kentucky to be up there with Duke

and Virginia and Notre Dame is a real tribute to first, the student-athletes, but also to our academic support staff headed by Bob Bradley.'

Kentucky is in league with the aforementioned schools in winning the College Football Association Academic Achievement Award, given for the CFA school whose program has achieved the highest graduation rate in the nation. Kentucky won the honor in 1989 after graduating 90 percent of its 1983 freshman class. Kentucky is the only other school to have won the award outside of the trio.

"We get more response from parents who visit us on the CATS program than any other part of our program," Curry said. "Parents are really excited about it."

Curry is also excited about the com-

bined effort former UK coach Jerry Claiborne and his staff put forth during their tenure. Since 1982, Kentucky has placed 81 players on the All-Southeastern Conference Honor Roll - more than any league school in that period. In 1989, the Wildcats set a conference record with 17 players named to the SEC Honor Roll. And during the 1991 spring semester, UK football placed 24 players on the Athletics Director's Honor Roll on campus.

With winning the CFA award and

employs six graduate assistants and numerous tutors, both from the University and surrounding community. Currently, the UKAA budgets close to \$500,000 per year

"We are extremely proud of what we have accomplished in the academic arena," Bradley said. "The CATS program is focused on winning in the classroom. We look at each student-athlete's individual needs, set goals and develop strategies to attain those goals. Our center (CATS) pro-

vides our student-athletes with a definite advantage over student-athletes at many other institutions."


Bradley also says it helps to have head coaches like Claiborne and Curry that place such a strong emphasis on academics.

"Many support systems across the nation do an excellent job at helping their studentathletes," Bradley said. "I have been blessed at Kentucky in having Jerry Claiborne. He really believed in the

student-athlete concept. The same holds true for Bill Curry. We are in total sync in the business of educating our student-athletes."

The philosophy at the University of Kentucky is this: Colleges should be able to afford the student-athlete every opportunity to succeed not only in athletics, but in academics as well. Looking at recent statistics in Academic Honor Roll selections and graduation rates, Kentucky is standing by its philosophy.

We will continue to support our academic staff to the hilt," Curry said. "We're very excited about the work Bob Bradley and his staff have done. We will not accept anything less from our players. We talk about championship performance, we expect championship in academics, too.'







Football Traditions

Blue and White



he University of Kentucky adopted blue and white as its official colors in 1892. UK students had first decided on blue and light yellow before the Kentucky-Centre football game Dec. 19,

1891. The yellow was soon dropped from the combination and replaced by white.

The particular Kentucky shade of blue, close to royal blue, was determined without ceremony. After settling on the base colors, a student posed the logical question, "What color blue?" Letterman Richard Stoll looked down at his necktie and raised it to the air. The vote was unanimous.

And so Kentucky Blue is really Stoll necktie blue.

Nickname

The official nickname of University of Kentucky athletic teams is "Wildcats."

The name became synonymous with



UK shortly after a 6-2 victory over Illinois on October 9, 1909. Commandant Carbusier, then head of the military department of old State University, told a group of students in a chapel service following the game that the Kentucky football team had "fought like wildcats."

The moniker "Wildcats" became increasingly popular among UK followers and the media. The University has since adopted it as its official nickname.

Wildcat Mascot

The Wildcat mascot originated during the 1976-77 academic year at the University of Kentucky. Gary Tanner was the first

Wildcat to dance and entertain crowds at Commonwealth Stadium and Rupp Arena during athletic events. Today the Wildcat mascot also attends academic functions and serves as a friendly ambassador for the

In the early 1980s, Wildcat mascot Terry Barney began the tradition of doing a one-armed pushup for each of Kentucky's points in front of the student section after every Wildcat score.

Battle for the Beer Barrel

The Beer Barrel, painted blue, orange and white, is the prize awarded each year to the winner of the Kentucky-Tennessee football game. The first barrel was awarded in 1925. Two Wildcat supporters, Guy Hugelet and Rollie M. Guthrie, wanted to produce something to symbolize the fierce rivalry between the

The Wildcat has been UK's friendly

two schools. A whiskey barrel was to be the original trophy, until the Women's Christian Temperance Union

ruled it out. A beer barrel was more acceptable to the ladies.

But there was still the problem of Prohibition and the

Anti-saloon League, which voiced displeasure at such a trophy. But the resourceful Hugelet and Guthrie appeased all parties by painting "Ice Water" on the barrel.






Kentucky has won the barrel 23 times in the 86-game series.



The Bourbon Barrel is awarded to the winner of the Kentucky-Indiana football game. The series, which was renewed in 1967 after a 40-year break, began in 1893. No one is certain of the origin of this unusual trophy. Some think the blueand red-striped barrel represents the distillery industry in Kentucky and southern Indiana. Indiana leads the series, 13-7-1, but Kentucky has won four of the last six outings. Both schools have signed a contract to meet each year through 2000.

"The indoor practice facility is extremely valuable to us from three perspectives - 1) togetherness of our athletics program, 2) performance, and 3) recruiting. In recruiting, what this facility says to all prospective student-athletes is that Kentucky intends on winning in football also. We have made a \$7 million commitment in that direction. A major feature of the indoor facility would be the football field. The field itself would be stunning to a prospective student-athlete. It would be a major recruiting advantage for the University of Kentucky"
