Hamppered Wildcats Defeat Cincy In Confused Game

Blue Plays Poorly Because Of Low Ceiling Difficulty

Kentucky's boys from the wide open spaces fought in a cramped little gymnasium in Cincinnati Monday night to pull out a 38-34 victory over the UCans. Hamppered by a low ceiling and the 40 x 78 foot floor, the 'Cats played a poor game largely because their specialty—long, long shots that arch high in the air—were hard to apply against the boys from the Queen city.

"The boys did not play as well as they should have played," Baron Rupp commented, pointing out that the low ceiling bothered them considerably. Also, it is hard to "get the boys cooked up" over a game with the University of Cincinnati when they have just played strictly big league aggregations like Illinois and Notre Dame, he said.

Brannan Top Rupp gave credit to sophomore Wilbur Schu and his Bob Brannan for good games Monday night. Brannan led the Blue and White scoring with 9 points and Schu trailed closely with 8.

The Kentuckians racked up their 13th win in 14 starts, the second victory over the Cincinnatians, and held a lead the entire game except for the first six minutes of the struggle. Rupp's usual pivot offense had to be altered to fit the smaller floor and most Kentucky goals were scored on long shots that hit or on rebounds.

Hitting a new low for the season of 152, the 'Cats shot 92 times and hit only 14. Cincinnati's average was a few points better at 209, hitting 10 out of 49 heaves. Kentucky dominated both backboards but even with relentless pressure in a third game were unable to stuff in many rebounds or loops.

Cincinnati's zone defense forced Brannan and later De Molesey out of the well-known pivot spot, and thus nessed up a favorite 'Cats play which usually scores at least 8 points a game. Kentucky's defensive power slowed down UC's captain forward, Hal Schneider, who has averaged 15 points every game this season.

Cincy First Schneider scored first and Brannan

num retaliated with two free throws followed by a Cincinnati pivot shot making the score 3-2. After 7 minutes of play, Wilbur Schu sunk a Kentucky bucket, the 33rd try by the 'Cats, to make the score 5-8.

On the first play of the second half, Tingle snatched the tip-off and scored from the side and a 10-point spurt followed until the score stood 21-21. Frequent fouling and careless passing gave the locals numerous scoring opportunities, and the 'Cats were fortunate that the Cincinnati boys were no more present than when they those opportunities arose.

Much Confusion Scrambling and confusion during the last few minutes hid from referees the fact that UC's Mueller had fouled out, and the 400 beruffled spectators failed to notice it.

The Blue boys were definitely off Monday night, and with relief they heard the final gun, ending probably the most poorly played game of the Wildcat season.
